(A) INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATIONS AND AGREEMENTS

Agreements concluded:

1. Multilateral: Instrument for the Amendment of the Constitution of the International Labour Organization adopted by the 27th Session of the International Labour Conference at Paris, November 5, 1945. Came into force, September 26, 1946.
2. Multilateral: Final Act of the Conference of Representatives of Certain Governments Members of the Inter-Allied Reparation Agency to Consider the Question of the Treatment of German-Owned Patents held in London July 15-27, 1946. Signed at London, July 27, 1946.

Annexed to the Final Act is an Agreement concerning German-Owned Patents done July 27, 1946, and open for signature on behalf of Canada and all other Governments represented at the Conference until December 31, 1946.

3. Multilateral: At its 29th Session held in Montreal from September 19 to October 9, 1945, the International Labour Conference adopted the following Conventions and Recommendations which, under Article 19 of the I.L.O. Constitution, States Members are bound to bring before the authority or authorities within competence the matter lies, for the enactment of legislation or other action, within the period of one year at most from the closing of the session of the Conference, namely:

Convention concerning medical examination for fitness for employment in industry of children and young persons.

Convention concerning medical examination of children and young persons for fitness for employment of children and young persons.

Convention concerning restriction of night work of children and young persons in non-industrial occupations.

Convention for partial revision of Conventions adopted by the General Conference of the International Labour Organization in its first 28 sessions.

Recommendation concerning the medical examination for fitness for employment of children and young persons.

Recommendation concerning the restriction of night work of children and young persons in non-industrial occupations.

INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATIONS AND AGREEMENTS

Agreements concluded:

1. International: Instrument for the Amendment of the Constitution of the International Labour Organization adopted by the 27th Session of the International Labour Conference at Paris, November 8, 1945. Came into force, September 20, 1946.
2. International: Final Act of the Conference of Representatives of Certain Government Members of the Inter-Liaison Association Agency to Consider the Question of the Treatment of German-Guest Workers held in London July 15-27, 1946, signed at London, July 27, 1946.
3. International: Annexed to the Final Act is an Agreement concerning German-Guest Workers done July 27, 1946, and open for signature on behalf of Canada and all other Governments represented at the Conference until December 31, 1946.
4. International: At its 25th Session held in Montreal from September 12 to October 2, 1945, the International Labour Conference adopted the following Conventions and Recommendations which, under Article 19 of the I.L.O. Constitution, States Members are bound to bring before the authority or authorities within competence the matter, for the enactment of legislation or other action, within the period of one year at most from the closing of the session of the Conference, namely:
  1. Convention concerning medical examination for fitness for employment in industry of children and young persons.
  2. Convention concerning medical examination of children and young persons for fitness for employment in industry of children and young persons.
  3. Convention concerning restriction of night work of children and young persons in non-industrial occupations.
  4. Convention for partial revision of Conventions adopted by the General Conference of the International Labour Organization in its First 28 sessions.
  5. Recommendation concerning the medical examination for fitness for employment of children and young persons.
  6. Recommendation concerning the restriction of night work of children and young persons in non-industrial occupations.

4. Multilateral: The 27th International Labour Conference also adopted, on October 9, an Instrument for the Amendment of the Constitution of the International Labour Organization which, when ratified or accepted by two-thirds of the Members of the Organization, including five of the eight Members which are represented on the Governing Body as Members of chief industrial importance, will enter into force for all States Members.
