THE PRESS EXCURSION.

At Midland City, Parry Sound and Pessamog, The Future Press Excursion of Canada.

Midland City is the northern terminus of the Midland railway. It is beautifully situated on the horseshoe-shaped harbor of that name, the land rising gradually from the water, and the forest around it rises a hundred and fifty feet above the water level.

The best natural harbor in Canada, easy of access, protected on all sides against the storms, rises from the water, and having a depth of twenty-five feet within a few rods of the shore. The Midland railway company is building an elevator here with a capacity of a quarter of a million bushels, which will be finished by the middle of next month.

The members of the press excursion carried away very favorable impressions of Midland City harbor. They left for Parry Sound Friday morning by steamer Magnetawan, kindly placed at their disposal by Mr. A. M. Dodge, and reached the town at 2 o'clock.
