





ABRAHAM GOODWIN, grocer, Strathroy, has again got into business difficulties. About a year ago he failed, with liabilities amounting to about \$4,000. Through the assistance of friends he succeeded in tiding over his troubles at the time only to become again more hopelessly involved. Mr. A. Meekinson of Strathroy is the principal creditor. Mr. Meckinson became Goodwin's security when the latter first failed, and the consequence is he will lose from \$600 to \$1,000.

A PAIR of hay-fork swindlers have successfully operated on John Shipley, a farmer in Rochester township, Essex County, Ont. Being induced by them to accept the agency of the county for a patent hay fork he consented to take a consignment of the forks, and signed an agreement to that effect. Their capital has been sunk in this business, and they have been unable to market the machines. An offer of 221c cash was favorably entertained. The meeting was then adjourned to allow of an opportunity to communicate with the creditors in Great Britain. The liabilities are about \$7,000 and the assets nominally the same. The bicyc'e business was carried on under the firm name of J. Darlington & Co.

Condovan, the name formerly applied to tanned goat skins, but now used also to designate leather made from horse hides, is coming into notice here. It is extensively employed in England and in some parts of the States, and is pronounced almost equal to French calf in appearance and superior to it in we r. Its manufacture has already been attempted in Montreal tanneries with indifferent success, but an old tannery in the East end has now been bought by parties who intend devoting themselves exclusively to the business. The manufacture of cordovan has been carried on at Acton. Ont, for some years and a competitive tannery, is, it is said, being projected at Toronto. New York is the principal market for horse hides on this continent, and the supply comes chiefly from South America. A dealer in hides stated that Montreal could not be depended. upon to supply more than a dozen or fifteen hides per week.

It is very much to be doubted, says our contemporary, if these notes are good, notwithstanding the strict provisions provided, if the fact that they have been obtained by fraud is advertised before they get into the hands of an innocent third party.

THE following paragraph was crowded out of part of last week's issue. "Mr. Molleur, president of La Banque de St. Jean, has been arrested charged with having made false returns to the Government, by representing the paid-up capital of the bank to be \$226,000, whereas it is claimed the amount paid-up is only \$65,000, the balance being made up of promissory notes. THE FISHERY QUESTION.

The papers and correspondence bearing on the recent arrangement regarding the fisheries have been laid before Parliament, but they throw no new light on the subject. It is to be regretted that some of the writers for the press in the Maritime Provinces are using all their efforts to produce dissatisfaction, resorting, as is too frequently the case, to the grossest misrepresentation of facts. An arrangement, which is of the most temporary nature, and which has been made for the few months of the present fishing season, on the distinct pledge of the Executive of the United States that measures shall be recommended for determining the respective rights of both nations, is denounced by the Halifax Chronicle as "a disgraceful and humiliating surrender." The Executive Government of the Dominion arrived at the conclusion that, in view of the change of Government in the United States, it was more expedient to postpone the attempt to negotiate until the inauguration of the new president. The paper to which we have referred treats the question as if Canada had granted the free use of the fisheries for an unlimited period without compensation.

It is of course a fair subject for discussion whether it would have been more politic on the part of Canada to have taken steps to prevent the trespassing on our fishery grounds by foreigners. The reasons against such a policy are fairly stated in the papers laid before Parliament, and it is premature to affirm that they are invalid. It would, in our judgment, be a much wiser policy for the Opposition to bring all the pressure possible on the Government to induce it to insist on a final adjudication of the respective rights of the two nations, without any reference to a temporary surrender of such rights for an adequate compensation. It is most unfortunate that the opportunity was not taken to have had those rights adjudicated by the arbitrators who sat at Geneva on the Alabama claims, and whose award would have finally disposed of the long-disputed question of the right of foreigners to enter British bays. It is to be hoped that the first question to be disposed of will be that of the national right to the exclusive use of British waters, after which it will be open to negotiate what equivalents should be given for the temporary enjoyment of the right to fish in British waters by foreigners.

#### THE SILVER DANGER.

It is evident that considerable alarm prevails in the United States on the subject of the standard of value. The New York Bankers' Magazine has in one of its recent issues given the monthly average of gold and gold certificates, silver and silver certificates, and U.S. notes received at the New York custom house at different periods. During the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1884, the monthly average of gold was 69.1, of silver 22.2, and of notes 8.7. In the six months ending 31st Dec., 1884, it was, gold 34.8, silver 34.9, and notes 30.3. During April, 1885, it was gold 38.9, silver 41.9, and notes 19.2. The comment of the Bankers' Magazine is that "no one can study these figures without conceding that silver is steadily

encroaching on gold, and that, if much longer continued, will effect a change in our standard." We shall give on the same authority the comparative statements of net gold and silver in the treasury on different dates. On 2nd January, 1884, the net gold was \$154,465,980 and net silver, \$27,169,227. On 2nd January, 1885, the gold was \$141,688,432 and silver \$36,353,009. On 3rd May, 1885, the gold was \$115,597,130 and silver \$59,209,995.

The writer in the Magazine asks "What is to be done to stay the impending danger," but the danger has been pointed out over and over again since the enactment of the law requiring the coinage of a given amount of silver. One remedy that is about being tried, if we can believe current rumors, is the abrogation of the small note issue, which amounts in round figures to fifty millions of dollars. This would simply put the nation at large to the expense of using silver instead of paper. We are told that "the people are determined to retain the gold standard of payments," and that "the coinage of silver dollars must stop if there be no other way of effecting this purpose; "but the warning was given at the time when the forced coinage of silver was adopted, and we have yet to learn that there has been any change of opinion on the part of the advocates of a silver standard.

It is desirable that Canadians should hear in mind that there is a strong probability, to say the least, that the time is rapidly approaching when the United States will have practically a silver standard. There are a variety of schemes floating about for getting rid of the difficulty without abandoning the gold standard, but they are of the most visionary character, and there seems no probability that the two Houses of Congress will agree to apply the true remedy, which is. to suspend the coinage of silver, as has been done in France. The question of the standard has been recently discussed much more in England than it was formerly, and there are many advocates of an international double standard, but public opinion is still strong in favor of the single gold standard. The probability seems to be that in a comparatively short space of time the United States will have practically a silver standard of value, and it will then become a question how far it will be wise on the part of Canada to adhere to the single gold standard. The subject is one that ought to engage the attention of all those interested in the result. It is worthy of notice that

the following paragraph points to the possibility of Germany abandoning lits single gold standard:

The agitation in favor of a bi-metallic monetary standard in Germany progresses actively. Another conference has been held between Prince Bismarck and the leading advocates of the coinage of silver."

#### THE NEW DUTIES.

"If the object of the recent alteration in the tariff be to obtain additional revenue. we venture to doubt whether it will be attained. In the case of sugar it is probable that the effect will be a diminution of the revenue, and it is not pretended that the object was an increase of revenue, but rather to check the importation of sugars refined outside the Dominion. The protection of the sugar refining interest may be held as the established policy of the Government. In regard to the increased duty on spirits, it is tolerably clear that it is the opinion of the chief organ of the total abstinence party that its effect will be to check consumption, and, should this opinion be correct, there will be no increase of revenue. Mr. Bowell, on the other hand. estimates that there will be an increase of over a million of dollars on spirits alone. though only half that amount during the current year, and this notwithstanding the adoption of the Scott Act by several counties.

Whatever may be the effect of the increased duties on the consumption of spirits and tobacco, there can, we imagine, be no doubt whatever that if the object be to obtain a substantial increase to the revenue, the article which would supply it is tea, and there is no valid reason for continuing its free admission. A tax on tea and coffee would fall on the entire population, and would be open to as little objection as any that could be imposed. Of course if the object be not to obtain additional revenue, but merely to sustain a protective policy, it cannot be expected that the duties will be im. posed on articles likely to produce revenue. We apprehend, however, that. in view of the new burthens that have been created, it is absolutely necessary to impose new taxes, and, if so, we feel assured that the scheme of the acting Minister of Finance will prove a failure. It is, moreover, to be feared that the term " refined sugar" without any kind of color test will lead to a good deal of misunderstanding. The scheme submitted by the Minister was subjected to a good deal of criticism in the House

but was finally adopted. There is an effort being made by a prominent firm of distillers in Toronto to withdraw a large quantity of spirits from the bonded warehouse on payment of the old duty, but the Government seems determined to exact the higher rate on all that were in the warehouses on the 6th inst. The effect of adopting a different policy would be to hand over a large amount of the tax paid by the consumers to private firms.

## THE UNITED STATES TREATY CIRCULAR.

Considerable uneasiness was felt for some days last week, especially by those interested in Canadian railways, as to the effect of a circular issued by the Treasury Department of the United States, the effect of which it was imagined might have been to divert the traffic of the West from the Canadian route. Sir John Macdonald explained in his place in Parliament that the intention was merely to put a stop to the practice of unloading cargo at the entrance of the Welland Canal on Lake Erie, transporting it on the Welland Railway, and reshipping it at the Lake Ontario end. There were, however, many who were of opinion that it went much further. The following circular not only removes all the apprehension that at one time prevailed, but affords room for hope that even what relates to the Welland railway will be reconsidered:

WASHINGTON, July 11.

Collector of Customs, Oswego:

Sin,-Referring to your letter of the 8th inst. in regard to the internal effect of the circular of this department of 2nd inst., in which the instructions given to customs officers in the matter of the transportation of merchandise through Canada by routes part rail and part water, your attention is invited to the following statement of facts :- Under article 29 of the Treaty of Washington, transportation by all railroads from one port in the United States, to another through the Dominion of Canada and from one point in Canada to another through the United States is authorized. Under article 30 of said treaty transportation through the territory of both governments by routes partly by rail and partly by vessels on the great lakes and connecting waters is authorized.

By an Act approved March 3rd, 1883, Congress directed the discontinuance of the 30th article referred to from and after July 11, 1885, and notice to that effect was promptly given Her Majesty's Government through our Department of State immediately after the approval of the said Act. The circular of this department of 2nd inst. simply directed Customs officers on the northern frontier to continue shipments of merchandise rassing through Canada under transit manifests between Ameri-

can ports by routes part rail and part water, and instructed them to hereafter treat goods arriving at their ports by such routes as importations from foreign contiguous territorythat is to say, that such goods upon arrival should be entered. Of course, if merchandise so arriving is of domestic production, it will be admitted to free entry on presentation of proofs and in the manner prescribed by law and regulation. Merchandise arriving by all-rail routes will be treated as heretofore, the twentyninth article of the treaty not having been terminated. That nortion of your letter relating to the use of the Welland canal and incidental ports re portions of cargoes by means of the Welland railway will be further considered by the departments.

The following extract has an important bearing on the same subject:

THE CARRYING TRADE.

THE LAKE CARRIERS' ASSOCIATION TO PRESIDENT CLEVELAND.

Buffalo, July 12.—The Lake Carriers' Association, having learned that an effort is to be made by the Canadian Government to have President Cleveland continue in force article 30 of the Treaty of Washington, have sent the following protest to the President:—

BUFFALO, July 10, 1885.

Hon. Grover Cleveland, President, Washington, D.C.:

DEAR Sin,-We understand that an effort is being made toward the extension of article 30 of the Treaty of Washington, which by proclamation of President Arthur, dated January 31, 1885, was made to terminate on July I, 1885. We beg, on behalf of the lake carrying trade of the United States, to enter a formal protest against such action. This article, as we understand it, gives to British subjects the right to carry freight in British vessels from one port of the United States to another, provided a portion of the transportation is made through the Dominion of Canada by land carriers. That is, American grain or flour may be taken in Canadian bottoms from Chicago, Milwaukee, or Duluth, delivered in Canada at Sarnia or Collingwood to Canadian railways, and be transported by them to Buffulo, Ogdensburg, er other points of re-entry into this country, to be thence carried to destination. The comnetition we have met with under this article has been serious, and we think that we should be protected from it, so far as the interests of the public will permit. We ask that the provisions of this article be not extended without opportunity for full investigation and hearing. Respectfully yours,

## THE MUTUAL RESERVE FUND LIFE ASSOCIATION.

We are indebted to the courtesy of the New York State Superintendent of Insurance for a copy of his official report on the standing of the Mutual Reserve Fund

Life Association of the city of New York, which, in view of the prominence given that last, though not least, of the life companies entering the Canadian field of insurance; must possess some interest for the general public. We purpose stringing together a few extracts from the head of the report, reserving the body of it for future treatment. After referring to the organization of the association, early in 1881, and the provision in its plan that 25 per cent of the net receipts from each assessment shall be held as a reserve fund. the departmental inspectors proceed to deal with their mode of examination. The total collected for health assessments from Feb. 8, 1881, to May 31, 1885, was \$1,408,337, the whole of which is accounted for, save a small amount, \$822, embezzled by a former assistant cashier.

"Up to about six months ago," says the report, "the books and accounts were kept in a very irregular and unsystematic manner. The officers, however, have shown every disposition to improve the system by introducing such checks upon those handling the funds of the association as suggested themselves from time to time. Since the first of January last the books have been kept in better order, and, with a few improvements which have been suggested, and which the officers have taken measures to put in force, it will be an easy matter hereafter to verify the receipts and disbursements. The system of payments and retention of vouchers has also been very loose, but the officers say that they will hereafter insist on having itemized and receipted bills for all disbursements, and filed in regular order. The trouble has been that the methods of bookkeeping above referred to were those adopted when the Association was in its infancy, and its growth was so rapid that those methods proved insufficient. We found the officers not only willing, but anxious, to adopt any measure affording a better protection of the funds and a satisfactory auditing of the accounts."

The Death Fund of the association is composed of 75 per cent of the net receipts from assessments, plus the interest from the Reserve Fund. In the assets of said fund there is included the amount collectible on assessment No. 20, and also the amount which the Association is authorized by law to assess upon the members for unpaid death losses, not including the additional amount for the Reserve Fund. In the liabilities there is included the amount necessary to pay all certificates on which losses have been reported to the Association. The officers state that many of these losses are not valid claims against the Association, by reason of fraud or lapse of policy; and the registers show that of the certificates on which losses have been reported at least \$53,500

ppear to have lapsed before the death

of the insured. There is also included in the liabilities the proportion of assessment No. 20 which will go to the Reserve Fund. The assets are \$558,402.19, and the liabilities are \$520,375, the surplus being the amount estimated to be realized on assessment No. 20 in excess of the amount required to pay the claims for which said assessment was made.

The condition of the Reserve Fund on June 1, 1885, is shown by schedule. The report says:

"The total amount of net receipts from death assessments up to June 1, 1885, was \$1,407,515,46, of which \$351,825.97 has been transferred to the Reserve Fund, the remainder having been applied to the payment of death losses. From this it is evident that the requirement of the constitution, that twentyfive per cent of the net receipts from assessments shall be carried to the Reserve Fund, has been faithfully complied with. Section 2 of article 10 of the Constitution prescribes that the Reserve Fund "shall be deposited " with a trust company, or companies, or de-" partments constituted by Government or " legal authority." This prescription has been recently disregarded by the deposit with a national bank of nearly \$60,000 of moneys belonging to the Reserve Fund. Out of this deposit there was drawn \$51,375 for the purchase of \$50,000 United States bonds, for deposit in Canada. If this deposit with a national bank be legal, it would be equally so if deposited in any other bank or place. The circulars and advertisements of the Association convey the impression that the Central Trust Company of New York is the sole trustee of the Reserve Fund. If it is the intention of the Association to make the Central Trust Company the sole trustee of the Reserve Fund, it will be necessary, in order to carry such intention into effect, that the present deed of trust be amended, as it does not now provide that all moneys belonging to the Reserve Fund shall be deposited with said Trust Company."

From remarks made in our hearing, we gather that an erroneous impression prevails concerning the deposits of the abovenamed trust company, which amount to 24 millions of dollars. This misapprehension arises from the rather equivocal manner in which it is mentioned. We need doubtless only refer to this circumstance in order to induce the managers of the Mutual Reserve Association to render the meaning more clear, and show to the public that these enormous deposits appertain to the Central Trust Co. of New York, and not to our new visitor from the same city.

Referring to the Canadian deposit, the examiners say:

"In this connection we desire to call your attention to the deposit of \$50,000 United States bonds made in Canada. We are informed that a Bill' was recently passed by the Canadian Parliament which requires assessment associations to make a deposit of \$50,000 with the Canadian Government as a prerequisite to their transaction of business in Canada. We understand that this Bill has not yet been signed. The following letter will explain the circumstances connected with the deposit above referred to: "

"NEW YORK, March 27, 1885. Sir Leonard Tilley, Minister of Finance, Ottawa, Canada:

Dear Sir,—We send you this day, per U. S. Express, five (5) ton thousand dollars (\$10,000) U. S. registered bonds, three per cent loan of 1882, original numbers 13,573 to 13,577 inclusive; substitute numbers 8,291 to 8,295 inclusive, which we place in your hands awaiting the result of the Bill now pending in the Canadian Parliament, and beg to request that as soon as the Bill has passed that you consider the same as a deposit made by the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association, in compliance with the law. Will you be kind emough to acknowledge the receipt of the same?

E. B. HARPER, President.

"P.S.—Duplicate letter accompanies the bonds."

"The present insurance laws of Canada provide that deposits made with the Canadian Government shall be held for the benefit of Canadian policyholders. The President of the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association informs us that the Bill aw aiting signature directs that all deposits made in pursuance thereof, shall be held for the benefit of all policyholders. We have endeavored to obtain a copy of said Bill, but have been unable to do so, and therefore cannot state exactly what it contains. If it provides that the deposit shall be held for the exclusive benefit of Canadian policyholders, it is manifestly unjust that the funds contributed by American policyholders should be used for that purpose. If, however, said deposit is to be held for the benefit of all policyholders, it would not be open to much objection, although the manner of creating the deposit may be open to criticism. We may add that the receipt of said bonds has not yet been acknowledged by Sir Leonard Tilley, but the United States Express Company's receipt for them is held by the Association."

The Medical Bureau of the association, appears to have been examined by a physician of New York whose report is included. It would appear from this report "that the medical examinations in the earlier years of the association were rather lax and insufficient," but this has much improved latterly, and is now not inferior to that in general use. Under this heading the report says:

"It appears that, in the summer of 1881, the Association reinsured the Lawyers' Mutual Aid Association of New York, numbering 106 members. None of these members have ever been subjected to a medical examination by either of these associations. In December, 1882, this Association added to its number 1,430 members of the Mutual Endowment Assessment Assocition of Baltimore, Md., without the usual medical examinations, relying on the medical examinations made when such members were

received into the Baltimore association. These reinsurances, without proper medical examination, were mistakes that have proved very expensive."

Under the caption of "Dues and Fees" the report says that it was found impossible to verify the receipts for dues from the dues' registers within reasonable time. "We therefore," it says,

"Depended for a verification upon the accuracy of the general book-keeper's books, which are very well kept, and we believe the dues received have been accounted for. It would be more satisfactory, however, if the amount of dues paid on each certificate were carried out in its proper column of the register, instead of being simply marked paid, and the cash account debited with the gross amount of dues, and credited with the commissions retained by the agents. This would make the verification of the cash book from the register, which is the only proper method, an easy matter."

Out of the gross amount of death assessments, \$1,486,172, collected to June 1, 1885, there was paid \$78,657 for expenses of collection, salaries, taxes, legal and other expenses. Concerning these expenses the report says:

"The constitution of the association permits the payment of such expenses out of the assessment moneys; in fact it permits the payment out of such funds of any expense that may be deemed chargeable to the mortuary department. Although the percentage of assessment moneys used by this association for expenses has not been very large as compared with the amount thus used by some other associations, there is nothing to prevent a very large proportion of such funds being diverted to this purpose. Our opinion, expressed in reports on other examinations, and to which we still adhere, is that not a dollar of the assessment moneys should be used for any purpose other than the payment of death claims, and the augmentation of the Reserve Fund; but that if the fees and dues are insufficient to meet the expenses of the association, an assessment should be made to meet the deliciency, and we think the State laws should be amended in this respect."

"The association has always paid its approved death claims in full. All claims are very strictly investigated, and many that have not been deemed valid have been either compromised or rejected. The members have been assessed double the usual rates on assessment No. 20, which is the latest one made. This is the first time a double assessment has been levied on the members, and it was done for the purpose of paying all claims that had been approved up to the time of making the assessment, and for which a single assessment would be insufficient. The number of members liable on said assessment was about 24,500. Although mistakes have been made, as indicated herein, we do not feel they were due to dishonesty on the part of the managers."

The general examiners' report concludes with a complimentary reference to the reforms introduced by the officers of the association who, with the characteristics of honesty, vigilance and experience attributed to them "will be enabled here-"after to manage the affairs of the asso-"ciation with care and judgment."

The report has been compiled with much care, and with a touching tenderness for the feelings of the officers of the institution. It has evidently been found impossible to avoid some unpleasant reflections, but the Association, which has had the distinction of having been rather severely advertised, may return thanks that they have received expression in such smooth terms, while the occasional sprinkling of oil is sufficient to calm any nervousness that might arise. To any old line company unaccustomed to the hard knocks administered to the Mutual Reserve Fund Association such a report would be likely to prove fatal, but not so with the latter, whose energetic officers [l'etat c'est moi] have always another boat ready to bear its members along the pleasant ways of "life insurance" should a change of base be deemed desirable.

#### THE BANK OF COMMERCE.

The annual meeting of the Bank of Commerce was held at the Banking House in Toronto on Tuesday, the 14th inst., and the report and accompanying statements will be found elsewhere. The profits for the year are within a mere trifle of the one previous. The usual dividend of 8 percent was paid and \$100,-000 added to the rest, while the contingent fund has been increased to \$150,000. The report refers to the business depression which has prevailed for some time and the consequent absence of activity in nearly every branch of trade. The large amount of deposits and circulation affords conclusive evidence of the public confidence in the bank. After the usual votes of thanks to the president and directors and manager, the old board of directors was re-elected.

## CANADA, BY AN AMERICAN STATISTICIAN.

Our readers will, we feel assured, be glad of an opportunity of perusing the following letter, addressed to the New Bedford Standard, by Mr. H. A. Brown of Massachusetts, who recently paid a visit to Montreal, and who is well informed on the commercial questions which await solution by the United States and Canada. Mr. Brown has for several years, devoted a good deal of his attention to statistics, and there are few writers more competent to form sound opinions on the

subjects which he is in the habit of treating:

Having recently returned from Canada after a short sojourn in Montreal, the leading city of that Dominion, for purposes connected with public matters, a few lines upon topics of general interest may not be deemed out of place in the Standard.

Although Montreal, in the Province of Quebec, is the chief city in Canada, the Dominion Parliament sits in Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario. The Canadian Parliament consists of a House of Commons and Senate. The Government is represented in the House by the Dominion Cabinet, the Premier, now Sir John Macdonald, being leader of the House of Commons, an advantage over our system whereby the Government can participate in debute make explanations and suggestions, and take active part in legislation for the execution of which they are held responsible.

Sir Leonard Tilley, the present Minister of Finance, has, it is understood, recently negotiated a loan in England for the Dominion Government, on very favorable terms, and notwithstanding the general depression in trade, and the large sums employed by the Dominion Government in aid of the Canada Pacific Railroad, public works and other internal improvements, the credit of the Dominion stands high abroad as well as at home; the average rate of interest paid being about 4 1-5 per cent, and her debt being mostly invested in public works.

The trade between the United States and the Dominion of Canada for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1883, was as follows, being higher than in any previous year:

or \$11,738,175 in favor of the United States. The aggregate trade between the two countries from 1821 to 1883, inclusive (63 years) amounted to \$2,147,012,942, and was \$245,003,512 in favor of the United States. The annual average of trade from 1821 to 1883, inclusive, was \$34,079,570. The aggregate trade from 1854 to 1866, 13 years, under the reciprocity treaty, was \$685,893,777. Balance in favor of the United States under the treaty, \$33,940,737.

A commission of planters and merchants from Jamaica have been some time in Canada endeavoring to negotiate a treaty for the admission of their sugars into Canada, duty free. This would compel Canada to discriminate against other sugar-producing countries to her own hurt, and the proposal, like the projected Spanish-American treaty, being lopsided, is not likely to find favor with the government, nor is it likely to find support in the Dominion Parliament.

There is renewed talk on both sides of the line in regard to a trade of reciprocity between the United States and Canada, and in regard to a renewal of the fishery treaty which was terminated July 1st. According to report, it has been officially intimated in the Canadian Parliament that negotiations were on foot between the Canadian and American Governments to consider the fishery question and the prospects of reciprocal trade relations. Albeit the aggregate trade between both countries has increased since the treaty from \$45,316,912 in 1867, to \$100,326,491 in 1883,

THE STANDARD BANK.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Standard Bank was held in Toronto on the 8th inst., in their new building, and the report, which will be found elsewhere, was highly satisfactory, \$35,000 having been added to the rest, while dividends aggregating 7 per cent were paid during the year. The old Board of Directors was elected, and the officers were thanked for their efficient services.

TARIFF CHANGES .- The resolutions introduced provide for an increase in the duty on spirits made from corn from \$1 to \$1.30 per gallon; on malt liquors from \$1 to \$1.32 per gallon and on spirits made from molasses from \$1.03 to \$1.33 per gallon. The customs duty on Geneva gin, rum and whiskey, and spirits of that kind to be increased from \$1.321 to \$1.75, and on brandy from \$1.45 to \$2. On tobacco the excise duty on foreign leaf, which formerly was 20c per pound, but of late years had been reduced to 12c, would be restored to 20c cents. The duty on domestic leaf, which up to 1883 was eight cents, and was then reduced to two cents, would be advanced to five cents. He proposed to increase the customs duty upon tobaccoto increase the customs duty upon topacco-snuff from 20c cents to 30c per pound, and on imported tobacco from 20 to 30 cents per pound. Cigarettes put up in packages weighing less than one-twentieth of a pound or less shall pay a duty of 34 cents per pound, instead of 20 cents as heretofore, and on damp or moist snuff, when containing over 40 per cent of moisture, when put up in packages of less than five pounds each, 14 cents per pound weight. On sugars it was proposed to change the mode of determining the duty to be imposed so that it could be done without reference to the grade. The duty on refined sugars would be one cent per pound and 30 per cent ad valorem, irrespective of grade, saccharine strength or color, and the operation of items eighteen and twenty in the tariff would in future be restricted to raw and unrefined sugars. The resolutions would take effect on and after the 6th of July instant. He believed the alteration in the duties would be found to afford better protection and greater con-venience to the manufacturers and trade. He proposed to amend the section which directs that in determining the dutiable value of goods the cost of inland transportation should goods the cost of infinite transportation should be added to the price, by providing that all cases of dispute shall be decided by the Minister of Customs, whose decision shall be final. The amount of duty received during the year ending 1884, under the dollar a gallon duty, was \$3,608,246, and the minister estimates the increase of thirty cents would before the increase of thirty cents would bring an additional \$1,082,473 to the revenue if the ordinary quantity were produced. He did not, however, anticipate that more than half that sum would be realized for the first year. increased duty from rum, Geneva gin and brandy was estimated at \$291,730.

AN IRISH BANK FAILURE.—The Munster Bank of Cork & Dublin has suspended payment. Official notice issued early this week stating that the suspension was due to continued withdrawals of heavy deposits since the litigation of Jackson vs. the Munster Bank, the directors adding that, on a careful realization of the bank's securities, they would be amply sufficient to discharge its liabilities. The head office of the bank is in Cork, but it

has an important office in Dublin. Last year the shareholders met and adopted a resolution requesting Mr. Shaw, M.P., chairman, to retire, and Messrs. Jackson, Fitzgerald and other shareholders instituted a suit to make the directors responsible for deficiencies caused by over-drufts to themselves. It transpired that Shaw was indebted to the bank £80,000. Shaw chimed £30,000 fees as director. Eventually the matter was amicably settled in order to stop litigation, and Shaw withdrew his chim. In giving judgment the Vice-Chancellor dwelt severely upon the conduct of Shaw and of another ex-director, Mr. Belton. It was shown that advances to directors were not properly secured. Two recent failures also showed great unsecured indebtedness to the bank. Public confidence in the bank was placed. The Beat, of Iraland on Saturday. bank. Public confidence in the bank was shaken. The Bank of Ireland on Saturday decided to stop supplies, and this resulted in the suspension, which is likely to bring great suffering upon the South of Ireland. For several years the bank paid 10 and 12 per cent dividends, and its shares with three-tenths paid up were quoted as high as £10 10s. In recent years depression; in business caused. In recent years depression in business caused the last dividend to decline to 8 per cent. There is still an uncalled capital of £9,750,000, but it is hoped that there will be ample assets without making a further call. The bank will probably be reorganized in a new form. A despatch says the liabilities of the bank amount to £8,750,000. The majority of its shareholders are ladies, who were solely dependent on its dividends for their income.

EVADING THE DUTIES .- It is probable that were each article of merchandise imported into Canada to pay the duty intended by the Government the taxes all round could be considerably reduced. But it is difficult to make some people believe that there is anything morally wrong in over-reaching the Government, and some of the keenest intelligences in the community are steadily at work on plans with this munity are steadily at work on plans with this object. However people may differ respecting the adjustment of the tariff, there can be no question as to the importance of an equitable distribution of the burthen, whatever it may be. Some strange revelations are threatened to be made public in connection with the recent seizures of large consignments of "patent" medicines, invoiced from J. C. Ayer & Co., Lowell, to wholesale druggists in the principal cities of the Dominion. The following list of consigness is given in the Nar. ing list of consignees is given in the Star:

Total.....\$108,000 The goods were seized in the possession of these firms having been entered as licorice-water, and invoiced at \$1.40 per gallon, whereas they should have been valued at \$5.50 per as they should have been valued at \$5.00 per gallon, as patent medicines fully made up and rendy for bottling. It is due to the worthy president of the Board of Trade, Mr. John Kerry, to say that he denies any knowledge or connivance on the part of the firm in which he is the principal in connection with so serious a charge. In explanation it is averred that the stuff was usually received by a resident representative of the manufacturers, who, in turn in voiced it under its proper designation to the firms named. It is reported that the losses to the Government from this line of goods alone have amounted from \$12,000 to \$15,000 per annum.

G. DE Wolfe, late confidential clerk of the banking house of Friedland & Summerfield. Berlin, Germany, was either discharged or has

absconded from there, taking with him some blank forms of credit. He arrived in New York on 13th June, and at once visited the American Exchange, who represent the Berlin firm in America. He presented a letter of credit from the Berlin house, and as he was in want of funds, simply requested that it be "advised" on another bank in some of the cities he intended visiting. His request was complied with and the letter of credit to the value of \$1,800 was "advised" upon the Columbian Bank of Philadelphia. It was cashed in due bink of Philadelphia. It was easied in due time by De Wolfe who passed from Philadelphia to Washington, and then to this city. Since his arrival here he has been endeavoring in various ways to "kalsomine the town crimson." His arrest, caused by the American Exchange and the Philadelphia Bank, has caused quite a sensation among his newly-acquired friends. He has been gaoled to await examination.

The total liabilities of Ira Scotland, whose failure is elsewhere referred to, are said to be \$8,000. Since the assignment his father has presented a claim for an alleged loan of \$2,000. presented a claim for an alleged loan of \$2,000, which some of the other creditors are disposed to contest. The assets, exclusive of this claim, are thought to reach \$5,000 to \$6,000 nominally. Jos. Thibault & Co., retail grocers, St. James street West, this city, have assigned, with small liabilities.

Z. DARBY, fancy goods dealer, St. Thomas, Ont., has made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors. His liabilities are placed at about \$1,100, with assets very small. W. Bryce, of London, has a chattel mortgage for \$300 on the stock.

#### THE CANADIAN BANK OF COMMERCE.

The Eighteenth Annual Meeting of the Shareholders was held at the Banking House, Toronto, on Tuesday, 14th July, 1885. The President, the Hon. Wm. McMaster, having been called to the chair, it was moved by David McGee, Esq., seconded by T. S. Stayner, Esq: That the General Manager be appointed Secretary, and that Messrs. James Browne and W. G. Cassels do act as Scrutineers. Carried. The Secretary then read the following report:—

The favorable results anticipated from the excellent harvest of last year have not been realized, and the depression in business has been very general. These adverse circumstances are largely attributable to the low prices of produce and timber, the stagnation that he survailed in manufacturing industries, and the absence of activity in almost every branch of trade. This state of things pointed to the necessity for extreme caution in the management of the Bank's affairs, and consequently its operations have been somewhat restricted. The profits, however, after providing for the bad and doubtful debts of the year—which were moderate in amount—have enabled the Directors to nay the usual dividend year—which were moderate in amount—nave enabled the Directors to pay the usual dividend of eight per cent, and add \$100,000 to the Rest Account. The liquidation of the estate alluded to in last Annual Report, and of some other matters of former years not yet completed, has the Contingent Account, and the Directors have accordingly increased that fund by the sum of \$75,000, leaving a balance at the credit of Profit and Loss Account of \$24,192.07. The usual inspections of the branches and agencies of the Bank have been made during the year, and the Directors have pleasure in stating that the officers of the Bank generally have dis-charged their respective duties in a satisfactory manner.

PETERBORO'S INSURANCE RATING. To the Editor of the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE.

DEAR SIR,—Will you kindly permit me, through the medium of your valuable paper, representing the interests of Insurance Cos., to key before them a just complaint, viz., that the town of Peterboro suffers from an improper classification in insurance rates.

classification in insurance rates.

I have repeatedly demonstrated to agents of the town as well as through the press, in our local papers, that Peterboro deserves undoubtedly to be classified in "B" rate. The rivalry among property-holders in building as well as improving is a notable fact here, and a guarantee in itself for preserving the town from injury. Take, for instance, my own two stores 40 by 100 ft.: they have been considered by the inspector of the Royal Insurance Co, to be the best protected buildings in town on account the best protected buildings in town on account of having iron doors and shutters. Lately I have spent \$3,000 more in improvements, and have an iron covered roof, also a hydrant by the very door, and yet no difference is made in rates. There has been a by-law prepared at our town-council, to be voted on for the further provision of 60 prove hydrants in addition to our twitesomen, to be vocation for the triffer provision of 60 more hydrants in addition to the number already in use (about 25) but it is bard to predict the result as to whether the people are willing to be burdened with an additional expense of \$3,000 a year without recognition from insurance companies.

As a resident of Peterbore for over 24 years I am aware of the losses by fire. Since the last 12 or 15 years, the fires here have been of a trivial kind, and in one instance a blessing to the community not only of Peterbore but at large by the

the Midland Railroad station burning buildings, by the town paying for the rebuild-ing of brick, \$4,000, which buildings are a credit to the town and a comfort to the public in general. If insurance companies complain of the great losses they sustain in general, this should be no reason that certain places should be made victims to cover such losses.

The way in which insurance business is conducted is badly in need of reform indeed, conducted is analy in need of reform indeed, and I will endeavor to point to a remedy. I hardly think anyone could safely throw a stone on our business streets without hitting some insurance agent, as they number legion, and all have to live, and by whom?

The answer is easily solved:—Risks are engerly looked after, and the greater the amount the better as no inspection is to required. Has

the better, as no inspection is to required. Has not such a mode of insuring a tendency to incendiary fires? And who is to be blamed for such a way of doing business. Why not employ inspectors who have a pecuniary interest as shareholders in Companies whose chief aim should be to examine buildings and goods insured and at what amount, classify buildings according to construction and surroundings, and I am sure the losses and expense could be considerably reduced with benefit to insurance companies as well as the insured. I could point out many other defects, but will refrain in taking up too much space.

JULY 16, 1885.

Business, though not brisk in any particular line of the wholesale trade, shows greater volume, generally. Among shippers it is hoped that the movement of grain will shortly be increased as a result of the recent reduction in canal tolls and the new war-cloud in Asia. About 25 per cent. of last year's crop is in dealers' hands, another 25 per cent is held back by farmers. The weather has been favorable for the hay crop, and it is likely to be saved in good condition. In Western Ontario the wheat harvest is said to have commenced, and there is every reason to believe that an excellent yield will be secured. Local stocks have been active and firm. The failure record is a light one. Money rules easy at 3 to 4 per cent on call in this market. Sterling Exchange was quoted at 8 9-16 to 8 11-16 prem for 60-day bills between banks; 8 13-16 to 8 15-16 prem demand; New York funds 1-8 to 1-16 discount. Counter rates slightly higher. Documentary bills 84 to 82c; cattle bills 8 5 8. British Consols opened in London at 98 7-8 to 99 1-8. At 12.30 they were 991, and at 4 p.m 99 5-16; and the war scare was said to have subsided. At this morning's session of the Stock Exchange prices generally improved. Bank of Montreal sold to the extent of 200 shares at 195. Yard prices per long cord are as follows:—Maple, \$6; birch \$5.50; beech \$5; tamarac, \$4.50; Hemlock, \$4. Wharf prices about 50c lower.

DAIRY PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS .- Creamery butter has been in improved demand at firm prices with the sale of a round lot at 194c. Dairy stock is still quiet, there being no export demand. A trifle more than our quotations can be obtained for jobbing selections. Cheese closes firm, with prospects favoring a strong market. Considerable business was done preserday at an advance of 1-8c, Liverpool prices being 1s higher, at 41s. Some holders wanted 8½c, but 8½c was really the top of the market, over 1,000 boxes being placed at that figure. Sales of less desirable stock occurred figure. 

Grain and Flour.—The local market has been dull and easy up to within the past two days, when news of further encroachments by the Russians was received, and led to the adoption of firmer views by holders. Ordinary superior sold down to \$4.20, and 500 trls. of Fancy was placed at \$3.80; two cars of Spring Extra sold at \$3.80. Other transactions occurred at inside quotations. The shipments of grain at this port up to the 4th inst., as compiled at the Port Warden's office, are as follows:
—Wheat, 1,005,384 bushels; peas, 663,673; corn, 600,466; oats, 625,093; barley, 37,226. British cablegrams to-day reported as follows:
—Wheat lirm, fair demand; offerings moderate: corn firm good demand; bijher prices asked, prevent business. Prices of wheat advanced 1d to 2d. California prompt shipment went from 3 and 7s 1d to 7s 2d and 7s 5d. Liverpool corn rose from 4s 5½d to 4s 6d.

GREEN FRUITS, ETC.—Business has continued fair. Valencia oranges have sold at \$9 to \$9.50 per case; in boxes, \$4.50 to \$5.50. Naples lemons, \$8 to \$8.50; fancy Messinas, \$6 per box; Palermos, \$5. Several car lots of bananas have been received, principally yellows, which are selling at \$1.50 to \$2 per bunch. Tomatoes have been scarce, but consignments are expected at the close of the week. Green apples are selling in large lots at \$3.25; jobbing lots of three to five barrels, \$3.50 There are no

peaches offering at present but some are arriving and will sell at \$3 to \$3.25 per box. Strawberries, 6c to 8c per quart. California plums, \$2.50 to \$2.75 per box; green Bartlett pears, \$5 per box. Carthagenia coacoa-nuts \$6 per 100; Baracons, \$4.50; green peanuts, choice, 6½c to 7c per lb; other sorts from 4c.


Groceres.—General business is moderate but improving; prospects for the near future fair. Tea.—There has been a good demand and sales show an increase, probably covering several thousand packages for the week. Low-grade Japans firm and enquired after; better kinds meet with rather slow sale; prices all round fairly steady. Arrivals of the new crop have not been large to date, consisting of a few lots of overland teas at high freight rates; other consignments, however, are en roule. It is feared in some quarters that tea may yet be subjected to rebellion duty. A tea letter dated Yokohama, June 19th, says:—Since the 5th inst. we have again to report an active market, and settlements during the period amount to 22,192 piculs; total settlements at this port for the season 79,189 piculs, against 79,635 at same date last season. At Kobe from the 2nd to the 17th instant settlements amount to 14,968 piculs, making the total settlements at that part 33,719 piculs, against 32,307 last season, a grand total at both ports this season of 112,008 piculs, against 109,718 total settlements at even date last season, showing an excess this season to date of 3,100 piculs. Arrivals from the country have been irregular; teas grading from and including fine and upwards are a trifle lower. Grades from good medium down are rough coarse leaf, much mixed and very dear at the quotations. Fine \$23 to \$24 per' picul; choicest \$32 to \$33 and upwards; good medium \$20 to \$22. Sugar.—The new duty will give

local refiners an advantage, as it virtually shuts out the low grades of imported. Prices here are substantially unchanged, so far as jobbing lots are concerned, but buyers of large quantities of granulated have secured advantages at the refineries. This is the season when a good demand is expected, and present prices should induce a large business. Fluctuations in this article of trade are frequent, and buyers will dowell to remember, now as always, that in reading market reports and conning over prices, in this and other publications, they are dealing with past events, and the facts contained do not necessarily hold good until the next issue of the paper. In this connection we have heard of trouble caused by mistrusting the statements of responsible wholesale merchants. Fruit.—No choice Valencies in the market. The opinion is spreading that the cholera ravages in Spain will seriously reduce the supply of the new crop. Rice, spices, etc., are quiet at quotations.

HAY, STRAW AND FEED.—Offerings of new hay are light and poor in quality with sales at \$6 to \$8. We quote choice timothy at \$13 and straw at \$5 to \$6. In pressed hay business is dull outside of the demand from exporters shipping cattle from here. The market is steady at \$16 to \$17 per ton; straw in bales, \$8 to \$9 per ton; shorts quiet at \$17 to \$18 per ton; bran weaker at \$14 to \$15, the former for Montreal and the latter for Upper Canada; moulic \$24 to \$26, as to quality buck wheat 65c per bushel.

Hides and Skins.—In consequence of competition among buyers, inspected city beef hides are 50c per 100 lbs higher, and a corresponding advance has been established on the cured and

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



Well on to a quarter of a million boxes of tin-plates have changed hands this week in the way of sales and re-sales, with individual lots turned a half-dozen times in some instances. The result of this is a material improvement in prices, but as yet the advance has been no more than natural conditions would justify, while indications are strongly in favor of a still further rise when the trade at large begin to realize the situation of the market. Coke plates, that have gone begging until recently at \$4.30 to \$4.40 per box, are now worth \$4.62\frac{1}{2}\$ to \$4.75 respectively in New York, and charcoal plates are up about 25c per box. Pig lead, which has been forced up to 4c per pound, is also under speculative control, but seems to be held with stubborn strength. Neither this article nor pigtin has the support of natural conditions that figure prominently in the advance on tin plate. Copper shares none of the strength prevailing in other metals.

LEATHER, BOOTS AND SHOES.—There is a steady demand for most descriptions of leather, but only small lots are ordered. Manufacturers have not got into the full swing of the fall trade as yet. The latter state that travellers find customers still inclined to buy sparingly and to delay the bulk of their orders. There is less stringency, however, and the September shipments promise to be large, if the crops turn out as expected. Leather is steadily held, leading holders being much less inclined to cut prices.

NAVAL STORES.—Ship supplies have not been in much request. Spirits of turpentine have advanced to 55c and 574c. Pine pitch, \$2.60 to \$3.75; tar ditto, \$3.50 to \$3.75; oakum, 6½ to 8c.



Oils Fish and Salt.—The movement of fish and other oils this week has been small, and prices are steady. Canned lobsters have been in good demand, and are higher, at \$5.60 to \$5.75; at present they cannot be laid down here at those figures. One firm had bids for over 1,000 cases at old quotations, but the orders could not be filled. There have been lurge sales of mackerel to arrive at about \$3.50. A leading house disposed of about 500 cases. The first Cape Breton herrings have arrived and sold at \$5 per brl. Salt is easy, Liverpool coarse being quoted at 46c. to 47½. for elevens, and 45c. for twelves. Factory-filled can be bought at \$1.10 to \$1.20 per bag. Eureka steady at about \$2.40. Canadian in small bags, \$3 to \$3.75.

Paints, Glass, Bricks, etc.—White and red lead has advanced about £2 per ton, on the other side, on account of the cholera in Spain where the lead ore is chiefly produced. Prices here firm, and inclined to move upwards. Glass is unchanged and quiet; buyers of a good round lot might secure better terms than quoted. Fire bricks are plentiful at the wharves and large purchasers can secure slightly better terms than quoted. Considerable lots of Carr's bricks have been placed. Corrected prices of bricks, cement, etc., will be found in the proper column.

Spinits and Tonacoo.—The new duties imposed to meet the expenses incurred in crushing the late rebellion in the far West have fallen particularly heavy on liquors and tobacco. 

BUTTER.—Prices have ruled very steady the past week. The supply has not been in excess of the demand, and fine fresh makes have sold well. Choice rolls in boxes and baskets sold at 12½c to 13c per lb., and medium at 10c to 11c. The export demand is slow. Sales of old tub have been made at 4c to 8c per lb., the former price for culls. Eigs are plentiful, and prices easier at 12c to 12½c per dozen in case lots. Cheese is rather firmer this week, there being a limited jobbing trade only at 8c to 8½c for fine qualities of new.

BOOTS AND SHOES.—Business is reported quiet and prices unchanged. Travellers are out with fall samples. The orders are fairly numerous, but they are, with few exceptions, for small lots. Factories are generally busy, and a good autumn trade is expected.


COAL OIL.—There is a moderate trade, and prices rule steady. Canadian sells at 15½ c per gallon for five to ten barrel lots and at 16c for single barrels. Carbon safety is easier at 18c. American oils steady, with sales of prime at 23c, and water white at 25c. Crude in Petrolia is higher at 82c to 83c, and refined at 11½ c per gallon in car lots.

Daugs.—There has been a fair trade the past week, and prices ruled steady. In some cases prices are higher, owing to the increased duty on alcohol. Turpentine is higher at 60c a gallon. Alcohol \$3.75 per barrel. Castor oil 9c to 11c; opium \$3.75 to \$3.90; glycerine, 17c to 20c; quinine, \$1.00 to \$1.05; morphia, \$2.25 to \$2.35; bicarbonate of potash, 18c; potass iodide, \$3.90 to \$4; tartaric acid, 55c to 60c; cream of tartar, 38c to 40c; linseed, raw, 65c; do, boiled, 66c to 67c; best Dutch madder, 12c to 14c; cochineal, 40c to 45c.

FLOUR AND GRAIN .- The flour trade has been dull this week, and prices somewhat easier. Buyers and sellers are apart, and transactions in car lots are nil. Holders are asking \$4 for superior extra and \$3.85 for extra, and although there is some enquiry these prices appear to be too high for buyers. Spring extras are quoted at \$3.75, and patents at \$4.25 to \$4.50. The stock in store is 3,125 barrels, as against 3,000 last week, and 2,300 at the corresponding period of last year, the corresponding period of last year. Wheat is dull and depressed, owing to lower markets in Britain; prices here are too high for export, but, being comparatively low, holders seem willing to wait. There were sales of a few car lots of No. 2 fall at 88c, which is the nominal price at the close. No. 1 spring is nominal at 89c, and No. 2 at 87c, On Monday 86c was bid for 10,000 bushels of the latter grade. On Tuesday a car of red winter sold at 88c, and a car of No. 2 goose at 74c. The closing is firmer. The stock in store is 225,515 bushels, as compared with 143,013 bush. 225,515 bushels, as computed with 143,013 bush. at the corresponding period of last year and 167,595 bush. in 1883. Bariey is dull and prices purely nominal. The stock in store is 11,047 bush as compared with 11,723 bush.last week and 2,548 bushels at the corresponding period of last year. Oats quiet, with sales of cur lots up till Tuesday at 35c on track. Since then they have offered at 34½c, with 34c bid. Stock in store 21,403 bush, as compared with 21,503 bush, last week, and 7,461 bushels at the corresponding week, that 1,401 bushess at the corresponding period of last year. Peas are quiet and prices-nominal at 66c to 67e for No. 2. Stock in store 12,076 bush, as compared with 1,213 bush, at the corresponding period of last year and 2,359 in 1883. Rye is purely nominal, with no stocks in store. Canadian Corn is nominally easier at 55. Outmeat quiet and prices unchanged at \$4.15 to \$4.20 for car lots; small lots sell at \$4.50. Bran is steady, with sales a few days ago at \$10.75 and closing at \$10.50 bid, with sellers at \$11.25.

GROCERIES.—Trade has been fair this week, with a few changes in quotations. Sugars are not as active as they should be; granulated sells at 74c. Fruits are easier; London layers \$2.50 to \$2.75; black baskets, \$3.25 to \$3.50; loose muscatel, \$2.25 to \$2.40; new sultamas, 6c to 64c. Pranes, Bosnia, 5c to 64c; do, French, 4c to 44c. Teas quiet and steady. Tobaccos are 8c higher, owing to increased duty; myrtle navy, 58c; solaces, 43c to 51c.

HIDES, ETC.—Hides are a little firmer, with prices nominal at 8½c to 9c for cured, stocks of which are limited. Green bring 8½c for steers and 8c for cows. Calfskins are unchanged; green are quoted at 11c to 13c, and cured at 14c to 15c. Pelts are in good demand and firmer, with purchasers at 35c. Lambskins are also, firmer at 40c. Tallow is quiet; rough is quoted at 3½c and rendered at 6½c.
