



Changes in the Cabinet. We notice that Chief Justice Duval, who is at the head of the Bench in Quebec, has resigned, that his resignation has been accepted, and that his successor will be appointed in a few days. We should judge from a paragraph in to-day's *Globe* that the Hon. Mr. Dorion will be appointed in' his place. This change has been spoken of for some time past, but was probably laid over till after Parliament was prorogued. In Mr. Dorion's retirement from public life the Reform Party of Ontario loses the ablest, most consistent and devoted Reformer in

Quebec. Mr. Derion has been many years a member of Parliament, and we well remember in the early struggles of the Reform Party, from 1854 to 1866, what valuable assistance

he gave on the floor of the House in all matters affecting its interests. As the Reform leader of the Lower Canadians he was of great service in every contest, and in every struggle for the right. His great ability and his untiring industry made him a valuable co-worker, while his gentlemanly bearing, his pleasant manner and his sterling honesty endeared

him to all—whether friends or op. ponents. He has well earned the honour about to be conferred on him, and his long and consistent public life and valuable services to the Reform Party, will be held in grateful grateful remembrance by every member of it in Ontario as well as in
