ST. LAWRENCE RIVER TRAGEDY

The Ship Struck the Rock With Such a Terrific Impact That the Whole Company Was Swept From the Deck to the River-Four Bodies Recovered -Three Persons Missing.

MASSENA, N.Y., Aug. 1-Seven perons were drowned late this afternoon in the St. Lawrence River, when the rry steamer Sirius struck a shoal, the miles below this city, capsized and hurled its seventy-five passengers into the river. Four bodies have been

The picnic crowd boarded the Sirius on the return trip about four o'clock this afternoon and were seated on deck under the canvas awning when the crash came. They picked off scores who had clung to the sides of the ferry boat. Others, benumbed and exhausted, were swept down stream to death. Among them were the Misses Farker, who were spending their vacation in Massena. Futule attempts were also made by swimmers to save Miss Dewey and Floyd Hackett from the current.

So quickly did the river claim its victims that those who were drowned had already met their end when bouts from the International Park reached the scene, scarcely five minutes after the crash. The difficulty of rescuing under the circumstances was very great. Those rescued were taken to the International Park and later proceeded ternational Park and later proceeded to this city.

Three of the bodies recovered are those of women. They are: Miss Hatthe Parker of Ogdensburg, Miss Hatthe Farker of Ogdens-burg, N.Y.; Miss Nellie Parker of Ogdens-burg, N.Y.; Miss Ada Dewey of Mas-sena, Floyd Hackett of Massena. 

Because of the ownership of a strip of land on each side of College-street, the University of Toronto claims right of entry to all properties on the street and from that it looks as if the plan to widen College-street would fall thru. YORK COUNTY CROP.

Harvesting operations all over York County are well advanced, and another fortnight ought to see the work well in hand. It is about the earliest harvesting in many a long year, and probably the lightest in respect of yield. If all wheat, however, where threshing has been finished, is a good average yield, running all the way from 25 to 5 bushels to the acre, tho on one or two farms to the east and north of the city, as high as 55 bushels to the acre has been secured.

Goose wheat to about the best crop to be harvested this year, and it will not be surprising if a good average yield will ensue after all. Oats are a peculiar crop, and while the top of the head is ripe, the remainder in many fields of oats are already cut and a little threshing done, and the yield is gratifying indeed.

Peas are generally a failure in York County, and here farmers locally are at a disadvantage with their fellow-farmers in Simcoe County, where some fine yields are seen, long in the straw and well podded.

SPAIN'S CORK INDUSTRY

The cultivation of cork trees forms an important industry in Spain. The cork tree is an oak which grows best in the poorest soil. It cannot endure frost, and must have sea air, and also some altitude. It is found all along the coast of Spain, the northern coast of Africa, and the northern shores of the Mediterranean. northern shores of the Mediterranean.

There are two barks to the tree, the outer one being stripped for use, explains Harper's Weekly. The cork is valuable according as it is soft and velvety.

When the sapling is about ten years old it is stripped of its outer bark for about two feet from the ground; the tree will then be about five inches in diameter and about six feet up to the branches. This stripping is worthless. The inner bark appears blood-red, and if it is split or injured the tree dies.
