MCKENZIE ALLEGES "MEIGHEN" WIRE CAUSE FOR QUORRY

Matter of Soldiers' Vote Allotment Starts Old-Time Debate in Commons.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Sept. 24.—There was an old-time debate in the commons today with party feeling running high.

The telegram about which the house was so much exercised today was first produced at the national Liberal convention by Mr. John Adamson, a Winnipeg lawyer, who was Liberal candidate in Selkirk constituency.

Alleged Fraud. In so far as the voting overseas was concerned, he said that if a parliamentary inquiry was authorized it could be shown that much fraud had been practiced.

Mr. Meighen in reply said: "I have said before and I repeat now that I do not recall sending this telegram. I have absolutely no recollection of it."

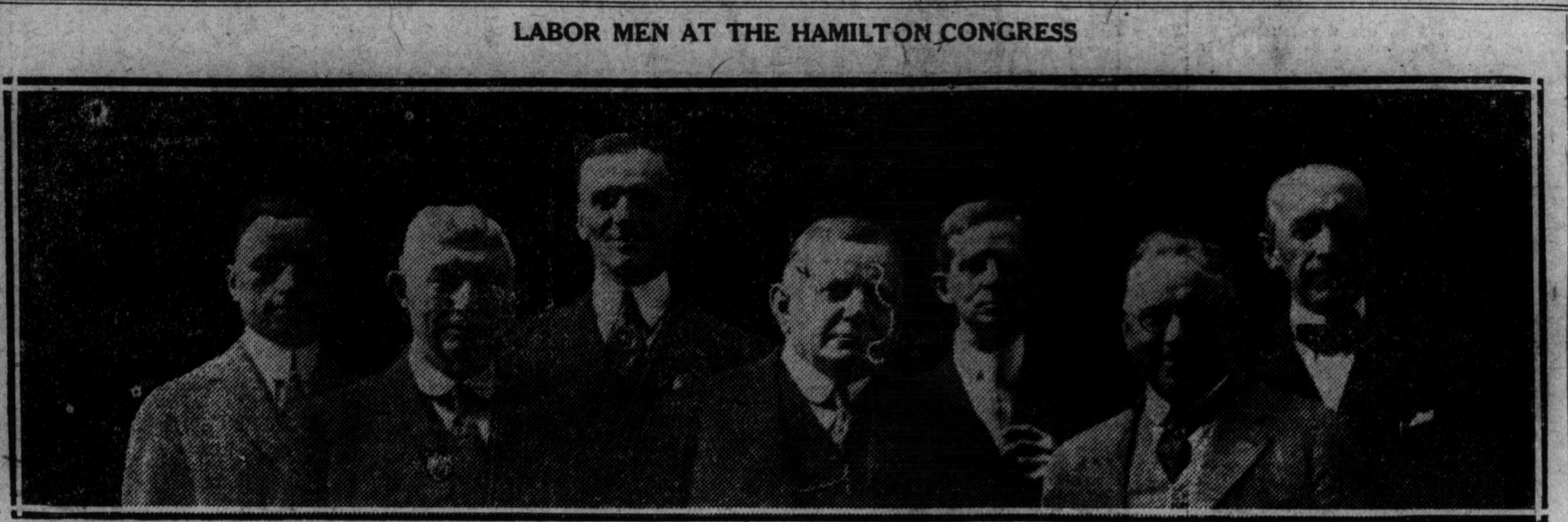

BRITISH CABINET TO FURTHER NEGOTIATE WITH RAILWAY MEN

Declare Misunderstanding Led to Threat of Workers to Strike.

London, Sept. 24.—By a curious coincidence, on the day Sir Eric Geddes had formally taken up his new duties as minister of transport the government was confronted by an ultimatum threatening stoppage of the whole railway system of the country unless a basis for the standardization of the men's wages, which has been in dispute since the month of March, is settled to the men's satisfaction.

The suddenness of the action of the National Union of Railwaymen is inexplicable, Sir Eric agreed arrangements for the war wages of the railway workers operate until the end of the year, allowing still three months for further negotiations.

It is recalled that the Glasgow congress avoided a straight vote on direct action, and the miners' federation is at present engaged in a great campaign to secure nationalization of the mines, which the government has so far refused.

MOST CRITICAL DAY OF BIG U. S. STRIKE HAS BEEN REACHED

Declare 342,000 Steel Workers Now Out

By Associated Press. The third day of the great steel strike passed without either capital or labor having made any apparent material gains.

From their respective headquarters, industrial leaders and directors of the strike issued their usual conflicting statements which left still in doubt the exact number of workers who have walked out.

As in Pittsburg, the situation in Chicago also was clouded by conflicting reports. The industry in that section, the crippled by the closing of many plants, was by no means tied up and company officials claimed additional forces with which they were continuing operation.

Expect Big Plant to Close. The leaders of the strike, as shown by their declarations that the strike is spreading, are not giving up the attack, but predict that with the coming of more organizers they will gradually shut down all the important works.

Montreal Star Urges Restoration of Conservative Party and National Policy.

Special to The Toronto World. Ottawa, Sept. 24.—The Montreal Star, which has been strongly opposing the nationalization of the Grand Trunk, but otherwise has been giving a friendly support to the Union government since its formation two years ago, is out tonight in a long editorial urging a return to the two-party system and the restoration of the Conservative party with the national policy as the chief plank in its platform.

One by one the Liberal members of parliament, the supporters of the Union government's war measure have broken away. Only a few of these have rejoined the Liberals, but the others have joined the Conservatives.

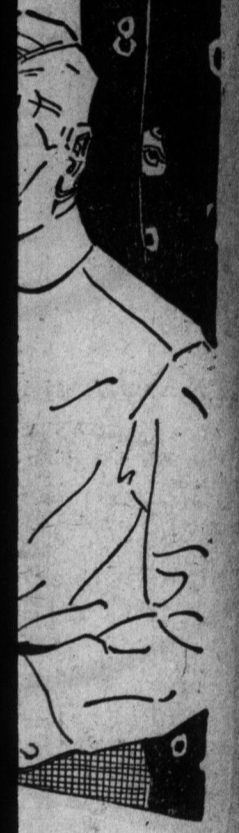
Second Largest Plant in Toronto Sold to Columbia Graphophone Co.

Once Market Garden. This 10 acres was used as a market garden for over forty years before the big plant was erected on it.

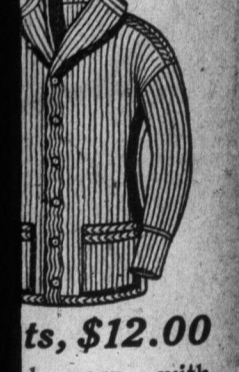

HIGHER PAY CURE FOR OCCASIONALS

Management Committee Find Inspector Cowley's Report Very Helpful.

Higher pay was the sure and only cure for weakness in the occasional school staff according to the information given the management committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon. Chief Inspector Cowley's report against the organization of a fully salaried staff for occasional teaching gave rise to a discussion in which the mover of the proposition accepted the inspector's information as "very helpful."

Variation Too Great Dr. Stevie said that the inspector's reports showed too great a variation, from twenty to over a hundred occasions required, for a permanent staff of experienced teachers to be organized for the occasional work.

Mrs. Groves said the foregoing fact had to be considered and she would therefore modify her original proposal by reducing it to a motion for a minimum sized supply staff of qualified teachers.

Dr. Noble: You could not get a worse system than the present. Bad for the teacher and bad for the pupils. Chief Inspector Cowley said increased pay had brought an improvement of 140 teachers on the present list, 50 per cent. did well, 25 per cent. did fairly well, 25 per cent. were less satisfactory. Another increase in the rate of pay this time to \$6 a day would bring further improvement in the teachers available. This solution of the problem was favored as soon as it could be put into operation.

Motion pictures and stereopticon views are to be made extensive use of in the Toronto public schools. The committee was unanimous in the immediate purchase of twenty picture machines at a cost of \$2,362. The cost for five films a week for each machine will cost \$1250 for the school year. The picture machines will be taken in turn from school to school.

H. E. Armstrong, returning from overseas service, was assigned to Fern Avenue School. Additional class rooms were ordered opened at Niagara Street, Home-wood, Glendon, Keele Street and Carlton Schools. At Keele Street and Carlton Schools extra classes are already formed and are running on part-time sessions owing to lack of accommodation.
