I. Apartial Eclipse of the Sun, February 2, 1859, invisible in Nova Scotia.

II. A total Eclipse of the Moon visible in Nova Scotia on the 17th February, 1859.

Moon enters Penumbra	3h. 47m., morning.
Moon enters Shadow	4 43
Beginning of Total Phase	5 - 39

V. A total Eclipse of the Moon, August 12-13, 1859, invisible in Nova Scotia.

VI. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, August 27, 1859, invisible in Nova Scotia.

Mean Obliquity of the Ecliptic at Noon at Washington, January 1st, 1859, 23° 27' 26.81".

# MORNING AND EVENING STARS.

VENUS will be a Morning Star until October 8, and then an Evening Star till the end of the year.

MARS will be an Evening Star till July 26, then a Morning Star tithe end of the year.

JUPITER will be an Evening Star till June 26, and then a Mornin Star till the end of the year.

SATURN will be an Evening Star till August 10, and then a Moring Star till the end of the year.

The following signs are used in our Almanack to denote the different positions and phases of the moon. D denotes the Moon in the first quadrature, -that is, the quadrature between change and full. @ denotes the Moon in the last quadrature,—that is, the quadrature between full and change. @ denotes New Moon. O denotes Full Moon.

When viewed through a telescope, the surface of the Moon appears wouderfully diversified. Large dark spots, supposed to be excavations or valleys, are visible to the eye: some parts also appear more lucid than the general surface. These are ascertained to be mountains, by the shadows which they cast. Maps of the Moon's surface have been drawn, on which most of these valleys and mountains are delineated, and names are given to them. Some of these excavations are thought to be four miles deep and forty wide. A high ridge generally surrounds them, and often a mountain rises in the centre.

NOTE.-It is to be observed that throughout the Calender pages the Computations are in Mean Time, with the exception of the rising and setting of the Sun. Also that the Sun and Moon's declinations are given for the Meredian of Greenwich.

### NOTES OF THE MONTH.

JANUARY was placed as leader of the months by Numa Pompilius when he added two months (January and February) to the Alban Kalender, though it was not admitted to the same precedence in this country until a subsequent period. The name is derived from Janus, the God of the year in Roman Mythology, to whom the day was sacred.

The idel Janus was placed over the gate of a temple at Rome, and was represented with two faces—the one, that of an old man, being typical of his retrospect of the past, and the other, a youthful countenance, denoting prospect of the future.

#### AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

The first and most important thing for the farmer in this month is to attend to his horses, cattle and swine. Let them be housed at night and in stormy weather. See that the stables are cleaned, the yards dry and well littered, the sheds warm and yet well ventilated. If hay is scarce, and labour is cheaper than fodder, it may be cut and mixed with chopped straw, corn stubble, meal, bran, grain or roots; take care, at all events, that no fodder is wasted. Cut up a few potatoes or turnips for sheep, and mix a little salt with them. If there be sufficient snow, haul home wood for fuel and fences. Logs may be taken to the mill and made into boards for future use. Repair your tools, vehicles and implements, when obliged to stay indoors. Thrash grain, clean seeds, and take farm produce to market. They every opportunity of chopping and preparing new land for a crop. This is a him good time for breaking steers and colts, and making tenons and mortices in fence stuff.

#### NOTES OF THE MONTH.

FEBRUARY was made the Second of the Months also by Numa Pompilius. Its name was derived either from Februa,—a title which the Romans gave to the Feralia Sacrifices—or more probably from Februs, to purify, because this being originally held to be the last month of the year, the people offered an explatory sacrifice for their twelve mouths sin.

#### AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Continue to attend to the stock: remember that by keeping animals warm, you economise the food which would otherwise be applied to sustain the heat of the body. Curry the cattle and horses. Lice, which accumulate on over-crowded cattle, may now be destroyed by tobacco-juice, snuff, lard, fish oil or soap. Hens will lay all winter, if their houses be impervious to cold winds, and if with their grain they receive a supply of gravel and old mortar. Continue the hauling of fuel and fencing-stuff; cut up as much of the former as possible, and pile it away under cover for summer use. Finish the thrashing of grain, and stow it away beyond the reach of rat, mouse or weevil. Prepare for making maple sugar. Take advantage of this season for hauling peat, swamp-muck, sea, river or pond mud, for making composts of. Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,—the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Keep calves warm, clean and dry; give hay and sliced roots in addition to liquid food to such as are rearing. Lay up stores of seed corn, put implements into working tring.

#### AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Make maple sugar. No trees of less than twelve or eighteen inches in diameter ought to be tapped: they should be bored with an inch augur; all the vessels used should be perfectly clean; the sap should be first strained and reduced by boiling nineteen-twentieths of its bulk, then clarified by white of egg, boiled and strained again; and then put it into pans till it grains; after this, dry it by placing it in wooden drains filled with gimlet holes. Look well to the cattle, and give those with young an extra feed or mash occasionally. Manure may be hauled from town or elsewhere. Take every opportunity of hauling wood, and of carting manure to the fields. Let the yard be cleaned at regular times and new littered. Early lambs for market should appear in March, but very great care is required to preserve them.

# AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

The farm should be plotted and each field assigned its crop for the year. Manure should be all got out while the hauling is good. The cattle should not be allowed to wander on the road, fields or meadows, which does no good to themselves, and much injury to the land. Let the drains be overhauled and cleared out. Continue the cutting, splitting and piling of wood. Prune and remove dead limbs and branches of fruit trees, bushes and shrubs. Scrape off moss from apple trees, and cut off black nobs from plum trees. All kinds of fruit and forest trees may now be safely transplanted. Transplanting must always be done before the leaves are out or after they have fallen; if a tree is covered with leaves when it is transplanted, the evaporation by their surface is so great, that the vital moisture of the plant would be all dissipated before the roots had begun to absorb water from the soil. Break up the garden and sow the early vegetables. Commence ploughing in dry situations and on sod land as soon as the frost will allow.

The Anglo-Saxons knew it as Trimilchi, because their cows, stimulated by the fresh herbage, were so productive of milk as to enable the proprietors to bring them with advantage to the pail three times a day. The Romans offered sacrifices to Bona Dea, or Maia, on the first day of the month.

#### AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Set about ploughing the land. Early spring ploughing is the best for sod land, as the frost both pulverizes it and kills the weeds. Sow grass and plant the root crops. Steep and sow the grain crops. Corn may be sown after the grain crops and clover. Turn out the sheep and cattle, but not before the land is tolerably dry and the young grass has appeared. Cart out the remainder of the manure, and clear up the farm yards. Manure will waste as much in the heap in one season as in the ground, and for the first you get nothing, for the other a great deal. Towards the close of the month the meadow lands may be top-dressed with compost, gypsum or other manure. Mark spots for future drainage. Beets, mangold-wurtzel, and swedes may be sown with advantage after the other crops. Peas, beans, onions, turnips, carrots, parsnips, potatoes, radishes and spinach may be sown in garden and fields. Cabbages, cucumbers, cauliflower, lettuce, radishes tomatoes, and peppers may be planted out. Hedges and shrubs may be trimmed.

Finish sowing and planting. The seed-end of potatoes, cut rather deep, will yield the best crop. Ruta-bagas, or Swedes, may be sown after the potatoes. Four or five pounds of seed are not too much for an acre,-that will allow some for the

insect and some for the land. Transplant so as to fill up spots where crops seem to fail. Hoe, or set the cultivator going among the corn and root crops. Weed the garden, the grain and root crops, otherwise it will be fifty times more troublesome later in the season and next year. Weedy fields may be ploughed for summer fallow. Buckwheat land ought to be prepared. The earlier the chopped land can be well burnt the better. Prune, trim and transplant trees. After transplanting, the soil should be rendered mellow and rich by mucking in for a considerable distance around; choose a moist or rainy day for the operation. Remove or destroy insects, lice and caterpillars on fruit-trees. Plant out cabbages. Transplant wild plants, bringing with them a portion of the natural soil

## NOTES OF THE MONTH.

July, the fifth month of the Roman Calendar, received the name of Quintilius to denote its numerical position. It was sacred to Jupiter, and had in the Alban Calendar thirty-six days. Romulus took from it five days; Numa reduced it to thirty; but Julius Casar enlarged it to thirty-one, the present number. In honor of this conqueror, Mark Antony changed its name from Quintilius to Julius,—hence our July. Our Saxon forefathers named it 'Hay-month,' since this was the time of their harvest.

# AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Hoe and weed corn, potatoes and all other crops; run the cultivator through them when the opportunity offers. Buckwheat and even turnips may be sown as late as July. Make early preparation for harvesting; repair barns, vehicles and tools. Get the best tools in the market: a man may earn the extra cost of a good seythe or cradle in a single day's work. Procure a horse rake, by means of which one man with a steady horse can do the work of seven or eight men. Clover should be cut while it is in full bloom. Timothy and red-top do not ripen till a fortnight after clover: they should be cut while the seed is in full milk, and before it is so ripe as to shake out when handled. Weeds should be cut down or rooted out before seeding; transplant cabbages and turnips in field or garden; gather flowering herbs, and dry quickly in the sun.

#### AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Finish hoeing and weeding, and prepare for grain harvest. Wheat, oats, and barley are generally cut this month: the best ought to be set aside for seed, and allowed to ripen fully while standing. The grain intended for consumption should be cut while still soft for not only is the flour better, but there is much less loss and waste in harvesting the orops. Lowland hay may be cut and made into stacks. If there is time, it is much better at once to get the low meadow hay beyond the reach of the river than to wait till winter. Make drains where required; gather seed and herbs; destroy seeds wherever they are to be seen; remove balls from potatoe vines, if thought necessary. Fall wheat may be sowed. If grain harvest be finished, fall ploughing for next season may be begun. A good farmer will plough all summer long. Don't burn too soon, or the trouble will be greatly increased.

The Anglo Saxons called it Berst monash.

# AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Carry on the harvesting of grain, corn and root crops. Neglect not fall ploughing for a single day. Draining ought to be gone on with: let the drains be from 30 to 36 inches in depth, and placed about 20 feet apart. Grain may now be field thrashed. Do not take up the potatoes until the vines have been killed by the frost, and are perfectly dry; keep them from sun and wet, and allow them to dry before housing; let them be stored away in barrels or binns well protected from air. Early apples may be gathered by hand, wiped, and put away into binns or barrels, taking care not to bruise them: they should be kept in a dry, cold cellar, or upper room, where the temperature is not below the freezing point: should they, by any means, get frozen, they should be kept covered, so as to let them thaw gradually. Trees must be budded in this month. N. E. farmers generally sow grass seed (not clover) as early as possible after the summer crop. This is, likewise, a good time for the cow to go to the bull. Rams, again, should be removed from the sheep until the end of November or December.

# AGRICULTURE EOR THE MONTH.

Continue draining, fall ploughing, and securing corn and root crops. When potatoes are to be stored in a field, a dry, sandy spot should be chosen, on which they are to be laid in heaps, then put a layer of straw over them; thatch them carefully, and cover the whole with earth: two small orifices should be left, the one on the top, and the other at the bottom; these should be closed with a wisp of straw, and opened occasionally, to permit the access of fresh air. If the soil of the field is a wet clay, a ditch ought to be dug round the spot where the roots are to be laid. Turnips may be either stored in a root house, or put in pits three feet in breadth, and covered with straw and earth as above. Cull out the choicest animals for breeding and for use; sell or fatten the remainder. Trees may be set out for the ensuing spring as soon as the leaves have fallen, and the buds are fairly formed. Small seedlings, however, are best transplanted in the spring. Fruit trees may be propagated by layers or cuttings.

# AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Preparations must now be made for a long and severe winter. The summer vehicles and implements should be dried, cleaned and stowed away. The fences should be put in order, so that none of the fields may be exposed to the poaching of cattle, sheep or hogs. The farmer should walk about daily with a hammer and a pocket full of nails, patching and repairing the barns and sheds where they require it. The barn should be well bedded with turf, peat, muck, straw, sawdust, weeds, or other vegetable matters, at the same time it should be so constructed that the soluble dart of the manure, which is the best, shall not be lost. Finish digging and storing of roots and the fall ploughing. One good ploughing of clay land in the fall is worth two or three in the spring. Husk the corn: examine and make cuts for the drainage of surface water: underground drains are preferable to surface cuts.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Stock now requires increased attention: they should be stall-fed for the winter, if possible, or put up in yards with a warm aspect, and with sheds attached whereto they can resort in stormy seasons: they should be supplied with plenty of water and salt, and fed about three times every day, and curried regularly. The sow may be taken to the boar in this month, and the ram allowed to return to the flock again. The Farmer may now thrash grain, take his produce to market; the good wife ought to have her quota ready of cheese, butter, fowls, hams sausages, mittens, socks, cloth, wool, and feathers; these are all as good as money in town. Let all accounts be settled and debts paid. Every farmer ought to keep a book wherein he records his operations, and notes the effect of different kinds and quantities of manure, seed, &c.

# POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT.

RATES, AND TIMES OF CLOSING MAILS, &C.

The Mails for the United Kingdom are closed finally at Halifax every alternate Thursday Evening at 8 o'clock. Letters, &c., for England, which may be dropped into the box after the hour of closing and up to the arrival of the Packet, will be forwarded in a bag, loose—but such letters cannot be prepaid, either in money or stamps. The Royal Mail Steamers leave Boston for Halifax and Liverpool, G. B., every alternate Wednesday, arrive at Halifax on Thursday evening or very early the succeeding morning, leaving Halifax immediately after receiving the Mails.

Letters to or from England, 71.2d., prepayment optional:—can be prepaid by using a 6d. or two 3d. Stamps, together with half of a three-penny Stamp cut diagonally. Newspapers free.

The Postage on Books from Great Britain to Nova Scotia, or vice versa, is at the rate of 7½d. currency, if not exceeding ½ lb; exceeding ½ lb, and not exceeding ½ lb, 1s. 3d.; and so on adding 1s. 3d. for every additional pound or fraction of a pound. One book package may contain separate Books, Publications, Almanacks, and Maps and Paper, Parchment or Vellum; the latter three materials may be written or printed on—the package may contain the name and address of the sender. Rollers may accompany prints and maps, and markers may be sent with books. No letter must be sent with or written on a book package, and no such package must exceed two feet in length, width or depth. The Postage must in all cases be prepaid by Stamps.

Closed Mails for the United Kingdom ria United States are made up at Halifax to meet the Steamers leaving New York for Liverpool. Letters to be specially addressed "via New York." Letters 10d.; Newspapers 1d. each.

The Mails for the United States via Boston, per Royal Mail Steamers are Made up on Tuesday Evening of the week in which the Packet from England is due, at 8 o'clock. Should the Steamer not arrive by 6 o'clock the following morning, supplementary Mails will be made up. Should the Steamer from Liverpool arrive previous to Tuesday night—the Mails as heretofore will close immediately on her arrival.

A closed mail for Canada is made up and forwarded at the same time in charge of the British Officer. Letters so forwarded must be specially addressed "Closed Mail for Canada," postage 7½; viz. 5d. Packet Rate, and 2½d. Colonial Rate—prepayment optional.

The Mails for Bermuda and the West Indies are made up finally at Halifax on the Thursday evening of the week in which the Royal Mail Steamer is expected to arrive from Boston, at 8 o'clock. Letters 5d.—when posted in the interior, 3d. additional, which must be prepaid. Newspapers 1½d. each, which must be paid by stamp.

Letters are forwarded via Bermuda for Chagres and the Pacific, Chili, and Peru, Havana, Honduras, Laguyra, Mexico, Venezuela, and the British and Foreign West India Islands. Postage to Foreign West Indies, 5d. when posted at Halifax; 3d. additional when posted in the interior—must be prepaid. Newspapers 1½d. each, to be pre-paid by stamp at the time of Posting.

All letters are charged by weight, and a uniform rate of postage of 3d. on a letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight has been established throughout British North America. To any part of the United States 6d.; to Oregon and California 9d.—prepayment optional.

Letters posted in any town within the Province for delivery in the same town are liable to a rate of one penny for every half ounce.

Newspapers pass free to any part of the Province, British North America (Newfoundland and Bermuda excepted) and the United States when sent by land mail—to be put up in covers open at the ends.

Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Handbills, and other printed matter of a like description, put up in covers open at the ends, and without any written communication, may be sent from any part of the Province to any place within the same, as well as through Nova Scotia, at the rate of 1d. per oz.—prepayment optional, except when addressed to the United States, in which case the postage must be prepaid.

Pamphlets, Magazines, Periodicals, or Books, bound or unbound, done up in covers open at the ends, unaccompanied by any written communication, may be transmitted as above mentioned, through the mail, in this Province: not exceeding 2 oz. in weight, free; 2 oz. and not 3, 1d.; 3 oz. and not 4, 1½d.; 4 oz. and not 5, 2d.; adding ½d. for every additional ounce up to 48 oz., beyond which weight they cannot be sent by mail.

British reprints of copyright works from the United States, by land mail or steamer, charged letter postage.

For Dartmouth daily, postage one penny.

For Musquodoboit Harbor, every Tuesday morning, at 9 o'clock. Return Mail due on Monday afternoon, at 5 o'clock.

For Prospect on Saturday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. Return Mail due on Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

For Ketch Harbor and Sambro on Friday evening, at 10 o'clock. Return Mail due on Saturday.

Letters for Registry, must be posted half an hour previous to the closing of the mail by which they are to be forwarded, and the postage as well as the registration fee, must be prepaid.

Letters prepaid by Stemps, and dropped into the Letter Box during the night, and up to 5 o'clock, A. M., will be forwarded by the mails despatched same morning.

When the mails from England arrive before 9 P.M., they are delivered the same evening, and after that hour, at 7 next morning.

All other mails arriving before 7 P. M., will be delivered the same evening,—if after that hour and before 8, at 6 o'clock,—and if after 8, at 7 o'clock the following morning.

The Postmaster-General is not liable for the loss of any letter or pack-

age, unless such loss should arise from his own default.

## PACKETS FROM HALIFAX.

The Steamers for England arrive from the United States at Cunard's Wharf fortnightly, that is about midnight every other Thursday, and the same week the Steamer from England arrives and proceeds to Boston. Messrs. Cunard & Co. have also Steam Packets running to Bermuda and St. John's, N. F.,—the latter touches at Sydney.

The Steamer Eastern State leaves Brown's Wharf every other Tuesday for Boston, and touches at Yarmouth on the way. Messrs. Young and Hart have two Packets running continually to Boston, viz., the barque Halifax and the brig Boston; the latter is commanded by Capt.

A packet runs between Halifax and Liverpool, Queen's Co., leaving Cronan's Wharf occasionally through the month.

## RAIL WAYS.

# BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.

The construction of this Road as a Public Provincial undertaking was authorized by Act passed March 31, 1854, and a subsequent act of the same session provided for obtaining the necessary funds for building them, by authorizing the contracting of a loan by issuing debentures on the pledge of the Revenues of the Province—bearing interest at 6 per cent, and redeemable in twenty years.

The work was commenced on the main line June 13, 1854, and the Windsor Branch in July 1855, and is still in progress. In February 1855 the first four miles from Halifax was opened for travel. On July 27 the road was opened to Bedford 8 miles from Halifax. In January 1857 an additional 142 miles, extending to Schultz's or Grand Lake Station, was brought into use, and on the 3rd of February 9 miles, extending to the Truro Road crossing was opened, making 31 miles of the main line completed.

It is expected that by November first the line through to Truro will be fully completed for travel. The length of the Road to Windsor, is 36 6'10th miles from the Junction,—the entire length to Truro 61 2-10th miles.

The Average cost of the Main Line and Windsor Branch is £11,043 16s. 4d., per mile; the average cost of the New York Railways is £12,698 4s. 4d.—the estimate of the total cost of the N. S. Railway and its equipments to Windsor and Truro is £1,024,866 7s. 23d.

# HACKNEY OARRIAGES.

[Extract from an Ordinance of the City, passed July 7th, 1851.]

Any person or persons having a license in full force, who shall stand his carriage in any other than its appointed place or manner,—or not having it properly numbered, -or any driver, or person in charge of a licensed carriage, who shall not produce the table of fares and distances when thereto required, or who being upon his stand disengaged, shall refuse to convey any person seeking to employ him, -or who shall in any way violate this Ordinance, shall for each offence, besides being liable to have his license revoked, forfeit and pay such a fine as under and by virtue of this Ordinauee may be adjusted against him. And the owner or driver of any such carriage who shall demand or extort from any person or persons a sum beyond the rate of fare herein established, or hereafter to be established, may be so fined, and shall forthwith forfeit the license for such carriage, and be liable to refund to the party grieved the sum so extorted, with cost of prosecution. Livery stable keepers, not occupying the stands of said City, are exempt from this Ordinance; further than that they are hereby required to obtain a license for each carriage they shall use to convey persons for hire, within the limits of the City; which license shall continue in force and be renewed as aforesaid, and the carriage shall be numbered, and have the letter L, besides its number, painted or placed on it as aforesaid.

# TRUCKMENS' REGULATIONS.

Extract from an Ordinance of the City, passed July 7, 1851.

8. If any Licensed Truckman, being on his Stand, shall refuse or neglect to cart, truck, or employ his horse and cart, truck, or sled, within the said City of Halifax, for any person, when requested, he shall, for each offence, forfeit and pay the sum of ten shillings.

21. The following shall be the Table of Rates and Prices of Truckage payable to or to be demanded by the Truckmen of the City of Halifax, for their services; subject, however, to be altered from time to time, by resolution of the City Council:

## FERRIES TO DARTMOUTH.

#### SOUTH FERRY.

From 6 o'clock in the morning till 9 in the evening, the Boat leaves at a quarter before and a quarter after each hour, and after 9 o'clock two boats, viz: one at 9h. 20m., and last boat 10 o'clock.

The Ferry Boat on Sundays runs as follows: commencing at 6h. 20m., in the morning from Halifax, 40m. between each trip until 11, then leaves again at 1 o'clock, and 1h. 40m., and 2h. 15m., and then a quarter before and a quarter after each hour until 6—then every 40m. until a quarter past 8, then at a quarter to 9 and 9h. 20., and last boat at 10 P.M.

#### NORTH FERRY.

Leaves Halifax side every half hour from 6 o'clock in the morning, last boat at 7 o'clock in the evening. No boat on Sunday.

On account of the two Ferry boats the communication between Halifax and Dartmouth is very regular, there being one boat every quarter of an hour leaving the Dartmouth side up to 7 in the evening, when the only communication is by the South Ferry.

#### LIGHT HOUSES

On the Coast of Nova Scotia, and on the Coast of New Brunswick in the Bay of Fundy.

Meagher's Beach—East Side Halifax harbor. A fixed light.

SAMBRO ISLAND—Western entrance Halifax harbor. A fixed light.

Devil's Island—An Octogonal Light Beacon on the S. W. point of Devil's Island, at the entrance of the Eastern passage to Halifax harbour, and exhibits a red light on the seaward sides, to distinguish it from Sambro and Meagher's Beach lights; stands forty-five feet above high water mark; rise and fall six feet. The Tower painted dark brown, with a white belt between the Balcony and Lantern, to distinguish it in day time.

Cross Island—Entrance to Lunenburg harbor. Two lights—flash light above; fixed light below.

LIVERPOOL—South end of Coffin's Island. A plain, revolving light.

FORT POINT harbor light, at the head of Liverpool harbor, southern entrance of the river. A bright, fixed light, visible from all points of approach, and must be left on the larboard hand, when entering the harbor.

PORT MEDWAY—Beacon Light on Admiralty Head, west side of the entrance of the port. Building square, painted white with black square in the centre of the seaward sides, plain white light, forty feet above sea level, and stands within thirty fathoms of the shore.

Shelburne—McNutt's Island. Two fixed lights—one above the other.

Barrington—Baccora Point, east side of the entrance to Barrington Bay. A flash light of fifteen seconds.

YARMOUTH—West Side of the harbor. A plain, revolving light.

CAPE SABLE, SEAL ISLAND—The first light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South point of Seal Island. A plain, white light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen, on approaching the Island, from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde rock, lies about three and one-third miles S. by W., by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

BRIAR ISLAND—A plain, white light, situate about half a mile N. E.

from the N. W. point of the Island.

WESTPORT—Peter's Island, at the south entrance of the east side of the Bay of Fundy. Two white lights, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Briar Island light, at an elevation of forty feet above high-water mark.

DIGBY GUT LIGHT—On the west side of Digby Gut, from Briar Island north-eastward. This light is chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. Afixed, white light.

BLACK ROCK LIGHT-On the southern shore of the Bay of Fundy.

A fixed, white light.

HORTON BLUFF LIGHT—In the Basin of Minas, ninety-five feet above sea level, high-water; rise and fall forty to forty-five feet. Building, square, painted white; stands sixty feet from the Bluff, and shows a white light, which may be seen in clear weather, over the greatest part of the Basin of Minas, (after passing Cape Blowmedon), and above the Five Island, and up Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it.

APPLE RIVER LIGHT—North Side of the entrance to Apple River, in the Chignecto, or Cumberland Bay. Two fixed lights, placed horizontally.

Partridge Island River—An Octagnal light beacon, on the west side of the entrance to Partridge Island River, Parrsborough, on the north side of the Basin of Minas, and exhibits a plain, white light, at an elevation of thirty feet above high water; rise and fall about forty-five feet; the Tower is white, and stands close to high water mark on the beach. Vessels can only enter the harbor at high water, and must lie aground on the soft bottom when the tide is low.

EASTERN BEAVER, OR WILLIAM'S ISLAND—A revolving light.

CANSEAU, CRANBERRY ISLAND—Two fixed lights, one above the other.

WEST SIDE OF THE GUT OF CANSEAU—A fixed light.

EDDY, OR SAND POINT LIGHT—On Eddy, or Sand Point, on the west side of the south entrance to the Strait of Canseau, distinguished by two white lights, placed horizontally, twenty-five feet above the sea level. Building square, painted white, with a black diamond on the seaward side.

GUYSBOROUGH HARBOR BEACON—On the west side of the entrance to the harbor, head of Chedabucto Bay. A fixed light.

PICTOU LIGHT—On the south-east side of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed light.

Pictou Island Light—On the S. E. point of the Island. Building square, and painted white. A fixed light, fifty-two feet above high-water mark.

ARICHAT BEACON—A Light on Point Morichi, on the south-east side of the southern entrance to the harbor. Building square, painted white. A white light, thirty-four feet above the searlevel.

LOUISBURG—On the east tide of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed

Low Point Light—East Side of Sydney, C. B., harbor. A fixed

Sea-Wolf, or Margarie Island Light—Situate on the N. W. side of the Island of Cape Breton, nearly midway between Port Hood and Cheticamp harbors, and distant from Cape Breton two and a-half miles. A plain, white light. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted white, near the centre and summit of the Island. The lantern is 298 feet above sea level—visible from all points of approach. To vessels in proximity to the Island, the light may become observed by the abrupt cliffs or sides of the Island, which may serve as a guide to tack or anchor by, as hundreds of vessels find anchorage on the southeast side. The chief landing is near the south-west end, in shore, where a few fishing stages and boats are kept in use during the fishing season.

PORT HOOD LIGHT—Changed from white to red, when seen from the the northern entrance, to distinguish it from the Margarie and North Canso lights.

WHITE HEAD ISLAND LIGHT—On the S. W. point of White Head Island. The tower is square, painted white, standing seventy-five fathoms from the water's edge, with an Octagonal Iron Lantern, sixty feet above sea level at high-water; rise and fall, six feet. The light is distinguished by bright flasnes, of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of ten seconds, displaying alternately three flashes and three eclipses in a minute. The light will not be totally obscured during the eclipse.

FLINT ISLAND LIGHT—On Flint Island, on the eastern coast of Cape Breton. Lat. 40° 11′ 5″ N., and Long. 59° 45′ 20″ W., and exhibits a a bright, flash light, every fifteen seconds, visible from all points of the compass. The light is sixty-five feet above sea level, and can be seen at the distance of twelve miles.

St. Paul's Island—A fixed light on the north-east end, and a flash light on the south-west end.

Scattarie Island—A revolving light on the east end of the Island. Iron-bound Island Light—Off the entrance to LaHave River. A bright, flash light, of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of thirty seconds. The lantern is placed on a square, wooden tower, painted white, on the southern side of the Island, and is visible from all points of approach. Elevation seventy-five feet above sea-level.

RAGGED ISLAND HARBOR LIGHT—On Gull Rock, off the entrance of the harbor. Building square and painted white, exhibiting a clear, fixed light, at an elevation of fifty-one feet above the sea-level, and is situated in Lat 43° 39′ N. and Long. 64° 66′ W.

Publico Harbor Light—A Beacon Light on the S. E. side of the entrance to Publico Harbor, situate on the E. side of the entrance to the Bay of Fundy, about thirteen miles northerly of Cape Sable. Building square, painted white. A fixed, red light, on the seaward side, twenty-eight feet above high water level, (rise and fall twelve feet,) and stands fifty fathoms from low-water mark. The point of beach is bold.

of the to the tilding wentystands A Fog Bell has been erected on the E. Cape of Yarmouth harbor, a few feet to the southward of the Light House, and about one and a quarter miles from the extreme outer point of the Cape. Strikes seven times per minute.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. A white, flash light, twenty seconds dark, and forty seconds light, in each minute. Building painted in stripes, vertical, black and white. Between the northernmost and southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them almost above water, and extend eastward from the Light House about four miles. From this range further westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bull—this may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

Machias Seal Islands, forty-five feet above high-water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance, of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both buildings painted white. Vessels standing to the northward between these lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights iuto one, as they will be, then, not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledgss, if more than five miles to the E. of the lights.

Head Harbor Light—Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain, white light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbor Light, placed on the N. E. extremity of Campo Bello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels, also, at all times to enter Head Harbor. A fixed, white light. Building painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights—Upon this projecting headland, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful; both are *fixed* and *white*. Building painted *red* and *white*, in stripes, five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light—At the entrance of the river and harbor of St. John, N. B. A fixed, white light. The building painted red and white, in vertical stripes.

Quaco Light—A revolving, white light, placed on a small rock, off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. Building painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

CAPE Enrage Light—On the point of that name in Westmoreland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbor, N. S. Building painted white, about 120 feet above the tide mark. A plain, white light.

West Quoddy Light—This is an American light, placed on the west side of the entrance entrance in the St. Croix, by Lubec and Eastport.




