JANES BUILDING SOLD FOR OVER A MILLION; 3 MORE SKYSCRAPERS

King St. Frontage of 84 Feet Changed Hands at \$15,000 a Foot, With 112 Feet on Yonge—High Buildings Planned for Corners Occupied by Janes Bldg., Dominion Bank and Dominion Bond Co.

The Janes Building and land, at the northeast corner of King and Yonge streets, one of the most prominent properties in the Dominion, has been sold by Sir Edmund Osler and the Dominion Bank to John and L. M. Wood of Toronto and Montreal, for a sum exceeding a million dollars and probably for \$1,150,000. Robins Limited, who negotiated the deal, the largest single property transaction in the city, refuse to give the actual sale price.

More Skyscrapers

As a result it is quite likely that the final plans of the Dominion Bank for the opposite corner will show a structure of over 12 stories, instead of the comparatively low one mainly for the use of the bank. And it may go up to 15 stories.

ALLIES' SWIFT PROGRESS IS SURPRISE TO EUROPE INTERVENTION MOTTED

In Nine Days Since Turkey Declared War, Events Have Crowded Fast—Bulgarians Resting After Capture of Kirk-Kiliseh—Montenegrins Are Pressing Attack on Scutari.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press).—After a four days heavy battle the Bulgarians are resting. There were no reports of fighting today along the line from Kirk-Kiliseh to Adrak. The Bulgarians have not yet decided whether they will attempt to capture Adrianople by assault or starve out its garrison by a siege. The full extent of the Turkish disaster at Kirk-Kiliseh is still unknown, but it is almost certain that the bulk of the garrison there effected a retreat from the town before it fell into the hands of the Bulgarians.

Stand or Fall Together

Much interest centres in the nature of the alliance of the Balkan states. It is said on good authority that one of the provisions of that alliance is that no one state shall conclude peace without the others agreeing to do so.

Turks Ill-Prepared

Despatches from Vienna, St. Petersburg and other European capitals in the London morning newspapers ascribe the Turkish defeats to lack of proper preparation in the organization of their troops, the absence of necessary supplies and food and quarrels between the Turkish war minister, Nazim Pasha, and Abdullah Pasha, commander of the army in Thrace, the former considering the Macedonian war centre the more important and Abdullah Pasha desiring to concentrate the army's efforts in Thrace.

ROOSEVELT SATISFIED DEMANDS HYDRO WINS IN BRANTFORD MAJORITY FOR BYLAW 231 POWER UNION BRANCHES OUT

Attempt on His Life Has Apparently Stirred Numerous Irresponsible Persons, and Body Guard is Needed—Eccentric Individual Tried Hard to See Colonel.

OSTYER BAY, N.Y., Oct. 25.—(Can. Press).—On account of a number of threatening letters received by Col. Roosevelt and the presence in Oyster Bay of a stranger who attempted to do to make his way into the colonel's house, steps were taken tonight to guard the life of the ex-president.

A Harmless Crank

He was a tall, well-dressed man, with a flowing mustache and a sombrero, which gave him the appearance of a westerner. He would give no reason for asking to see the colonel, but persisted in his demands until he was cut off sharply and told to leave Sagamore Hill. He then asked to see Mrs. Roosevelt. The colonel's secretary finally persuaded him that it was useless and he went away.

Wants New Trial

His experience had proven to him that truth was not the best policy. He declared that a person was liable to imprisonment for telling the truth and with all this he had been declared not guilty by Judge Riddell and exonerated by the Hon. Mr. Doherty, minister of justice at Ottawa.

Some Conspirators

"It has been declared that it was a Roman Catholic conspiracy. Do you think I would have stood that? If I had not been so busy with the trial I would have been there to see some good Roman Catholics stood by me, while some Protestants shook me and wrote a long letter to me when my back was turned."

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Triumphed Because Success of the Movement in Other Places Was Impressed on Ratepayers, Says Hon. Adam Beck—Public Ownership Carried Day Against Determined Efforts of Cataract Company—Previous Hostile Majority Exceeded 400.

LONDON, Ont., Oct. 25.—(Special).—"Brantford carried the hydro power bylaw today by a splendid majority, because the city has confidence in the cheap power policy," was the comment of Hon. Adam Beck tonight. "The success of the hydro in other places no doubt had a great effect."

PUBLIC OWNERSHIP'S GREAT VICTORY.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 25.—(Special).—After several years of dangleing the offer of rates ten per cent. less than those of the Hydro Commission before Brantford ratepayers by the Cataract Company, an offer which was never carried out, a bylaw to install a hydro-electric plant was carried here today by the handsome majority of 231. The vote for the bylaw to issue \$115,000 debentures was as follows: For, 1273; against, 1042, and the vote authorizing a contract with the Hydro-Electric Commission was: For, 1282; against, 1037.

The majority in favor of the bylaw, considering the light vote polled, and in view of the fact that strenuous opposition was waged by corporate interests, is most decisive, and is considered a great victory for public ownership. Brantford formerly rejected hydro-electric by over 400 majority, and the turnover after four years' dealing with the Cataract Company is held to be most significant. Every division except one today gave a majority in favor of hydro-electric.

PEOPLE'S POWER POPULAR.

BEACHVILLE, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press).—Hydro is booming here, the power demand having increased no less than 150 per cent. since the system was established less than four months ago, winning at the same time a reduction of nearly \$2 per horsepower. The number of street lights, moreover, is to be increased by one-third at once, and there is a constant demand for house wiring and extensions.

MARECHAL TO ENTER CABINET TORONTO MAN ELECTROCUTED

Ottawa Believes His Elevation is Assured—Rogers to Succeed Monk is the Latest Rumor.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25.—(Special).—In the absence of an official announcement there was nothing new in the political situation this evening. It is practically certain, however, that Mr. L. T. Marchal is to be taken into the cabinet, since he is not likely to go to the public works department. It is now stated in authoritative circles that Mr. Marchal will be arranged whereby Hon. Robert Rogers will take the portfolio of public works. Dr. Roche succeeding him in the interior and Mr. Marchal to be called to the office of secretary of state. This is said, will be but a temporary arrangement.

BALKAN STATES WILL DEFEY EUROPE

League is Credited With Intention to Gather Territorial Spoils of War, Altho Great Powers Are Banded Together to Prevent Such Expansion.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press).—The League of the Balkan States is based on a formal written alliance, according to a despatch from Vienna. When this is made public, it is stated, it will reveal the territorial aims of the Balkan nations. The secret treaty defines the zones of influence of the respective countries in Albania and Macedonia, and provides for a common tariff and postal union between the Balkan nations.

GREAT PROGRESS OF TAXATION REFORM

James McGregor Believes That Single Tax System Soon Will Be Adopted in Ontario, and Says the System Has Resulted in Many Americans Settling in the West.

"I firmly believe that in the near future the Province of Ontario will adopt the system of single taxation. Already all the business men in this and other large cities are expressing great dissatisfaction with the present system, and once a man grasps the idea of single taxation he will always remain a single taxer."

This spoke James McGregor in addressing the Single Tax Association at the monthly luncheon in Williams' Cafe last evening.

"I tell you, ladies and gentlemen, it is a pleasure, after traveling in the United States where very little advancement is in evidence along tax reform lines, to come to your great country, where there is unmistakable progress. In the west you already have abolished improvement tax, and I am more than ever satisfied that the day is not far distant when the only fair and proper method of taxation will be put into effect."

"That is why you see free western land you take hundreds of thousands of good American citizens away from their country and that is why thousands of our eastern farmers travel westward. The fact is, the strongest proof that the contentions of a single taxer are correct."

After Mr. McGregor's address the meeting was thrown open for general discussion.

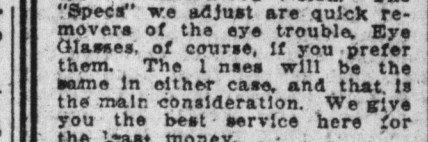

PUPILS WILL SOON BE TAUGHT ON ROOFS

Continued From Page 1.

For pupils, where each can be given individual instruction and a real interest manifested toward him. I hope also to see a new state of affairs in our Toronto schools where every day subject to trunancy will be investigated, his home influences made known and his personal attitude explained. I think in many cases the curriculum is not suited to the boy, and that by slight adjustments we could stimulate an interest that would make him a worthy citizen.

For truant classes we would have to exercise care in the selection of a competent instructor, but that can easily be done and I look forward to the reform being effected in the near future.

Backward Classes. There is still another class Dr. Conboy wishes to see separated from the other pupils. They are the ones who suffer from sickness or poverty and become backward in the studies, the nominally bright scholars. A class for this division is soon to be started in Queen Alexandra School.

Regarding the mentally defective pupils, Dr. Conboy stated that before the management committee of the board next meets he expected to receive the report of the school inspectors and Medical Inspector Struthers on the number and classification of these. Although no suggestion has been made as to the probable number in the city, he said he believed there were between 400 and 500. It is not improbable that one of the schools will be devoted entirely to the teaching of this class of children. They will be given more manual training than the other studies with a view to qualifying them for lives of usefulness.

Appeal to Teachers. Two hundred teachers in Convocation Hall yesterday. Dr. Conboy made a direct appeal to them to manifest as little more interest in the less attractive pupils. He referred particularly to the poor and shabbily dressed, who in many cases are denied proper home training.

The presidential address of Inspector W. H. Elliott also touched upon the question of giving adequate attention to backward and deficient children.

The Nominations. Nominations for the election of officers for the ensuing year took place at the morning session. Balloting will be done in the different schools and the results made known in a week's time.

The vice-president for the next year, Miss Jessie McGregor, assistant principal of Alexander Muir School, was elected president yesterday by acclamation. Miss M.E. Davis of Winchester School was elected librarian, and

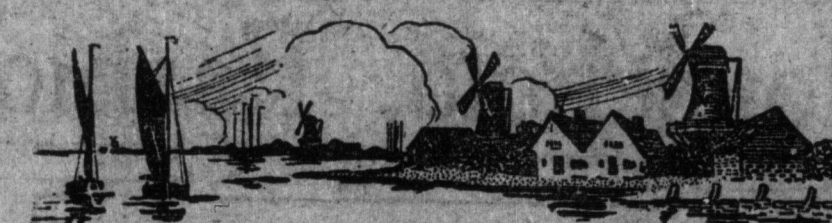

am I?" he appealed. "Who am I? Where do I stand on my conviction before Judge Winchester, which still stands? I have called this meeting in order to appeal for a new trial, which is the fervent wish of my heart. "Go and ask Crown Attorney Corley if I am guilty," he continued, "and if he says I am, I will go back to Kingston tomorrow. Go and ask Judge Winchester the same question and he cannot say I am guilty. "Why did they stand for the untruthfulness of ex-inspector Duncan?" he sarcastically appealed, "simply because Duncan knows a good deal, and Judge Winchester obtains the assistance of a mayor (leary) in order to give him what he should not have gotten, by allowing him to pay his contributions into the police pension fund for five years, so that he will come into possession of what he would have had had he served his full term. "The inebriated Magistrate Denison for the stand he took in the Duncan case, and stated that he stands principally as a man who will put principle before everything. "He criticized The World for its statement in The Sunday World to the effect that he had been arrested in Cairo and read a letter from the American consul denying that he had ever come back the country. "Atlas read a cablegram, which he sent to his lawyer, stating that the letter he read in The World was Egyptian, was untrue, and that he was returning to Canada immediately. Dunan, and upon hearing this I demanded that Mr. Lyon come out and fight and prove my guilt. "Lifts His Hat. "I have received such assistance from the Roman Catholics that from now on I will lift my hat to Rome and not rely upon the Protestant ministers. "A minister once phoned me to go on with the fight, thinking that I had the ministers behind me, but when I looked back I discovered that one was in his study, looking up the encyclopedia, another looking into his critic, and others off for their summer holidays. "He closed his address with an urgent appeal for support in his demand for a new trial. "A resolution, placing confidence in Atlas, was adopted by the audience. 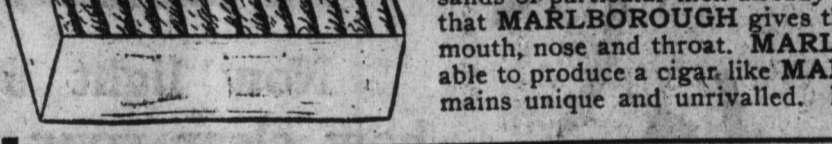

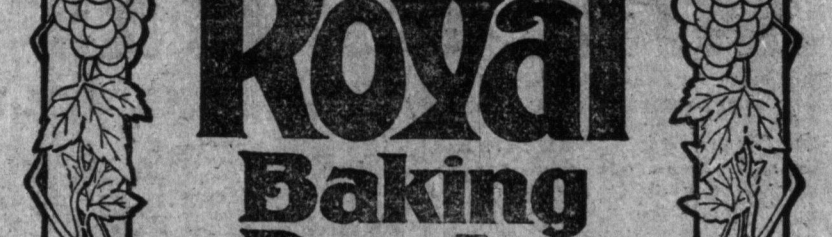

Mother's Authority

There are many who claim that a mother's authority over her children is a thing of the past, that parental discipline exists no longer and that children do as they please. Surely this is a very dark view of the case. I do not think that children hear about and read about were seemingly more obedient and consulted their parents' wishes for a much longer period than the children of today, but that obedience was instilled by fear. These days there is a healthy companionship between parents and children that was not dreamed of a generation ago. The pessimist insists that the "chum" theory is based on a genuine understanding. There is still a godly amount of authority in it; but I confess in many cases there might be more. Mothers who lack this authority are the last ones to recognize the fact. The children are quick enough to know it. The development, keeping and increasing of the mother's authority over the child is one of the most important things we have to deal with. It is based on instilling the habit of obedience in children. Along with the exercise of authority there must be a growth of confidence on the child's part in the wisdom and loving kindness of the mother's decisions. The result of this growth is the real comradeship that every parent and child longs to enjoy. Yesterday we spoke of explaining to a child the reason for decisions, so that he might understand their justice, and not lose faith in his judge. Common sense must be brought into play to decide just when these explanations should be made. When a child is sore with disappointment, an attempted explanation would probably lead to discussion—perhaps not kind. In some moods children are much more approachable than in others. Above all, consider what your attitude means to your child. Take into account this viewpoint. The more mistaken it is, the harder you will need to work to change it. But win him over to your side if you would retain your influence.

BAYONETS USED LOSSES HEAVY

Struggle Between Bulgarians and Turks on Banks of Tundja Was a Desperate One.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press.)—Stories of desperate hand-to-hand fighting between the Bulgarians and Turks are told in newspaper despatches reaching here from Adrianople. Great losses were sustained by both armies in the battles around that city on Tuesday and Wednesday.

Bayonets were used freely in the fight for the possession of the banks of the Tundja River and hundreds were killed and wounded.

Eight battalions of Bulgarian troops attacked the village of Maras yesterday and were repulsed by the Turkish troops with heavy losses.

The Turks have 100,000 of their finest troops on the line from Kirk-Klischi to Adrianople, which is garrisoned by another 60,000 men. Still another 60,000 guard the line back to Lohs Burgas. Abdullah Pasha, the commander-in-chief, some time ago declared that his troops were sufficient, and since then the great stream of fresh troops have been directed toward Saloniki.

DEMOCRATS' BIG FUND

Contributions of 53,000 Persons Amount to \$678,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press.)—The Democratic national campaign fund up to Oct. 24 amounted to \$678,364, contributed by 53,000 individuals, according to an official statement by Henry Morgenthau, chairman of the finance committee, given out at the Democratic headquarters here today.

In a personal statement to newspaper men when the report was made public, Mr. Morgenthau said Thomas P. Ryan and August Belmont, who have testified in Washington as to their large contributions to previous Democratic campaigns, had not been asked for funds this year, and had contributed nothing.

The total expenditures in the Wilson-Marshall campaign, up to the time of completion of the financial statement yesterday, were \$677,460, with additional outstanding obligations of \$55,149.

FRUIT MARKET OWNED BY TORONTO

Special Committee May Be Successful in Having a Building Erected in Harbor Square—Street Names Changed—Controllers Want Wide Teraulay Street.

A civic fruit market may be the result of the work of the special committee which has been enquiring into the conditions at the Toronto Fruit Market. The committee met at the city hall yesterday. Harbor square was the site chosen by the committee as the most desirable location.

Property Commissioner Chisholm had communicated with the harbor board with a view to the city acquiring the site, but was informed that on account of the proposed erection of viaducts, etc., the harbor committee cannot come to any definite conclusion until such matters are settled.

Change Street Names. A special committee of the board of works met yesterday for the purpose of changing names of some of the streets to facilitate identification. P. W. Ellis attended and requested that the extension of Oriole road be re-named Oriole Parkway. He exhibited a plan and color drawing in perspective showing his reasons for the new name. The new parkway extends from Lonsdale avenue northward to Eglinton.

The other streets with new names are: Norway place to Norway avenue, Globe to Wroxeter; Brighton place to Kenneth avenue; Cockburn avenue to Scarborough; Franklin avenue from Spadina road to the westerly city limits, changed to Montclair avenue; Orchard place, Spadina road to westerly city limits, changed to Barry avenue; Miller street from Dufferin to be henceforth known as Clovelly avenue; Rowntree, from Warden to westerly city limits, changed to Rowntree street; Rowntree will be split Rowntree from now on; Clinton avenue to be Faise street; Ellesmere, Harrington and Biennheim will be called Ellesworth; to Birch avenue is added the word Silver; Brant avenue from Spadina road to the westerly city limits, changed to Heath street; owners of Kendal avenue will be notified that it is proposed to change the name of that street, and nothing will be done in that regard in the meantime. Aid. May has undertaken to find a new name for that part of Delaware avenue north of the railway tracks.

Teraulay Widening. The board of control yesterday decided in favor of extending Teraulay street north from College street to Day's report road at a width of 88 feet. The recommendation goes on to council. Assessment Commissioner Forman estimated the cost to be about \$1,100,000. The works committee at its last meeting decided in favor of a 66-foot street thru from Queen to Day's report.

Down Come Poles. Any poles erected upon Bathurst street by the Toronto Power Company or any other body will be pulled down by Commissioner of Works Harris, by authority of the board of control. This means the commencement of hostilities relative to who has control of public streets.

A temporary truce has been declared over the operation of the civic car lines, and will hold good until the council meeting on Monday. In the meantime, Manager Sweeney of the Toronto hydro-electric system has given out the information that his system could supply the necessary power to operate Gerrard street lines within a week.

City Solicitor Johnson has been instructed to go ahead with the annexation of North Toronto, and it will be fought to a finish at the next council meeting, without special terms be made to the town.

Charges Against T. R. Are "Cruelly False"

Progressive Committee Denounces Michigan Editor, Who Published Statement Reflecting on Roosevelt

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(Can. Press.)—That the charges over which the Michigan suit was filed constituted the culmination of an "astounding campaign of slander" against Col. Roosevelt is the declaration of the Progressive national committee in a statement tonight.

"Knowing the cruel falsity of this charge," the statement says, "those who have been interested in circulating it have proceeded under cover and in the dark. No respectable person of responsibility, so far as he is known to Col. Roosevelt and his friends, has dared to make this charge in an open and responsible way until Mr. Newett made it in his newspaper.

"On Monday, Oct. 14, the day he was shot, Col. Roosevelt was in Chicago preparing to go to Milwaukee, when a copy of the paper was put in his hands. Upon reading the article Col. Roosevelt gave directions to proceed against Mr. Newett at once.

"Col. Roosevelt, however, in taking this action is not seeking to recover money damages and the amount asked in the suit is therefore fixed at a nominal sum."

The statement adds that the action was begun because by the publication in question "Mr. Newett was afforded the first opportunity to state his case, and his friends have been able to find for the 'prompt and authoritative' approval of the charges.

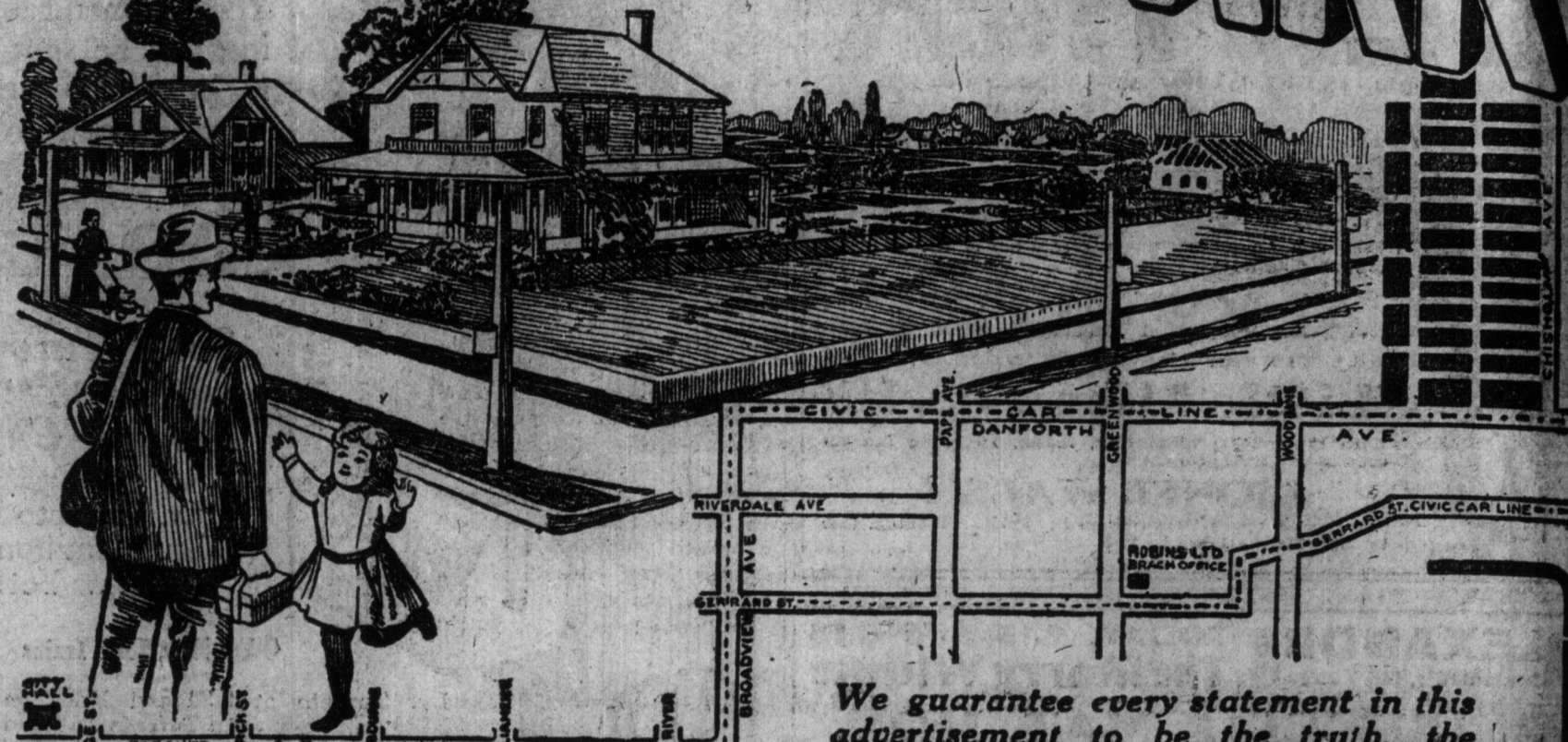
"MOOSEY WESTBROOK SHOT WHILE HUNTING.

A communication to this effect has been sent President Mosher of the brotherhood by the minister. This decision, the representatives of the men state, will not be accepted as final, and further representations will be made to the department.

The union has so far refused to treat with the men as a union.

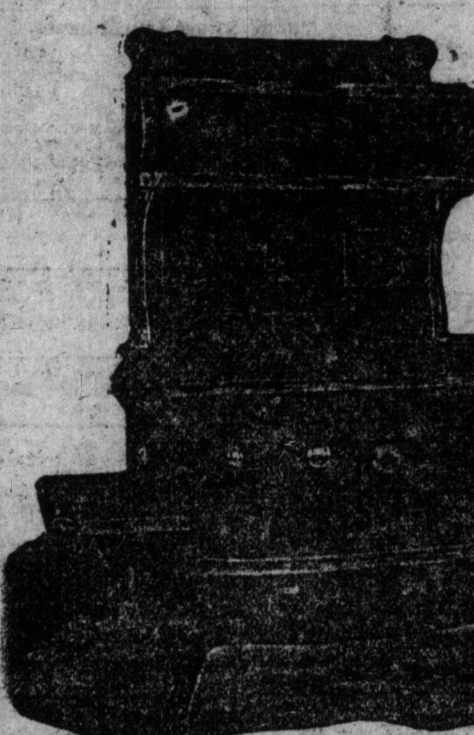

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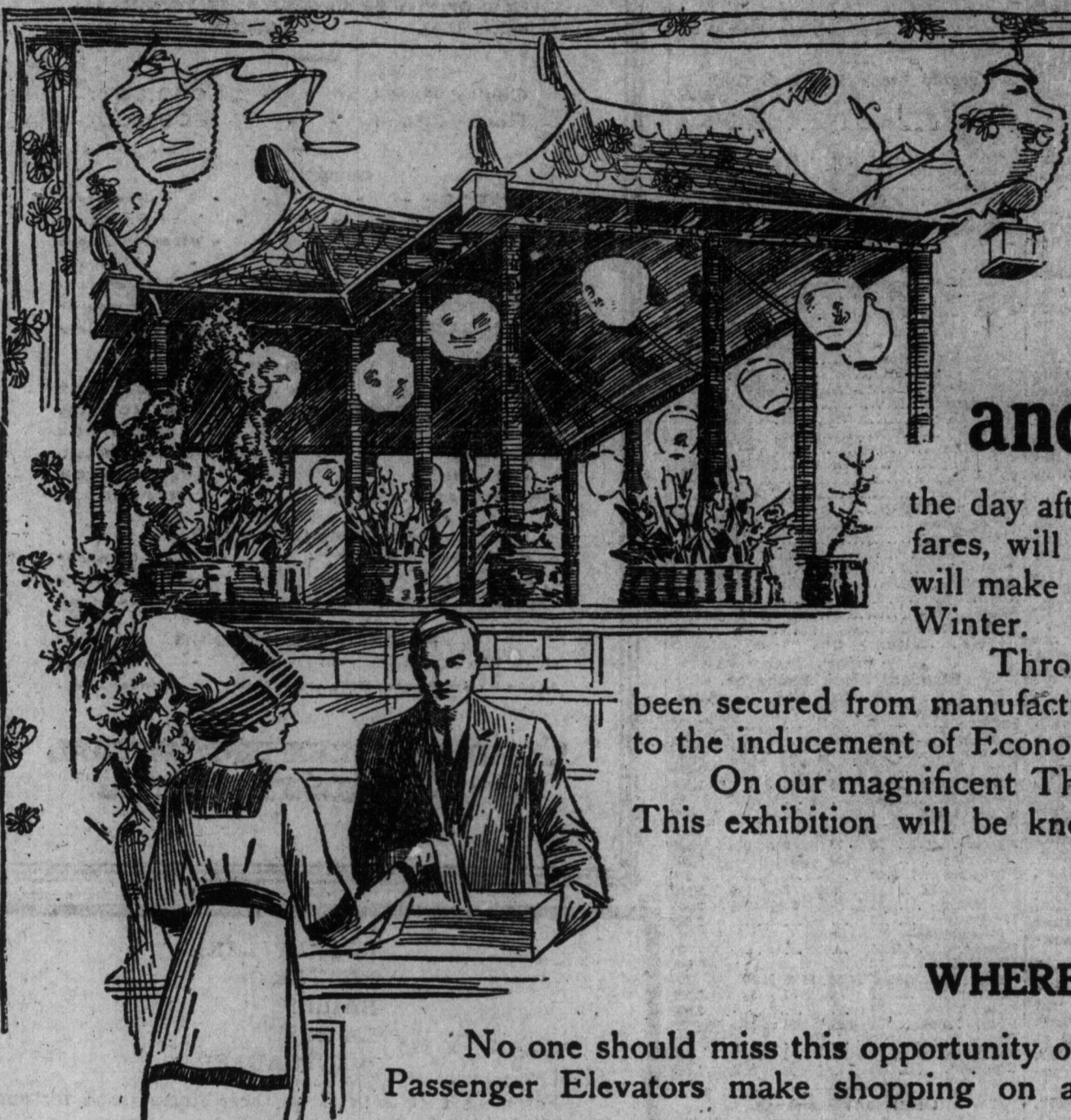
