An application from the foreman at the waterworks engine house for more pay was not entertained.

At the suggestion of Mr. Spratt it was agreed to have 500 copies of the annual report printed.

The following estimates to cover the departmental expenditures for the present year were submitted, the figures in the first column giving an idea of the increase over last year's appropriation:

Pumping department, \$881,884.00; Maintenance department, \$5,000.00; Press house, \$1,000.00; Reservoir, \$1,300.00; Meters, \$2,400.00; Office and miscellaneous, \$13,000.00; Rent of water and electric lights, \$2,000.00; Salaries, \$21,000.00; St. Paul's ward pumping station, \$50.00.

IMPROVEMENTS AND ADDITIONS.

House services, \$100,000.00; Mains, \$5,000.00; \$60,000.00.

At Mr. Spratt's request the item for the new mains was increased to \$80,000, and for the increase in the service consequent upon the annexation of Brookton and Hiversdale.

After reducing the item for salaries to \$23,000 the committee adjourned.
