DR. DIXON SENT FOR TRIAL

MRS. MINNIE DIXON TELLS HER STORY IN COURT.

Says for Husband Abused Her with His Tongue and Also Slapped and Other-wise Ill-Used Her-Their Life in Al-pena, Mich., and in Chatham-The

Judge Denounced the Doctor. Chatham, Ont., March 25.—This morning the case of Dixon v. Dixon for nonsupport was again taken up at the Police Court. During this time an uncle of Mrs. Dixon paid all the expenses of the couple. A child was born to Mrs. Dixon in Alpena. It was still born.

Their Life is Chatham.

Complainant, proceeding, stated that they then came to Chatham, she preceding the defendant. Since coming to Chatham he had abused her, slapped her twice and called her vile names. On one occasion he told her he would spot, her face with vitrol or carbolic acie if she asked him again for money. St. was willing to live with him if she could be protected against cruelty.



An Interesting Paper on the True Principles of Becorative Art.

Rev. Edward W. Huntingford, professor of classics, Trinity University, delivered a lecture yesterday afternoon before the above society in their rooms, Canada Life Building, on "Decorative Art," Principal Loudon, Toronto University, occupied the chair.

The lecturer pointed out that there were more people in the world who have no sense of beauty than was generally supposed, and he took generally a somewhat pessimistic view of the appreciation that is felt by the public for true art. Appreciation demanded intellect and knowledge. In many cases people had not the former quality, and had no time to acquire the latter. He had a few good-natured satires to cast on the aesthetic craze, as it existed in England some 15 years since, and then passed on to speak of what constitutes real and true art. "Lack of taste, as well as lack of virtue," said the lecturer, "is one of the characteristics of fallen nature." He was specially severe on the Rococco style of art and rejoiced that it was apparently dying out. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer when he concluded.



It would certainly be no compensation to me to feel that under such circumstances both Catholic and Protestant children would grow up hopelessly illiterate.


