Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works Returns From an Extended Tour.

Is Well Pleased With Progress Evident and Prospects Generally.

HON. R. F. GREEN, chief commissioner of lands and works, returned on Monday night from the interior, was interviewed by a Colanist representative to obtain his most recent impressions of the country through which he had traveled, and an account of the conditions as they exist.

He had visited Revelstoke, Nelson, Kaslo, Trout Lake, Ferguson, Helyon, Cranbrook, Marysville, Fort Steele and Fernie and other places. The chief commissioner was asked in regard to Mining Operations which came under his observations.

Fog Delays the Big Yacht Race

Start of Great Contest Across the Atlantic Not Made Yesterday.

Three-Master Atlantic Is Now Looked Upon as a Likely Winner.

New York, May 16.—Eight of the eleven yachts which had been entered for the 3000-mile race across the Atlantic Ocean for the \$5,000 cup offered by the German Emperor sailed yesterday from the shelter of Sandy Hook tonight, for the start of the race had been postponed until tomorrow because of the fog.

All day a dense mist hung over the Hook, and the sea outside, where the start was to have been made, was very thick. The starting committee had announced that the boats would be sent away unless the fog was too thick.

The start of the race had been set for 11:15 p. m., but at that hour only six yachts were ready to start.

Hon. Mr. Cartwright heartily endorsed Sir Mackenzie Bowell's position and said he would see that the Senate's position in the matter was promptly represented in the proper quarter.

War Rates Advanced on Shipments to Orient—Camosun at Frisco. Steamer Yuso Maru, of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha line, sailed for Yokohama and way ports through the Japanese port and Hongkong yesterday.

At the present time war risk rates to the Orient vary from 2 to 2 1/2 per cent. It is expected that the date of departure, the vessel leaving, character of cargo and destination, the bulk of business, and the nature of the cargo, are quite a bit of contracting at 3c, and a number of policies are even being taken at 3 1/2c.

Advices from San Francisco are to the effect that war risks from that port have advanced, and will continue to rise as the danger of merchantmen being captured assumes larger proportions.

Strike Now Will Be Called Off

President Gompers Advises the Team Owners to Work for Boycotted Firms.

Sluggers Charged With Complicity in Killing Committed Suicide.

Chicago, May 18.—After leaving the meeting of the Federation of Labor, President Gompers met a number of the team owners who have stood by the unions for the greater part of the strike, and informed them that the time had come when they could no longer refuse to deliver and take goods of the boycotted houses, without losing all of their business and facing financial ruin.

It is said on good authority the teamsters will accept a plan of settlement that will enable them to call off the strike peacefully, and they will accept any plan that Mr. Gompers may propose. It is now said that Mr. Gompers will suggest to the teamsters that they allow the team owners to do business with the boycotted houses, and in this manner the strike will be called off.

Bricklayers' hall, the chief labor headquarters in Chicago, and the meeting place of the Federation of Labor, was invaded by the police and eleven union men arrested who had taken refuge in the building after a non-union strike was being slugged.

Sluggers' Committed Suicide. Fearing that he would meet the same fate as G. J. Carlstrom, the woodworker, who, it is alleged, was killed by "sluggers," had led John Mitterman to a room while standing in the street opposite his dwelling, and five hours later at a hospital having against the unions, Mitterman, up to and after the death of Carlstrom, was the employer of Fred L. Mackel, in whose store Carlstrom worked, and one of the men on the list of those to be slugged, of whom Carlstrom was the first.

To Cut Supply Of the Russians. Nogi With Light Marching Force Said to be Making Long Forced March.

Where is Nogi? The solution of that question means much to Russia. The armies of Linerich, with Herbin twenty-five miles away as a base, are in position between Changtu, a station on the Chinese Eastern Railway, otherwise called Kuching-changtu, an unvalley city, seven miles north of Wuylo Pass, and 341 miles north of Dabay by rail, and Kirin, capital of the province of the same name, lying on the left bank of the Sungari, and housing 150,000 within its walls of mud and timber with towered semi-circular roofs of the compass.
