ADVANTAGES OF PUBLIC OWNERSHIP. Public ownership is making such rapid advances in public favor, both in Canada and the United States.

Now that this prophetic invocation is coming true, more than a generation after its utterance, Major Robert Larmour, of Stratford, Ont., has issued a pamphlet form, under the title of "Canada's Opportunity," a review of Butler's "Great Land," more particularly in its relation to present-day conditions and future prospects.

Major Larmour asks: "Why not induce another human wave, one that would roll across the Pacific from the Far East, where there are millions of human beings packed so closely together that they are constantly facing a state of starvation?"

In further support of his thesis the major asks further: "Upon what grounds do we people of Canada presume to hold that we are superior to the people of Asia as a whole, and to such an extent that to claim it is necessary to pass laws to prohibit them coming to us, while we make no objection to the coming of people from any nation or country of Europe?"

Major Larmour declares that the royal prince of Japan, who is said to be about to pass through Canada on his way home, and those who are with him, will not be overwhelmed with either our natural or racial greatness; they will be blinded by our obsequious entertainments and hospitality.

They will see and know us just as we are; our weaknesses, our prejudices, our presumption and our ignorance. They will see and know that the god we worship is mammon and not Christ, as we profess. What they will learn, he thinks, is something vastly more important, to try of vast dimensions, with illimitable resources, sparsely occupied by a mixed but vigorous and progressive people, under institutions that give free scope to energy and ability.

true to say that even with their scrupulous fulfillment of their duty to the people, the municipal services of Great Britain fail to make handsome profits. They do and what is more they are constantly reducing the public debt in respect of these franchises and relieving the municipal rates. It is to accomplish the same admirable ends that the Public Ownership League has been formed, and every Canadian who desires to aid in this great public reform should support it actively and earnestly.

"CANADA'S OPPORTUNITY." Thirty-five years have passed since Lieut. Butler, now Lieut.-Gen. Sir W. F. Butler, published his brilliant narrative of western Canadian travel, "The Great Lone Land."

It is the story of this adventurous journey which he tells with so much natural, if, perhaps, too rhetorical eloquence in his book, and the report he submitted to the Lieutenant-governor of Ontario, and his perspicacity in summing up the results of his observations, he declared that he looked upon the question he had been asked to answer from "the point of view which sees a vast country lying, as it were, silently awaiting the approach of the immense wave of human life which rolls unceasingly from Europe to America."

GRANT FOR GUELPH SCHOOLS. Request is made on Government for Additional \$1500.

Another \$1500 a year for the Guelph consolidated school was what Prof. Robertson, principal of the Macdonald Agricultural College at St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, considered the legislature should give as a duty.

He was speaking to the agricultural committee yesterday on "Consolidated Schools" and offered to meet such a grant with \$1200 of his own. Sir Wm. Macdonald and others would also contribute, he said.

The more the people tax themselves for education the better for them if the money be well spent, was his view.

He thought the time would come when the section school would give way to the consolidated school, to which he expects to be supported daily. The plan had been adopted in sixteen states. In 1905 there were 2000 consolidated schools, with 11,900 routes.

Mayor Craig praised the system as they had it in Guelph. It cost \$10,000 a year, and any grant made would have to be perpetual.

THE SHOE DERELICTS. Why They Never Have Old Shoes or Bargain Sales in a Slatter Store.

"What do you do with shoes that become shoddy or out of style?" asked a customer at Slatter shoe store.

"You never have any bargain sales in your stores. Now I know something about the shoe trade, and I can't see how you overcome the difficulty of stock accumulating."

Mr. McCrudden overheard the query and he answered it. "In the first place you have a standard price-stamped line to look after. We don't buy shoes from every plausible salesman and then accumulate a stock of conglomeration. The Slatter shoe stock is carefully kept and carefully gone over every week and every month. Shoes that stay on the shelves over a year are taken away, the brand removed from them, and they go to the dealer who makes a specialty of selling shoes by lottery. He likes to get the Slatter shoe without the brand, for it is the occasional prize in the lottery. But by expert stock-keeping we seldom have to send a shoe out of the store as a derelict."

This will expedite business as regards enquiries from buyers in search of Canadian goods, and will remove the necessity of the trade agent writing to the C.M.A. for information on the subject.

TO CURB EXTRAVAGANCE OF EDUCATION BOARD



City May Ask Government for Power to Control Maintenance Expenses.

Application to the legislature to allow the city council to exert powers of revision over the estimates for the maintenance of the schools prepared by the board of education is something likely to be made at the next session, from an intimation by Mayor Coatsworth last night.

At the present time the council has power only to deal with recommendations coming under the head of capital account, such as new buildings. In matters of salary and running expenses generally the trustees are privileged to prescribe what they will, and the very generous advantages that have been taken of the circumstances this year has brought matters pretty close to a climax.

The board of education will be asked to go over the items again and to use the pruning knife with freedom, but the council have little ground for hoping that the interests of economy will be served. Harassed by the difficulties in the way of keeping the tax rate down, the board of control have little sympathy with the easy extravagance of the trustees, but it is the government only that can mend matters.

The mayor looked worried in discussing the tax rate.

"We're not nearly thru yet," he said. "We're having a fight all along the line in the matter of salaries. There are a number of improvements, including the storm overflow sewer that are absolutely necessary."

New Car Line Proposed. Aid. Whittick, who has been looking carefully into the problem of street traffic congestion on Yonge-street, gave to the works committee yesterday a proposal that the city engineer will be called upon to consider.

The alderman's idea is that a single line of tracks should be laid along Gerrard-street from Yonge-street to Victoria-street, to Scott-street, meeting the line at Front-street and then forming a loop back to Yonge-street.

Aid. Whyte, who is firmly convinced that he has solved the knotty question for our city, is anxious to have the line used only for southbound cars.

As an old story, the narrowing of Massey-street, a vexed question, whose origin dates back to the time when R. J. Fleming was assessment commissioner, bobbed up again before the committee. Massey-street extends from King-street to Queen-street and is the first street west of Strachan-avenue.

Above Deane-street it is 66 feet wide, and below it has a width of 33 feet. The proposal is to make the street a uniform width of 66 feet, and to allow the extra 33 feet to be added to four feet depth of the lots fronting on Strachan-avenue, charging only \$3 per foot for the strip, save for the block at the northeast corner of King and Massey-streets, owned by the Massey estate, charging \$8 per foot therefor. As it will cost the city about \$700 or \$1500 to alter the water connections and shift the telegraph poles, the propertyholders are to be in line for a bonus. However, the city is not prepared to make a bonus, and the whole project is in the meantime held up.

On motion by the chairman, Aid. Geary, the city solicitor will advise a course.

Street Paving. F. A. Drake of the Asphalt Block Company requested that the question of paving Bloor-street, from Yonge-street to Avenue Road, should be re-opened, although the city council had endorsed the city engineer's recommendation, that the street be paved with concrete.

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FRENCH PIETY PRAISED BY U.S. REFORMED CHURCHES

Alliance Congratulates Brethren on Their Wisdom and Patriotism in Religious Crisis.

Philadelphia, March 1.—The letter greeting from the executive committee of the western section of the alliance of the Reformed churches throughout the world, holding the Presbyterian system to their brethren of the reformed churches in France, has been given out here by Rev. Dr. Wm. Henry Roberts, secretary of the commission and stated clerk of the Presbyterian general assembly.

According to Dr. Roberts, the commission represents fourteen Presbyterian and Reformed churches in the United States, with a constituency of 2,500,000 members, and about 7,000,000 adherents. Their brethren in France number about 100,000 communicants and 800,000 adherents. The letter in which they have expressed their sympathy and admiration for the French churches, and their regret that they cannot do more for them, is as follows:

"We have read with intense interest, and with growing sympathy for the crisis through which your churches are passing, the letter of the French churches, and we are glad to know that you are holding the line of the Reformed Church of France, for their wisdom and their piety in these years of uncertainty and anxiety."

"We rejoice to believe that the outcome of all will be for the advancement of Christianity in your country, and among its people, and that religious freedom will be insured and the human conscience enfranchised and set free."

"We welcome the news of the new condition of civil government with you, and that the new constitution is being formed from the civil power has met with your approval. We congratulate you on your cheerful obedience to the laws of France."

Continued From Page 1. stances were obliged to sell to Membray at a price and under terms which only brought the estate \$14,220. The Trust Company apparently felt that this was a case of "devouring widow's houses," and made no pretence about bringing before the notice of the license enquiry commission for investigation.

Another point which was touched upon and will come up again was the question of insurance of hotels and brewers thru License Commissioner D. M. Defoe. Mr. Defoe suggested that Mr. Defoe could be influenced by the prospect of insurance, yet several witnesses gave evidence that since he had become a license commissioner some insurance business had been diverted by the brewers and licensees into Mr. Defoe's hands.

Mr. Defoe was asked for the agreement which he had made with the brewers, but he refused to show it. He said he had left it at Lawyer Bailey's office. It was to "share and share alike," he said, with about 100 brewers, and Hynes to draw out what money he put in. He had first arranged terms with Dr. Neesham and Hynes had said he was acting for the doctor.

Hynes was then questioned concerning the license. His brother Fred owed \$10,000. He had a second mortgage of \$5000 was in favor of T. McGilvray. Cosgrave suggested that the \$10,000 mortgage on the Tynon license be canceled. TESTING THE CREDIBILITY OF COMPANY'S WITNESSES

Conductors Tell How They Arrive at Their Estimates of Passengers Carried.

In the city's case of complaint of overcrowding preferred against the Toronto Street Railway Company, the whole of yesterday was taken up in examining conductors' record books and recalling most of the conductors who had previously given testimony in a general way. It appears that such conductors who were told off by the street railway company to make count were supplied with a card to be filled out for each day, which they handed in at night. Perhaps a dozen of counters were recalled yesterday to substantiate their previous statements and to reconcile them with their own records. In a few instances, there were some inconsistencies, but these were pointed out to their text and reiterated their impressions on the absence of overcrowding.

Nearly all the men who have so far testified for the defence, and who had been deputed the task of counting passengers on the city street cars, had grown old in the service of the company, their terms of continuous employment varying from 12 to 25 years. The counts by the men were performed in various ways and ranging from an estimate to a declared exactitude. Several allowed the might have missed eight or ten in each car; others three or four; while an odd witness would say he made a precise census. Most of them counted from the street, others contended themselves with hurried estimates when a car was taking on or letting off passengers, while some few said they made it a practice to go through the cars when they stopped. Two or three conductors said that on one or two days the frost was so thick on the windows they could not make a reliable count, and one conductor asked to have his statement of Thursday retracted, as the day it was taken the frost on the King-street cars, where he had been sent to count, was so thick that he only guessed at the number of passengers hidden from his view.

Franks of Frost.

The testimony of some conductors on the respective streets taken on this particular day indicated that the frost must have been peculiarly local, as the cars on their lines showed clear glass and the uncrowded passengers sitting within. The great majority of the records of all the books showed the same point, and a general statement to the effect that the city idea of the existence or occurrence of overcrowding was as disease with the teachings of Christian Science—largely a matter of the imagination.

But the cross-questioning of Corporation Counsel Fullerton elicited the fact that nearly all the men made beyond the points where many original passengers could have naturally transferred to other lines. One conductor, with an Irish name, and pronounced Milesian accent, stated he did not count the cars he was in, and gave as his reason that it was only proper he should leave some leeway to reconcile his conscience, while another conductor stated that he had guessed a little and counted a little in making his estimates.

BY-ELECTION IN CARLETON WILL TAKE PLACE MARCH 18

Announcement is Made—Fire Protection in Schools—The Mining Bill.

The Speaker opened the business of the legislature yesterday by announcing that he had the official notification of the election of D. W. Ross, in West Middlesex. It is not improbable that he and W. A. Preston from Port Arthur will take the oath on Tuesday next.

The nomination for the by-election in Carleton, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of G. N. Kidd, will take place on Monday, the 18th. James M. Argue, South March, will be the returning officer.

Mr. Brant (Brant) called attention to the Montreal school disaster, which he thought due to four causes. The kindergarten children are placed on the upper floor, the stairways were inadequate, there was no fire drill and no fire escapes. The older children on the lower floor escaped in a minute's time. Fire escapes were practically a trap, and he was glad to hear from the minister of education that fire drills were being held in the schools.

Two-Cent Fare on T. & N. O.

Mr. J. B. Fennell's question if it was during the year was established on the fare on the T. & N. O. Railway and to provide for it upon all railways in Ontario. The question was put by proxy.

Hon. Dr. Reaume replied that it was a question of policy, which could only be decided by the declaration of the government from time to time. Opposition seats greeted this side-step.

The issue of special permits where discovery had been disallowed was abandoned. Partnership miner's license fees were fixed at \$5, instead of \$10. For companies the fee will be \$20.

Limited, to do business in Ontario, Mr. Crawford's respecting Mr. and Mrs. Prittie, and Mr. Mahaffey's to incorporate the Village of South River were read a second time.

To amend the act respecting municipal sanitaria for compulsive Mr. Downey introduced a bill.



MORGAN SCORES FOPOLD FOR EXPLOITING CONGO

U.S. Senator Charges That Concessionaires Are Empowered to Subdue Natives.

Washington, March 1.—Senator Morgan reported favorably to the committee on foreign relations to-day his resolution calling on the president for information as to any concessions American may have received from King Leopold for the gathering of India rubber in the Congo Free State.

Senator Morgan recites how capitalists of the United States were pushing into the rubber forests "with all manner of monopolistic arrangements for the sake of profit, and the gift of nature—to their craving for wealth."

He arraigned scathingly Leopold, King of the Belgians, for the manner in which he has exploited the Congo lands by imposing taxes of personal labor to the extent of cruelty upon the native population.

Mr. Morgan charges that concessionaires have been empowered by King Leopold to "exercise the same distressing authority over the people which they have possessed to enforce without restraint and without the responsibilities to public opinion which should check their avarice and greed in dealing with an ignorant and unjudged people."

Mr. Morgan takes the position that the United States by its negro population descendant from Congo parents, is especially obligated to support a movement to reserve to the native population the wealth of Congo products. He says any concession granted to King Leopold by the citizens of the United States is not valid, unless confirmed by the signatory powers to the Brussels Act, signed in 1890.

The senator declares that if the American company has not communicated its transactions to the government of the United States; it is the plain duty of the United States government to enquire into all the terms and conditions of the grant.

Russian General Lived an Hour Longer Than His Time.

St. Petersburg, March 1.—The following details of the murder Wednesday at Krasnoyarsk, Siberia, of Gen. Kozlovsky, the commandant of that town, have been received here.

The general was walking on the street at five o'clock in the afternoon, with some friends, and he referred jokingly to a threatening letter he had received that day, saying he would be killed at five o'clock the afternoon.

Drawing his watch from his pocket the general remarked, laughingly, to his friends: "You see I am still alive."

About ten o'clock, when Kozlovsky was returning home alone, a man suddenly called upon him to halt and he fired three revolver shots at him. The general dropped dead.

SCHOLARSHIP FOR MULLOY.

Movement on Foot to Send Blind Trooper to Oxford.

Ottawa, March 1.—A movement is afoot among regimental officers to send the blind trooper Mulloly, injured in the South African war, and who is B.A. of Queen's University, to Oxford University. The desire is to obtain for him a Rhodes scholarship.

Bounties on Oil.

Ottawa, Ont., March 1.—Hon. Mr. Templeman has procured the second reading of a bill to amend the Petroleum Bounties Act. The bill provides that the farmer will receive the bounty upon his share of the oil produced on his land. At present the entire bounty is paid to the oil producer, although the farmer or lessor is usually entitled to one-eighth of the oil produced. It was generally favored by the members from Western Ontario. The law will apply to cases even where the lease by its terms gives the bounty to the producer, but in every case there must be order by the governor-in-council. This feature was objected to by Messrs. Armstrong and Clements. The bill remained in committee.

FRANCE TO RAISE ALL HER COTTON IN THE COLONIES

Association of Manufacturers Gets Big Results From Its Seed Tests in Dependencies.

Paris, March 1.—The French Colonial Cotton Association, which was started three years ago by the French cotton manufacturers, with the object of exploring the French colonies for the purpose of ascertaining where cotton could be grown advantageously, has obtained some surprising results that seem to warrant their confidence that the French colonies in a few years will be able to supply a considerable portion of the raw cotton consumed in France.

In round figures, France bought over 400,000 francs worth of raw cotton last year, chiefly from the United States. Unlike the British Cotton Growers' Association, the French Society was not organized with the object of profiting but with the purpose simply of furnishing free seed to the colonies for seed purposes. The understanding that the association would buy all cotton produced.

Seeds were sent to Algeria and Tunis, the French Sudan, Senegal, French Congo, Dahomey, Madagascar and Indochina and Guadeloupe.

American seed was principally used, the best results being obtained with Mississippi, Louisiana and Sea Island. Last year, the colonial office backed the work of the society with a subvention of 50,000 francs.

The best established in the colonies, where experiments have been made and the society has mapped out the cultivation of the cotton plant in the colonies, which it is believed, are capable of producing almost limitless quantities of cotton soon as proper railroad and transportation facilities are furnished.

The tract back of the ivory coast alone, it is believed, easily can furnish 1,000,000 bales annually under systematic cultivation.

For the coming year, the society estimates the output from their experiments at 500 bales.

FAVORABLE IMPRESSION.

Admiralty Pleased With Visit of Newfoundland Reserves.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, March 1.—The English Zionist Federation is endeavoring to draw the ties closer of federations in the United States, Canada and other colonies.

The first lot of the admiralty's annual statement includes reference to the visit of the Newfoundland naval reserve, and says a most favorable impression was created by their general appearance and the actual operation of the squadron in which they served reported in high terms on their conduct and efficiency.

A NECESSARY PARK IMPROVEMENT

Editor World: Since many business calls me to cross the Queen's Park, particularly the northern end, almost daily, I have been much impressed with the great improvement shown in getting the paths cleared of snow on the same day as it fell, instead of leaving it for one or two days, as has been the case in the past. There is another improvement sadly needed, however, viz., some kind of temporary walk which could be laid down when these paths are flooded, as they always are, in spring till the snow and frost are gone and the paths dried again. This is the only outlet from St. George-street to Yonge-street between Bloor and College-streets and the paths have to be used constantly by many children and students to reach their schools, as well as others in various occupations, and the water often being more than ankle-deep it is a positive danger to the health of a large number of people. Occasionally relief is attempted by placing odd boards at the worst spots, but these are soon kicked out of place and do no good. A lady of my acquaintance was in such a plight on one occasion as to how she could get over that a workman employed near took pity on her, picked her up bodily and carried her across.

MAY CHANGE PLAN OF TAX BUT WILL NOT REMOVE IT

Hon. Mr. Cochrane's Reply to Cobalt Deputation—Daplores the "Boom."

Hon. Frank Cochrane made no change in his attitude on the taxation of mines yesterday in addressing the Cobalt deputation which came to protest against such a policy. He has met several deputations recently on the same question and uses similar language to all. Premier Whitney also assured the gathering that the bill would be passed, the object of alteration.

The delegation based their opposition on the grounds that the measure was special class legislation and against public policy, as the mining development increased public resources. It would be unfair to people who bought shares in mines with the belief that there would be no change in the law. Previous declarations of the legislature, that mining property would be free from royalty, taxes and duty, rendered it a breach of faith. Instead of a penalty, the government should place a premium on mining operations.

C. A. Masten, representing the Drummond mine and iron interests, pleaded for delay. Mineral lands were already taxed as agricultural lands. Income was taxed. The tax would be a third on mining interests. The act he believed would apply to the Don Valley Brick Works as it is drawn, and he would have it left over for a year.

W. M. Boulbee, representing the Comagis Mine, submitted that they had protested last January, but Mr. Cochrane thought this mine had least cause of any for complaint. All the government ever got out of it was \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 mine was \$120,000. Mr. Boulbee said they had paid the T. & N. O. Railway \$10,000 for surface rights.

Don't Have to Pay.

Walter Sadler, Cobalt, wanted fuller consideration of the bill. Many mines had not yielded dividends or profits, he said.

"They won't have to pay the tax," was Mr. Cochrane's comment.

E. L. Frailek, Cobalt Lake Mining Co., presented the resolutions adopted at the recent meeting. He thought the whole area was yet only in the experimental stage, and would postpone taxation till the mines were on a paying basis. It would be impossible to have an assessor sufficiently expert to arrive at the value of the property.

Mr. Cochrane thought the mine-owners and the assessor could arrive at the market value together.

G. C. Blackstock, K.C., thought the whole proposal was the result of the mining boom. Nobody knew whether the tax would be a blessing or a curse, and time should be taken for investigation. Investors would only invest in shares if they were assured this would be a great injustice to properties not yet producing.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane said the mining men had been notified last week of the intended tax. It was mentioned in the speech from the throne, yet there had been no protest until ten days ago. It was unfair to wait till the last minute. Railways, banks, trusts, industrial corporations, and others had paid the tax on railways was doubled and he saw no justice in the argument that Cobalt mine profits should not stand their share.

"The mode of taxation may be a matter of argument, in which I am ready and anxious to have assistance and counsel," he declared.

Whereas the Danger Lies.

"Let me tell you straight as a man," he continued, "that I believe the present conditions of speculative boom which you deplore are caused by the mining men and brokers themselves. They have gone on filling the papers with reckless statements not calculated to help your district. They are not mining men rose to contradict or counteract this attempt to manufacture a stock boom out of what should be an honest enterprise. Let me tell you men of my own district that it is far more injurious to the getting of capital to develop the mineral resources of this province than any tax we can put on the profits."

One corporation, the Canadian Copper Co., had expressed its willingness to pay a reasonable tax, and only objected to the graduated scale. That, however, met differences in ability to pay. Cobalt was favorably treated and well situated compared with other mining camps. Disputes could be settled at a minimum of expense. The T. & N. O. Railway was a great benefit to the industry.

He did not like the proposal to tax certificates, as many companies were American and would escape it, as they did the income tax.

Mr. Cochrane, in conclusion, invited the deputation to form a committee, with whom he could confer on matters of detail in the bill. He wished to make its operation as easy as possible, and would join with them in working out any amendments necessary, keeping the interests of the province in view.

In Popular Demand.

Premier Whitney remarked that nine-tenths of the adult population demanded the tax. The government powers of taxation were being lawfully used. The mining industry could well support the tax. Public opinion was seldom far wrong and the government followed the following line.

Besides those mentioned above the hundred or more present were: H. B. Gamew, W. R. Smyth, C. N. Smith, J. Aubin, John Ferguson (North Bay), Deputy Minister Gibson, and Professor Miller.

INDEPENDENT TELEPHONES IN HALDIMAND COUNTY

Caledonia, Hagersville and Dunnville Companies Have Merged into One.

Caledonia, March 1.—About the middle of last November organizers sent out by the Provincial Long Distance Telephone Company commenced the work of starting and assisting in the organization of local independent telephone companies in Haldimand County.

Local people at once became interested in the matter, and franchisees were granted in Caledonia, Hagersville and Dunnville.

These independent interests have now become consolidated under the name of the Dunnville Consolidated Telephone Company, Limited, and have obtained contracts empowering them to conduct telephone business in the County of Haldimand and in the Townships of Welland, Lincoln, Wentworth and Brant, immediately adjacent to Haldimand. The company has power to operate up to within four or five miles of Hamilton, and practically to the limits of Brantford.

In Caledonia a couple of weeks ago, so the local papers state, the company and its subscribers were organized in the village and seventy among the neighboring farmers, and we understand that the number has since been largely increased.

At Wellandport, twenty subscribers were obtained in one evening.

The Dunnville company report about four hundred subscribers to date, and having bought thirty-nine miles of pole and great quantities of wire, a telegraph company, are commencing to string wires on a trunk line from Dunnville to Caledonia, passing thru Cayuga and York.

In the southwestern part of Haldimand the Erie Telephone Company, Limited, and its subscribers have been most successful since last summer, has over one hundred and fifty phones installed in the county, and in three weeks ago obtained a franchise from Cayuga, the county town.

Independent development might be compared with the following item in The London Free Press from Gloucester, where the Bell has been for some time.

Gloucester, Feb. 28.—The Bell Telephone Company have been busy here lately installing telephones. They now have fifty subscribers, including the branch offices at Appin, Wardsville, Newburgh, Woodgreen, Strathburn and Kilmarin.

CIRCULAR TO HOLDERS.

Brought About Innocent Selling of Silver Leaf.

The recent slump in Silver Leaf was understood yesterday by the unearthing of a circular which had been scattered broadcast among shareholders thru the country, predicting a heavy fall in the shares and advising those holding the stock to sell in orders immediately to sell it. Whatever prompted the circular, partially effected its purpose, and upwards of 80,000 shares were thought to have been sold at Toronto during the last few days. Those who are interested in the company in a large way refused to support the stock in the market. They were apprised of the duplicity of the innocent shareholder and until the price reached their own figures refused to take a share. At between 15 and 16 they took all the stock offering, and are said to have picked up nearly 50,000 shares. The stock was unusually scarce at Toronto yesterday, and any large buying orders could not have been filled except at a big advance.

NO LAWSUIT PENDING.

Cobalt Central Withstands the Attack of Bearish Clique.

New York, March 1.—We are informed that it is rumored that certain law suits are pending and an effort will be made to attack the title to the Big Pete Mine. This is evidently inspired by a clique of bearish manipulators in New York, with a view to maliciously depressing the price of Cobalt Central Mines Company stock on the New York and Toronto exchanges. There is no law suit pending, as stated, nor can any law suit be successfully maintained to affect the title to the Big Pete Mine, as this title to this property is a crown patent from the Ontario government, as can readily be ascertained by an examination of the records. A determined effort was made today to break the market price of Cobalt Central, but this was impossible, the market closing strong, 48 bid and offered at 49.—Thomas Nevins & Son.

PETERSON LAKE CONTROL

Passes to New York Boston Capitalists.

The rumored change in the control of the Peterson Lake was confirmed last night. Numerous offers for the control of this famous claim have been made and it was thought that a London, England, syndicate would be a successful competitor. It is now announced that a strong financial syndicate of New York and Boston capitalists has secured the majority interest in the property. Mr. J. A. Jackson, of the Kerr Lake Mining Co., confirmed the rumor last night at the King Edward Hotel. The purchasing syndicate will at once put 50 to 75 men to work on the property sinking a shaft. Fifteen distinct veins have been traced to the lake from the Nipissing, Nova Scotia, Savage Mines and Gullies Timber Lintia. In addition to this 500 ft. of 20 men will be started digging trenches along the banks of the lake about the present water level. The total area of the Peterson Lake property is 228 acres and with the lowering of the lake upwards of 175 acres will be uncovered. This the second largest claim in the Cobalt camp. The interests who have purchased control of the property have had the best engineers of the continent report on the claim, and are confident that the Peterson Lake will show up equal to any of the Cobalt properties.

New Strike at Cobalt.

Cobalt, Ont., Feb. 28.—A diamond drill which was working on the north half of the northwest quarter of the south half of lot 3, con. 6, Coleman, about the Silver Bird Mine, has struck two veins 4 and 6 inches wide showing high value in silver and cobalt. These veins were cut by the drill at a depth of 100 feet below the surface. The distance between the veins is 100 feet apart and run north-west and south-east, directly into the Silver Bird property. The strike was made near the east end of the property and within 60 feet of the west line of the Silver Bird. A shaft is now being sunk to reach these veins.

This strike demonstrates positively that the silver veins are extending northeast of the Town of Cobalt. This has increased the demand for Silver Bird shares here, to-day, as it has practically proven that there are valuable silver veins in the north end of the Silver Bird property as well as at the south end, where that company are now working in three veins in their shaft.

It is rumored that there is soon to be a big advance in Silver Bird.

PATRIOTIC ADDRESSES TO HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

Inspector Hughes, J. P. Murray and Dr. Clouse Address Harbord C. I. Students.

Harbord-street Collegiate Institute was yesterday the scene of an event unique in the annals of the education institutions of the city, and one which the founders are hopeful to see emulated in every school and college. While in the past month a meeting of all the teachers was held, at which the question of the more thorough inculcation of British principles in the minds of the pupils was discussed, and at which it was resolved to lose no opportunity to advance the views outlined, yesterday a meeting in Harbord followed as the first fruits, while the anniversary of the Battle of Passburg was being celebrated, and in conjunction with the celebration of the Empire Club, who acting in conjunction with the teaching staff, extended and over the Dominion.

"Patriotism and Perseverance" was the keynote of an admirable address by Inspector Hughes, in which he reviewed briefly many stirring scenes in the history of Canada, and urged the students to advance the traditions of their forefathers. In commerce, literature, and art, as well as in the sphere of athletics, Canada was already a great nation, and in competition with the world had amply demonstrated her prowess.

J. P. Murray of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association spoke on the subject of "Canada and a United Empire." "Individuality now, as never before," said Mr. Murray, "receives the consideration it deserves, and the best of a pupil is considered, with the result that young men and women are to-day choosing for themselves, and rightly so, the profession they aspire to."

He deprecated the indiscriminate reading of American papers and periodicals as tending to create morbid views in the minds of the readers. Lack of fealty to British institutions was one of the marked signs of the times, and visitors from the United States were sure to draw wrong conclusions from this fact. Education had hitherto been of a two-fold nature—academic and commercial—and we should add another, that of a national character, which must of necessity be incorporated in the other two. The scope of the university was widening, and whereas graduates from the latter were a few years ago regarded as loaded down with culture, commercial and business, they were to-day drawing some of their best men from this source.

The duty of the federal and Ontario governments was to take a forward step in the establishment of technical high schools throughout the Dominion.

Dr. Clouse urged greater loyalty among the students of Canadian colleges in post-graduate work, and, instead of completing the educational course in American and German universities to visit British institutions, thereby tending to cement national and patriotic ties.

Principal Hagarty stated that at the present time two ex-Harbord-street pupils were in attendance at Oxford University, where they had won high laurels.



QUESTIONS LEGALITY.

Toronto Lawyer Would Apply Law Test to Suggested Mining Tax.

"The proposed tax on mines," said S. R. Clarke to The World yesterday, seems to me an innovation. So far as I know, it has no counterpart in any English-speaking country. Indeed, there are the gravest possible doubts as to the power of the legislature in the present case. A number of properties at Cobalt have been sold on special conditions, the government reserving expressly a royalty or tax of from 10 to 25 per cent. Pine and other timber lands are generally sold on special terms as to payment. In these cases, of course, there can be no question—the buyer must pay his stumpage fees or royalty. The proposed tax on mines will, if valid, abolish all distinctions between conditional and absolute sales by the crown. But that is the least objection to it from the standpoint of legality. It will single out one industry for special charges and burdens. On principle there is no difference between one and another. They are both part of the farmer's field, or the fruit in his orchard. It is of the very essence of a

tax that it bears equally on all industries, and on all sections of the community, and by changing the name it is not possible to change the nature of the burden. If the profits of a mine are not to be taxed, why not also the profits of a factory, store or farm? Even if we concede that the successful mine brings a large sum to the owner, on what ground can it be said that this extra profit can be diverted to general public purposes? The leveling up of the general process does not obtain in the world of industrial progress. If it did, there would be neither millionaires nor paupers. When a mining property is granted by the crown, free from any special taxes or royalty, the profits are just as much entitled to exemption from differential taxes as the profits of a farm. No one denies that mines must pay their fair share of the general burdens, but it seems to me the proposed discrimination against Cobalt is entirely unconstitutional. If a special tax of 25 per cent. can be levied, there may on the very same grounds be a levy of \$100,000 or more, and the same arguments are free from any imposition in the way of royalty or otherwise, all being abrogated. This would not be keeping faith with the grantees, and would be contrary to the express contract between them and the crown. "Would it not be wise to consult the law officers of the crown as to whether the proposed impositions are not confiscation pure and simple?"

ONTARIO NOT PROTECTED BY MINISTERS AT OTTAWA

No One to Protest Against an Assault on an Important Industry of the Province.

Oshawa, March 1.—(Special.)—The attack upon the malleable iron industry by the Dominion government in its recent tariff revision, brings into bold relief the fact that the interests of the Province of Ontario are not properly safeguarded by the representatives from this province in the cabinet at Ottawa. The manufacture of malleable iron is an industry peculiar to this section of the Dominion of Canada. Outside of this province there is not a single concern that pretends to turn out this line of manufactured goods.

From articles in the press it is quite clear that 10,000 people are dependent for subsistence upon that small feature of the industry covered by the item in the tariff recently disturbed. It is not a subject for amusement that no cabinet minister at Ottawa from Ontario was sufficiently conversant with the facts about this great industry to raise his voice in defence of these 10,000 people from this province, who were so injuriously affected by the proposed heavy tariff.

Mr. Aylesworth, the eminent jurist, has not been sufficiently long associated with political life even to know that these industries are in existence. Poor Hyman was so concerned over his health, and Sir Robert Coates was so busy contemplating his advanced years, was busy discussing the old age pension resolution, while the vigorous and able members of the cabinet in person of Mr. Fielding was apparently concocting a scheme to advance the steel industries of Nova Scotia at the expense of the malleable iron concerns of the Province of Ontario.

The builders of harvest machinery have stated that they are not responsible for the injury done to the malleable iron works, but lay the blame for this recent suggestion at the doors of the steel and bar iron makers. If this be the case, and it now looks reasonable, then the advantage of which education appears the more obnoxious, by virtue of the fact that the steel and iron bar industries are not duty bound to pay a good stiff tariff, but the cash bounties paid to these firms now amount to an enormous figure, one of the most favored of which is located at Sydney, N.S., where they have also the advantage of coal in native mines which they do not pay for, whereas the malleable iron people of Ontario have to pay a duty of 53 cents a ton on coal and \$2.50 per ton on pig iron.
