LONDON, Ont., Oct. 25.—(Special)—"Brantford carried the hydro power bylaw today by a splendid majority, because the city has confidence in the cheap power policy," was the comment of Hon. Adam Beck tonight. "The success of the hydro in other places no doubt had a great effect.

"The result of the voting means that at least six places will be added to the power ring from Ayr to Port Dover, including Waterford and St. George. These and other places will be added to the thirty-four municipalities known as the Ontario Municipal Power Union, they having been previously unable to get power because of lack of a station, altho they have passed power bylaws. Moreover, it will mean ultimately a reduction in cost to all."

A special committee of the board of works met yesterday for the purpose of changing names of some of the streets to facilitate identification, P. W. Ellis attended and requested that the extension of Oriole road be re-named Oriole Parkway. He exhibited a plan and color drawing in perspective showing his reasons for the new names. The new parkway extends from Lons-dale avenue, northward to Eglinton. The other streets with new names are: Norway place to Norway avenue, Globe to Wroxeter; Brighton place to Kenneth avenue; Cockburn avenue to Scarboro; Franklin avenue; Orchard place, Spadina road to westerly city limits, changed to Bantry avenue; Mil-lor street; Rounirer will be spelt Rowntree from Dufferin to be hence-forth known as Clovelly avenue; Hown-tree, from Woodville avenue; to me westerly city limits, changed to Bod-min street; Rouniree will be spelt Rowntree from now on; Clinton avenue to be Page street; Ellesworth, Har-rington and Bienhem will oe cam-Ellesworth; to Birch avenue is added the word Silver; Brant avenu-fun Spadina road to the westerly city limits, changed to Heath street; own-ers of Kendal avenue will be notified limits, changed to Heath street; own-ers of Kendal avenue will be notified that it is proposed to change the name of that street, and nothing will be done in that regard in the meantime.
