#### OF EARLY MASSACHUSETTS STOCK

Cap<sup>l</sup> Walter Tremaine Ruggles of Nova Scotia Traced His Ancestry to Governor Thomas Dudley

(Boston Transcript)  
Announcement is made of the death in the Hospital, at Halifax, N. S., of Captain Walter Tremaine Ruggles from the effects of wounds received in overseas service, while at Lens serving with the Eighty fifth Canadian Regiment, His home was at Annapolis Royal, N. S., where his father, Lenfest Ruggles, is principal of the Academy. Captain Ruggles was who was twenty eight years of age, was of Massachusetts ancestry, tracing his lineage back to Thomas and Mary (Curtis) Ruggles of Roxbury, who settled there in 1637, and to Governor Thomas Dudley. He was born in Londonderry, N. S., in 1890 and was graduated from the Mt. Allison Academy, in 1912, and then taught for awhile, becoming also interested in public affairs and Y. M. C. A. work. He was heard as a speaker in various places in Nova Scotia. He did much recruiting work through the Provinces, before going to France. Captain Ruggles has many friends in and about Boston. He is survived by his parents, two half brothers and a sister.

Big Attraction at Annapolis and Aylesford

Next Saturday, Victoria Day, is a public holiday throughout Canada and will be suitably observed. At Aylesford there will be the usual races which always attract a big crowd. At Annapolis, as will be seen in our advertising columns, a big celebration will be held under the auspices of the Annapolis and Digby bands. The Mayor and members of Digby's town Council will be guests of the Mayor and Council of Annapolis. After the parade the two bands will give a concert on the garrison grounds and in the evening a grand concert in the theatre, accompanied by moving pictures.

Special trains will leave for Middleton and immediate points at 7 p. m. and for Digby and all way stations at 11 p. m. Everything is free in the day time but every visitor is expected to wear a tag secured from the band committee.

No doubt there will be a large crowd present from Bridgetown and all along the line. We wish those who have the matter in charge every success.

A Well Known Master Mariner has Passed Away

DISTRICT MEETING

Digby County Baptists Held a Pleasant Session at New Tusket

The Digby County United Baptist District Meeting convened with the New Tusket Church Monday and Tuesday, April 21st and 22nd.

The weather conditions were, on the whole, favorable. Little or no rain fell until Tuesday evening, and then too late to materially interfere with the size of the congregation.

The delegation was very small. This was due no doubt largely to the fact that the place chosen for the meeting was inconvenient for most of the churches in the County. Three out of the five pastors in the county were present, namely Rev. G. C. Durkee Little River; Rev. F. H. Bone Bear River; and Rev. J. H. Copeland Weymouth.

The meetings were largely devotional and inspirational. Rev. F. H. Bone preached Monday and Tuesday evenings. Rev. G. C. Durkee preached Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon meeting was devoted to a discussion of Denominational Problems in the County. The chief questions discussed were our Denominational allotment. The allotment for 1918 was \$1,955.00 of which amount the County only raised \$1,104.50. The reason for this deficiency was mainly considered to be the lack of education along missionary lines.

This year a special effort is being made to bring every church up to its allotment. Already there are signs of good success along these lines. New Tusket has raised nearly two thirds of its allotment of 75.00. Little River is doing excellently. Bear River will come out on top. All the churches in the County will be visited by the committee, and those interested, during the next few weeks. In this and other ways we hope to make a record year.

The total amount subscribed by the county for all denominational purposes during 1918 was \$2,101.07, being an increase over 1917 \$204.33. In average amount per member Digby took the first place, raising \$2.01 per resident member. Bear River came second with an average of \$1.85 per member.

There are nine pastors in the county; six have pastores, one has student supply, and two are vacant. The county offers a splendid opportunity for aggressive leadership. The fields are white unto harvest. Prayer, consecration and cooperation are the three essentials of success.

BOLSHEVISM

By R. M. King

The follower of the Soviet form of government introduced nearly two years ago into parts of the Russian Empire have designated it to be "Heaven on Earth." The literal meaning of the term Bolshevism is enlightenment, and one of its foundation principles is that the title to the land, forest and mines and all the resources of these great branches of human industry together with all the products of his labour shall be vested in the labourer. Bolshevism would abolish the Capitalist and make all men workers upon one level and then it would illustrate the great principles of "Brotherly love" and "Christ's Golden Rule."

The elimination of class distinction in the industrial world is however not the only distinctive feature of the Bolshevism system. The claim that leadership in industry shall be elective is with them an essential doctrine. Hitherto the Capitalist could choose his manager and control the output of his factory or mine and the only way in which the labourer in many cases could correct abuses, or secure due rewards for his toil, was by strikes or revolution. In recent years enlightened legislators have sought a remedy for real wrongs often found in such disputes on both sides by compulsory arbitration. (In this forward step in the settlement of labour disputes, the laws enacted in Canada lead the world.) Instead of the captain of industry or the managing owner, Bolshevism would control by the superintendent chosen by and responsible to the group of workers. Experience shows however, that elective leadership destroys individual initiative. No profits, no special rewards for skill or enterprise, and men become slothful and unenterprising. This is seen in Russia. After nearly two years of trial, millions are on the verge of famine, while some of the most productive land in Europe lies all about them idle.

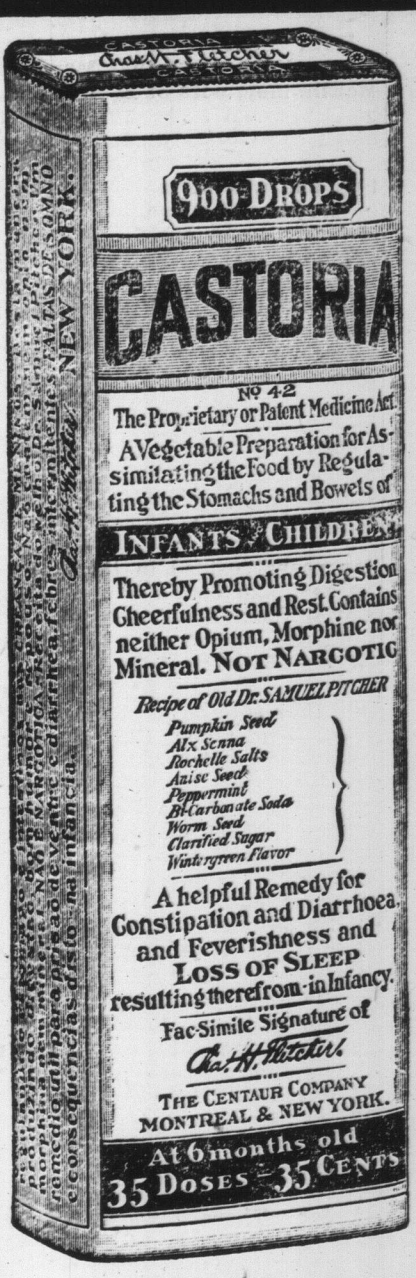

A Letter from Ottawa

To the Editor of the MONITOR: Dear Sir: Sometime now since I have written you so am sending a few lines to day. Times are quiet here in the Capital. The chief topic for conversation is the peace conference and how it will terminate. A general feeling of regret is expressed at Italy's action as regards the final settlement. No doubt secret treaty between Italy, Great Britain and France has placed the two nations in somewhat of an awkward position and it is regrettable that they did not make it known to the United States when she entered the war. But as the geography of Europe will be entirely changed, new states created and it has changed conditions very materially and it is certainly does not seem fair to the Czech Slovaks, a new and populous state that they should have no fort upon the Adriatic Sea, and of course as Fiume would be their only one, it does not seem hardly fair to them to be handed over to Italy. We all still have hopes the knotty dispute may be arranged amicably. We hope so. It also appears to us that Belgium is somewhat unreasonable in her demand upon the Peace Conference but like humans they, like Shylock of old, demand the pound of flesh. Parliament is surely going at a small pace and now after being in session over three months have not made much progress. They have already the budget always produces hair raising debates and very often the great reduction in the tariff whilst the manufacturers still demand the high protection which they have enjoyed for so many years and like most people when they have a good thing they do not like the idea of letting go their vice-like grip, so don't be surprised to see the fur fly. Then the franchise act is sure to produce a wordy debate and is bound to produce a big argument from the pros and cons there is no prospect of rogation much before the end of July. We are having a very backward spring here in Ontario, nothing having been done at all in the farming line, and old pros seem to be very pessimistic to us getting any good weather till about the 20th of May. We all hope the old fellow may slip a bit this time and warm spring conditions may come sooner. April was a cold, rainy month and May, so far, has not been much better. A great temperance campaign will take place soon and the wets will be anxious to have the old fellow slip a bit under their reign once more. I think there is too much sound sense in the people as a whole to ever allow the dreaded evil to come among us again. We have already tasted the sweets of total prohibition so long. I'm sure the better judgment of the people will prevail. We have at the present time a very array of talent in our city churches, some able and powerful orators but take it from me there is none to equal the Rev. Dr. Marshall, of the First Baptist Church. He speaks in a way that makes a woman here which causes him among our ablest pulpits orators. A great lie is in store for all when listening to his very able and powerful sermons and before a speaker of Dear Old Annapolis County to make it still more interesting, we come to long retain him in the pulpit.
