





TO KIE EGGS FRESH. German rewspapers state that it is ossible to keep eggs fresh for any German rewspapers state that it is possible to keep eggs fresh for any length of time by simply immersing them in a ten per cent. solution of sil-icate of soda, commonly called "liq-uid glass." This produces the forma-tica of a coaling which renders the eggs perfectly air tight. The eggs so treated retain their fresh taste for many months.
