Greatest Friend of Labor. A grave solemnity hung over the as-sembly at one period when Mr. James Lynch, formerly president of the Typographical Union, and now mem-ber of the New York State Industrial Commission, read the paper which had bean reserved for the greatest friend of labor, John Mitchell of the United Mine Workers' Union, who recently died. Both Mr. Lynch and Mr. Mitch-ell have stood out as among the fore-most representatives of trades union-ism and indeed the vertex of trades union-

and indeed the worker in America.
The gist of Mr. Lynch's address was that a business of which the risks to exist at the expense of the worker.
Not only cure, but also rehabilitation, was the necessary end of all plans for the weal of the worker. This haa been amply shown in the attitude of all countries toward their defenders and should be shown no less to the injurred industrial worker.
