The following signs are used in our Almanack to denote the different positions and phases of the moon. D denotes the Moon in the first quadrature,- - that is, the quadrature between chamge and full. $\mathbb{A}$ denotes the Mom in the last quadrature,- that is, the quadrature between full and change. denotes New Moon. Odenotes Full Moon.

Whan viewed through a telescone, the surface of the Moon appears wouderfully diversified. Large dark spots, suppoed to be excavations or vallows, are visible to the eye: some part atso appear more lacid then the seneral surface. These are ascertained to be mountains, by the shatows which they cast. Maps of the Moon's surface have been drawn, on which most of these valleys and mountains are delineated, and names are given to them. Some of these excavations are thought to he four miles deep and forty wide. A high ridge generally surrounds them, and often a mountain rises in the centre.

## NOTES OF TIIE MONTH

January was placed as leader of the months by Numa Pompilius when he added two months (January and February) to the Alban Kalender, though it was not admitted to the same precedenco in this country until a subsequent period. The name Is derived from Jantes, the God of the year in Roman Mytbology, to whom the day was sacred.
The idol Janus was placed over the gate of a temple at Rome, and was represtented with two faces-the one, that of an old man, being typical of his retrospect of the past, and the other, a youthful countonance, denoting prospect of the future.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

The first and most important thing for the farmer in this month is to attend to his horses, cattle and swine. Let them bo housed at night and in stormy weather. See that the stables are cleancd, the yards dry and woll littered, the sheds warm and yet well ventilated. If hay is scarce, and labour is cheaper than fodder, it may be cut and mixəd with chopped straw, corn stubble, meal, bran, grain or roots; tako care, at all events, that no fodder is wasted. Cut up) a few potatoes or turnips for sheep, and mix a little salt with them. If there be sufficient snow, haul home wood for fuel and fences. Logs may be taken to the mill and made into boards for future use. Lipair your tools, vehicles and implemente, when obliged to stay indoors. Thrash grain, clean seeds, and take farm produce to market. PThe every opportunity of chopping and preparing new land for a crop. This is alseg good time for breakinge steers and colts, and making tenons and mortices in fence stuff.

Its name was derived either from Februs,-a title which the Romans gave to the Feralla Sacrifices-or more probably from Februs, th purify, becange this heing originally held to be the last month of the year, the people offered an explatory sacriflce for their twelve months sin.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTII.

Continue to attend to the stock: remember that by keeping animals warm, you economise the food which would otherwise be applied to sustain the heat of the body. (urry the cattle and horses. Lice, which accumulate on over-crowded catthe, may now he destroyed by tobacco-juice, snuff, lard, flsh oil or soap. Hens will lay all winter, if their houses be impervious to cold winds, and if with their grain they recelve a supply of sravel and old mortar. Continue the hauling of fuel and fincing-stuff; cut up as much of the former as possible, and pile it away under coser for summer use. Finish the thrashing of grain, and stow it away beyond the ruach of rat, mouse or weevil. Prepare for making maple sugar. Takeadvantage of this season for hauling peat, swamp-muck, sea, river or pond mud, for making composts of. Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,- the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Kepp calves warm, clean and dry; give hay and sliced root: in addition t.) liquid food t., such as are rearing. Lay up stores of seed corn, put implements into working trins

## 1859.] MARCH 31 Days. <br> AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Maks mayle sugar. Nio trees of less than twelve or eighteen inches in diameter ought to be tapped: they should be bored with an inch augur; all the vessels used should be perfectly clean; the sap should be first'strained and reduced by boiling nineteen-twentieths of its bulk, then clarifled by white of egg, boiled and strained again; and then put it into pans till it grains; after this, dry it by placing it in wooden drains filled with gimlet holes. Look well to the cattle, and give those with young an extra feed or mash occasionally. Manure may be hauled from town or elsewhere. Take every opportunity of hauling wood, and of carting manure to the flelds. Let the yard be cleaned at regular times and new littered. Early lambs for market should appear in March, but very great care is required to freserve them.

## AgRICULTURE FOR TIIE MONTH.

The farm should be plotted and each field assigned its crop for the year. Manure should be all got out while the hauling is good. The cattle should not be allowed to wander on the road, fields or meadows, which does no good to themselves, and much injury to the land. Let the drains he overhauled and oleared out. Continue the cutting, splitting and piling of wood. Prune and remove dead limbs and branches of fruit trees, hushes and shrubs. Scrape off moss from apple trees, and cut off black nobs from plum trees. Ayl kinds of fruit and forest trees may now be safely transplanted. Tramsplanting must always be done before the leaves are out or after they have fallen; if a tree is covered with leaves when it is transplanted, the evaporation by their surface is so great, that the vital moisture of the plant would be all dissipated before the roots had begun to absorb water from the soil. Break up the garden and sow the early vegetables. Commence ploughing in dry situations and on sod land as soon as the frost will allow.

The Romans offered sacrifices to Bona Dea, or Maia, on the first day of the month.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Set about ploughing the land. Early spring ploughing is the best for sod land, as the frost both pulverizes it and kills the weeds. Sow grass and plant the root crops. Steep and sow the grain crops. Corn may be sown after the grain crops and clover. Turn ont the sheep and cattle, but not before the land is tolerably dry and the young grass has appeared. Cart out the remainder of the manure, and clear up the farm yards. Manure will waste as much in the heap in one season as in the ground, and for the first you get nothing, for the other a great deal. Towards the close of the month the meadow lands may be top-dressed with compost, zypsum or other manure. Mark spots for future drainage. Beets, mangoldwurtzel, and wedes maty be sown with advantage after the other crops. Peas, beans, onions, turnips, carrots, parsnips, potatoes, radishes and spinach may he sown in garden and Helds. Cabbages, cucumbers, culithower, lettuce, radishes, tomatoes, and peppers may be planted out. Hedges and shrubs may be trimmed.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Finish sowing and planting. The seed-end of potatoes, cut rather deep, will yivld the best crop. Ruta-bagas, or Swedes, may be sown after the potatues. Four or five pounds of seed are not too much for an acre,--that will allow some for the insect and some for the land. Transplant so as to fill up spots where crops seem to fail. Hoe, or set the cultivator going among the com and root crops. Weed the garden, the grain and root crops, othowise it will be fifty times more troublesome later in the season and next year. Weedy fields may be ploughed for summer fallow. Buckwheat land ought to be prepared. The earlier the chopped land can be well burnt the better. Prune, trim and transplant trees. After transplanting, the soil should be readered mellow and rich by mucking in for a considerable distance around; choose a moist or rainy day for the operation. Remove or destroy insects, lice and caterpillars on fruit-trees. Plant out cabbages. Transplant wild plants, bringing with them a portion of the natural soil

In honor of this conqueror, Mark Antony changed its name from Quintilius to Julius,hence our July. Our Saxo forefathers named it •Hay-month,' since this was the time of their harvest.

## AGRICLLTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Hoe and weed corn, potatoes and all other crops; run the cultivator through them when the opportunity offers. Buckwheat and even turnips may be sown as late as July. Make early preparation for harvesting ; repair barns, vehicles and tools. Get the best tools in the market: a man may earn the extra cost of a good seythe or cradle in a single day's work. Procure a horse rake, by means of which one man with a steady horse can do the work of seven or eight men. Clover should be cut while it is in full bloom. Timothy and red-top do not ripen till a fortnight after clover: they should be cut while the seed is in full milk, and before it is so ripe as to shake out when handled. Weeds should be cut down or rooted out before seeding: trausplant cabhages and turnips in fleld or garden; gather flowering herbs, and dry quickly in the sun.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Finish hoeing and weeding, and prepare for grain harvest. Wheat, oats, and barley are generally cut this month: the best ought to be set aside for seed, and allowed to ripen fully while standing. The grain intended tor consumption should be cut while still soft for not only is the flour better, but there is much less loss and waste in harvesting the orops. Lowland hay may be cut and made into stacks. If there is time, it is much better at once to get the low meadow hay beyond the reach of the river than to wait till winter. Make drains where required; gather seed and herbs; destroy seeds wherever they are to be seen; remove balls from potatoe vines, if thought necessary. Fall wheat may be sowed. If grain harvest be finished, fall ploughing for next season may be begun. A good farmer will plough all summer long. Don't burn too soon, of the trouble will be greatly increased.

## SEPTEMBER 30 Days.

## AgRICULTURE FOR TIIE MONTH.

Carry on the harvesting of grain, corn and root crops. Neglect not fall ploughing for a single day. Draining ought to be gone on with: let the drains be from 30 to 36 inches in depth, and placed about 20 feet apart. Grain may now be fleld thrashed. Do not take up the potatoes until the vines have been killed by the frost, and are perfectly dry; keep them from sun and wret, and allow them to dry before housing: let them be stured away in barrels or binns well protected from air. Early apples may be gathered by hand, wiped, and put away into binns or barrels, taking care not to bruise them: they should be kept in a dry, cold cellar, or upper room, where the temperature is not below the freezing point: should they, by any means, get frozen, they should be kept covered, so as to let them thaw gradually. Trees must be budded in this month. N. E. farmers generally sow grass seed (not clover) as early as possible after the summer crop. This is, likewise, a good time for the cow to go to the bull. Rams, again, should be removed from the sheep until the end of November or December.

## A\&RICULTURE EOR THE MONTH.

Contiuue draining, fall ploughing, and securing corn and ront crops. When potatoes are to be stored in a field, a dry, sandy spot should be chosen, on which they are to he laid in heaps, then put a layer of straw over them; thatch them carefully, and cover the whole with earth : two small oriffees should be left, the one on the top, and the other at the bottom ; these should be closed with a wisp - f straw, and opened occasionally, to permit the access of fresh air. If the soil of the field is a wet clay, a ditch ought to be dug round the spot where the roots are to le laid. Turnips may be either stored in a root house, or put in pits three feet in hreaith, and covered with straw and earth as above. Cull out the choicest animals for lreeding and for use; sell or fatten the remainder. Trees may be set out for the ensuing spring as soon as the leaves have fallen, ahd the buds are fairly formed. Small seedlings, however, are best transplanted in the spring Fruit trees may be propagated by layers or cuttings.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTII.

Preparations must now be made for a long and severe winter. The summer ve hicles and implements should be dried, cleaned and stuwed away. The fences should be put in order, so that none of the fields may be exposed to the poaching of cattle, sheep or hogs. The farmer should walk about daily with a hammer and a pocket full of nails, patching and repairing the barns and sheds where they require it. The barn should be well bedded with turf, peat, muck, straw, sawdust, weeds, or other vegetable matters, at the samp time it should be so constructed that the soluble dart of the manure, which is the best, shall not be lost. Finish digging and storing of roots and the fall ploughing. One good ploughing of clay land in the fall is worth two or three in the spring. Husk the corn: examine and make cuts for the drainage of surface water: undergyound drains are preferable to surface cuts.

## AGRICULTURE FOR THE MONTH.

Stock now requires increased attention: they should be stall-fed for the winter, if possible, or put up in yards with a warm aspect, and with sheds attached whereto they can resort in stormy seasons: they shoukl be supplied with plenty of water and salt, and fed about three times every day, and curried regularly. The sow may be taken to the hoar in this month, and the ram allowed to return to the flock again. The Farmer may now thrash graiz, take his produce to market; the good wife ought to have her quota ready of cheese, butter, fowls, hams sausages, mittens, socks, cloth, wool, and feathers; these are all as good as money in town. Let all accounts be settled and debts paid. Every farmer ought to keep a book wherein he records his operations, and notes the effect of different kinds and quantities of manure, seed, \&c.

## PACKETS FROM HALIFAX.

The Steamers for England arrive from the United States at Cunard's Wharf fortnightly, that is about midnight every other Thursday, and the same week the Steamer from England arrives and proceeds to Boston. Messrs. Cunard \& Co. have also Steam Packets running to Bermuda and St. John's, N. F.,-the latter touches at Sydney.

The Steamer Eastern State leaves Brown's Wharf every other Tuesday for Boston, and touches at Yarmouth on the way. Messrs. Young and Hart have two Packets running continually to Boston, viz., the barque Halifax and the brig Boston; the latter is commanded by Capt. O'Brien.

A packet runs between Halifax and Liverpool, Queen's Co., leaving Crenan's Whare occasionally through the month.

The Lunenburg P'acket generally sails from Black's Wharf for Lunenburg.

The Guysborough Packet sails from the Long Wharf.
The Sydney (sailing) Packet generally starts from Caldwell's Wharf.

## RAILWAYS.

## BRIEF HISTORY OF THE NOVA SCOTIA RAILWAY.

The construction of this Road as a Public Provincial undertaking was authorized by Act passed March 31, 1854, and a subsequent act of the same session provided for obtaining the necessary funds for building them, by authorizing the contracting of a loan by issuing debentures on the pledge of the Revenues of the Province-bearing interest at 6 per cent, and redeemable in twenty years.

The work was commenced on the main line June 13, 1854, and the Windsor Branch in July 1855, and is still in progress. In February 1855 the first four miles from Halifax was opened for travel. On July 27 the road was opened to Bedford 8 miles from Halifax. In January 1857 an additional $14 \frac{1}{2}$ miles, extending to Schultz's or Grand Lake Station, was brought into use, and on the 3rd of February 9 miles, extending to the Truro Road crossing was opened, making $3 \frac{1}{2}$ miles of the main line completed.

On Dec. 30, 1857, a locomotive and Tender went through on the line to Windsor, and on March the 22nd of the present year the members of
the House of Assembly made an experimental trip to Windsor-the line was formally opened for 'Trattic on the 3nd of June 1858. It is expected that by November first the line thmugh to Trumo will he fuily completed for travel. The length of the Road to Windsor, is : 36 t'10ih miles from the Junction,-the entire length to Truro 612 -10th miles.

The Average cost of the Main Line and Windsor Branch is $£ 11,043$ 16s. 4d., per mile; the average cost of the New York Railways is £12,6984\%.41.-the estimate of the total cost of the N. S. Railway and its equipments to Windsor and Truro is $£ 1,024,8667 \mathrm{~s} .2 \frac{3}{4} \mathrm{~d}$.

Any person or persons having a license in full force, who shall stand his carriage in any other than its appointed place or manner,-or not having it properly numbered,--or any driver, or persen in charge of a licensed carriage, who shall not prodere the table of fares and distances when thereto required, or who being upon his stand disengaged, shall refuse to convey any persert secking to empley him,-wor who shall in any way violate this Ordinance, shall for each offence, besides being liable to have his license revoked, forfeit and pay such a.fine as under and by virtue of this Ordinauce may be adjusted against him. And the owner or driver of any such carriage who shall demand or extort from any person or persons a sum beyond the rate of fare herein established, or hereafter to be established, may be so fined, and shall forthwith forfeit the license for such carriage, anid be liable to refurnd to the party grieved the sum so extorted, with cost of prosecution. Livery stable keepers, not occupying the stands of said City, are exempt from this Ordinance ; further than that they are hereby required to obtain a license for each carriage they shall use to convey persons for hire, within the limits of the City ; which license shall continue in force and be renewed as aforesaid, and the carriage shall be numbered, and have the letter $L$, besides its number, painted or placed on it as aforesaid.

8. If any Licensed Truckman, being on his Stand, shall refuse or neglect to cart, truck, or employ his horse and cart, truck, or sled, within the raid City of Halifax, for any person, when requested, he shall, fok each oftence, forfect and pay the sum of ten shillings.

FERRIES TO DARTMOUTH.

SOUTII FERRY.
From 6 o'clock in the morning till 9 in the evening, the Boat leaves at a quarter before and a quater after earh hour, and after 9 o'clock two boats, viz: one at 9h. 20m., and last boat 10 o'clock.

The Ferry Boat on Sundays runs as follows: commencing at 6h. 20m., in the morning from Lialifax, 40 m . between each trip until 11, then leaves again at 1 o'clock, and 1 h .40 m ., and 2 h . 15 m ., and then a quater before and a quarter after each hour until 6 -then every 40 m . until a quarter past 8 , then at a quarter to 9 and 9 h .20 ., and last boat at \(10 \mathrm{P} . \mathrm{m}\).

NORTH FERRY.
Leaves Halifix side every half hour from 6 o'clock in the morning, last boat at 7 o'clock in the evening. No boat on Sunday.

On account of the two Ferry boats the communication between Halifax and Dartmouth is very regular, there being one boat every quarter of an hour leaving the Dartmouth side up to 7 in the evening, when the only communication is by the South Ferry.

LIGHT HOUSES
On the Coast of Nora Scotia, and on the Coast of New Brunswick in the Bay of Fundy.
Meagher's Beach-East Side Halifax harbor. A fixed light.
Sambro Islani-Western entrance Halifax harbor. A fixed light.
Devil's Iscavi- - An Octagonal Liglit Beacon on the S. W. point of Devil's Island, at the entrance of the Eastern passage to Halifax harbour, and exhibits a red light on the seaward sides, to distinguish it from Sambro and Meagher's Beach lights ; stands forty-five feet above high water mark; rise and fall six feet. The Tower painted dark brown, with a white belt between the Balcony and Lantern, to distinguish it in day time.

Cross Island-Entrance to Lunenburg harbor. Two lights-flash light above ; fixed light below.

Liverpool-South end of Coffin's Island. A plain, revoleing light.
Fort Point harbor light, at the head of Liverpool harbor, southern entrance of the river. A lright, fixed light, visible from all points of approach, and must be left on the larboard hand, when entering the harbor.

Port Medway - Beacon Light on Admiralty Head, west side of the entrance of the port. Building square, painted white with black square in the centre of the seaward sides, plain white lighl, forty feet above sea level, and stands within thirty fathoms of the shore.

Shelburne-McNutt's İshand. Two fixed lights-one above the other.

Barrington-Baccora Point, east side of the entrance to Barrington Bay. A flash light of fifteen seconds.

Yarmouth-West Side of the harlor. A plain, revolving light. Cape Sable, Seal Island-The first light on approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South point of Seal Island. A plain, white light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be scen, on approaching the Island, from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde rock, lies about three and one-third miles S. by W., by compass, from the Light Honse. Between this rock and the Island there are some dangers-the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Briar Islavi-A plain, white light, situate about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point of the Island.
/Westport-l'eter's Island, at the south entrance of the east side of tho Bay of Fundy. Two white lights, placed horizontally, to distinguish it from Briar Island light, at an elevation of forty feet above high-water mark.

Digby Gut Light-On the west side of Dighy Gut, from Briar Island north-eastward. This light is chiefly intended as a guide into Dighy Basin. A fixed, white light.

Black Rock Ligit-On the southern shore of the Bay of Fundy. A fired, white light.

Horton Bleff Light-In the Basin of Minas, ninety-five feet above seal level, high-water ; rise and fall forty to forty-five feet. Building, square, painted white; stands sixty feet from the Bluff, and shows a white light, which may be seen in clear weather, over the greatest part of the Basin of Minias, (after passing Cape Blowmedon), and above the Five Island, and up Windsor River, until intercepted by the continuation of the Bluff to the southward of it.
Apple River Light-North Side of the entrance to Apple River, in the Chignecto, or Cumberland Bay. Two fixed lighs, placed horizontally.

Partridge Island River-An Octagnal light beacon, on the west side of the entrance to Partridge Island River, Parrsborough, on the north side of the Basin of Minas, and exhibits a plain, white light, at an elevation of thirty feet above high water; rise and fall about forty-five feet; the Tower is white, and stands close to high water mark on the beach. Vessels can only enter the harbor at high water, and must lie aground on the soft bottom when the tide is low.

Eastern Beaver, or William's Island-A revolving light.
Canseau, Cranberry Island-Two fixed lights, one above the other.
West Side of the Gut of Canseau-A fixed light.
Eddy, or Sani Point Light-On Eddy, or Sand Point, on the west side of the south entrance to the Strait of Canseau, distinguished by two white lights, placed horizontally, twenty-five feet above the sea level. Building square, painted white, with a black diamond on the seaward side.

Guysborough Harbor Beacon-On the west side of the entrance to the harbor, head of Chedabucto Bay. A fixed light.

Pictou Light-On the south-east side of the entrance to the harbor. A fixed light.

Pictou Island Light-On the S. E. point of the Island. Building square, and painted white. A fixed light, fifty-two feet above high-water mark.

Arichat Beacon- \(\mathbf{A}\) Light on Point Morichi, on the south-east side of the southern entrance to the harbor: Building square, painted white. A white light, thirty-four feet alowe the seatevel.

Lousbiberg- Gn the cast tide of the entance to the harbor. A fixed light.

Low Point Light-East Side of Sydney, C. B., harbor. A fixed light.

Sea-Wolf, or Margarie Island Light-Situate on the N. W. side of the Island of Cape Breton, nearly midway between Port Hood and Cheticamp harbors, and distant from Cape Breton two and a-half miles. A plain, white light. The lantern is placed on a square wooden tower, painted white, near the centre and summit of the Island. The lantern is 298 feet above sea level-visible from all points of approach. To vessels in proximity to the Island, the light may become observed by the abrupt cliffs or sides of the lsland, which may serve as a guide to tack or anchor by, as hundreds of vessels find anchorage on the southeast side. The chief landing is near the south-west end, in shore, where a few fishing stages and boats are kept in use during the fishing season.

Port Hood Light-Changed from white to red, when seen from the the northern entrance, to distinguish it from the Margarie and North Canso lights.

White Head Island Light-On the S. W. point of White Head Island. The tower is square, painted white, standing seventy-five fathoms from the water's edge, with an Octagonal Iron Lantern, sixty feet above sea level at high-water; rise and fall, six feet. The light is distinguished by bright flashes, of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of ten seconds, displaying altemately three flashes and three eclipses in a minute. The light will not be totally obscured during the eclipse.

Flint Island Light-On Flint Island, on the eastern coast of Cape Breton. Lat. \(40^{\circ} 11^{\prime} 5^{\prime \prime}\) N., and Long. \(59^{\circ} 45^{\prime} 20^{\prime \prime}\) W., and exhits a a bright, flash light, every fifteen seconds, visible from all points of the compass. The light is sixty-five feet above sea level, and can be seen at the distance of twelve miles.

St. Pade's Island-A fixed light on the north-east end, and a flush light on the south-west end.

Scattarie Island-A revolving light on the east end of the Island.
Iron-bound Island Light- © 'ff the entrance to LaHave River. A bright, flash light, of ten seconds duration, followed by eclipses of thirty seconds. The lantern is placed on a square, wooden tower, painted white, on the southern side of the Island, andis visible from all points of approach. Elevation seventy-five fect above sea-level.

Ragged Island Harbor Light-On Gull Rock, off the entrance of the harbor. Building square and painted white, exhibiting a clectr, fixed light, at an elevation of fifty-one feet above the sea-level, and is situated in Lat \(43^{\circ} 39^{\prime} \mathrm{N}\). and Long. \(64^{\circ} 66^{\prime} \mathrm{W}\).

Pubnico Harbor Light-A Beacon Light on the S. E. side of the entrance to Pubnico Harbor, situate on the E. side of the entrance to the Bay of Fund fout thirteen miles northerly of Cape Sable. Building square, painted white. A fixed, red light, on the seaward side, twentyeight feet above high water level, (rise and fall twelve feet,) and stands fifty fathoms from low-water mark. The point of beach is bold.

A Fog Bell has been erected on the E. Cape of Yarmouth harbor, a few feet to the southward of the Light Honse, and about one and a quarter mikes from the extreme outer point of the C'ape. Strikes seven times per minute.

Ginnet Rock Ligit.-This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprictor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. A white, flash light, twenty seconds dark, and forty seconds light, in each minute. Building painted in stripes, vertical, black and white. Between the northernmost and southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them almost above water, and extend eastward from the Light House about four miles. From this range further westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker called the Bullthis may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S . W. end of Grand Manan, open.

Machias Seil Islini Lights-Two fixed, white lights, upon the Machias Seal I-lands, fortv-five feet above high-water, and bearing from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance, of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast, British or American. Both buildings painted white. Vessels standing to the northward between these lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these lights iuto one, as they will be, then, not more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledgss, if more than five miles to the E . of the lights.

Head Harbor Light-Next in order after passing Grand Manan and the plain, white light (American) on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harhor Light, placed on the N. E. extremity of Campo Bello, and is a gruide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, times to enter Head Harbor. A fixed, white light. Building painted white, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preau Lights-Upon this projecting headland, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant twenty-eight feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass where they may be useful; both are ficed and white. Building painted red and white, in stripes, five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Islanid Light-At the entrance of the river and harbor of St..John, N. B. A fixed, white light. The building painted red and white, in vertical stripes.

Quaco Light-A revolving, white light, placed on a small rock, off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. The light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. Building painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Caph Enrige Light-On the point of that name in Westmoreland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbor, N. S. Building painted white, about 120 feet above the tide mark. A plain, white light.

West Quodidy Light-This is an American light, placed on the west side of the entrance entrance in the St. Croix, by Lubec and Eastport.
