THE R.M.C. OVER-MANNED A SCANDAL AT ST. CATHARINES

That is the opinion of Mr. Sandford Fleming, C.M.G. Ottawa, March 25.—(Special)—The minority report of Mr. Sandford Fleming, one of the official visitors to the Royal Military College, was presented to Parliament to-day, as well as the report of the Commandant of the college, Gen. Cameron, in reply to the strictures of the board. Mr. Fleming says that as he understands it the primary object of providing means of imparting a military education, and that this should be done in the best possible manner, having due regard to cost.

He says it is obvious to the visitor to the college that the institution is overmanned; for 87 cadets there is a staff of 37, exclusive of the catering department. In five years the college has turned out an average of less than 14 graduates per annum, the cost per graduate during that period has been \$550, of which the graduate himself pays \$140.

Mr. Fleming thinks the institution should be converted to a purely military one, and that cadets should be required to finish their civil education, not only at the college at excessive and unnecessary cost, before entering the college. Two years should suffice for the military training, Mr. Fleming points out that graduates in the past have had scant treatment in the matter of appointments in the public service of the Dominion.

International Boundary Report. The joint report of the International Boundary Commissioners—Messrs. Duffield and King—appointed to ascertain facts and data necessary to the permanent delimitation of the boundary line between Alaska and Canada, was presented to Parliament to-day. The report shows that the surveys of the two countries agreed approximately in their observations. The summit of Mt. St. Elias is found to be 241 miles east of the 114th meridian, that is to say, in Canadian territory.

Analysis of Fertilizers. The Inland Revenue Department has issued a bulletin giving the results of the analysis of samples of agricultural fertilizers. The number of various samples analyzed this year was 92, which exceeds those of last year by eight, and represents the greatest number of samples offered to Canadian consumers for any one year since the act came into operation.

WHY HE OPPOSED THE BILL

MR. COCKBURN'S ABLE SPEECH IN THE HOUSE

Separate Schools ought not to be made a plank in the platform of the Liberal-Conservative Party...

Following is a full report of the speech of Mr. Cockburn, M.P. for Centre Toronto, on the second reading of the Remedial Bill...

"I do not rise, Mr. Speaker, to discuss the propriety or impropriety of Separate Schools, or their comparative advantages or disadvantages...

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constituting 90 per cent of the entire population, this piece of legislation, we shall not keep up bitter religious and racial animosities, and we shall enter upon a struggle which will certainly culminate in the young giant province, a struggle, too, of which no man can see the end, and which will all too soon be a bitter and bloody one...

"The supreme law, in every country is the safety, peace and prosperity of the people—ultima lex suprema salus reipublice. It is in obedience to this principle that the members of the York (Mr. Maclean) ably expressed their views on the evening of the 14th inst. through the medium of the constitution, and the great universities and other bodies, the great universities and other bodies, the great universities and other bodies...

"I shall, therefore, vote against the bill. Firstly, because I am opposed to Separate Schools in Manitoba. Secondly, because the bill is an interference with the rights of the non-Protestant population of the province. Thirdly, because the bill is an interference with the rights of the non-Protestant population of the province...

"Even if it were the desire of the Parliament of Canada to redress the alleged grievance of the Catholic minority in Manitoba, such redress might be effected in a more judicious manner than by the bill which is now before the House. The bill is an interference with the rights of the non-Protestant population of the province...

"Then, too, I greatly fear that if this plank of Separate Schools is adopted by the Liberal-Conservative party, we shall bring a sea of troubles upon our heads, and cause an agitation to spring up, not only in our North-West Territories, but even in the Province of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, and Nova Scotia. We shall not only have the day not the hour when religious freedom may be aroused and the special interests of the non-Protestant population may be protected, but we shall have the day when the people of the North-West Territories, and even in the Province of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, and Nova Scotia...

"Mr. Speaker, let us leave the settlement of this question to Manitoba, she alone can satisfactorily deal with it. We cannot in truth enforce the provisions of this bill. We can safely leave the settlement of this question to the good sense and good feeling of our brethren in Manitoba. They are the ones who are directly affected by the bill, and they are the ones who are best qualified to judge of its merits and demerits...

"Sir, the people of Manitoba, as they toil, labor under great and peculiar difficulties in maintaining an efficient system of primary education, and the school taxes bear heavily upon them, however willing they may be to make the sacrifice. The large amount of land which is free from school taxes and the great extent of territory owned present no mean obstacles to efficiency in the education of the people. Separate schools in such a poor and sparsely settled population, laboring under these special disadvantages, would prove a most disastrous boon to the Catholic or any minority, and would practically condemn them to hopeless illiteracy, especially in view of the important fact that grants in the legislative school grants can be made to them by and no part of the public funds of the province can be made available for the support of Separate schools, unless by the voluntary act of the Legislature of Manitoba...

"The question also the right of any man to withdraw his educational contribution from the common school fund and devote it to the Separate education of his own children, I have no children to educate, but in view of the fact that illiteracy is dangerous, especially to a people where the franchise is all but universal, I am willing and ready to contribute my quota of taxes to the support of the common school system. I do not, however, have the right to demand that that contribution of mine shall be used to the advantage of, and that no one be allowed practically to nullify it by withdrawing or withholding his proportion, especially when by so doing, in a sparsely settled country like Manitoba, he may by his act really starve and close the public school in my district. It would certainly be a compensation to me to feel that under such circumstances both Catholic and Protestant children would grow up hopelessly illiterate...

"Not a Final Settlement. Then, too, this bill is not even a final settlement, nor is it so regarded by the supporters of the

minority themselves, for already in the order paper of this House notice has been given by them of their intention to extend the provisions of the bill, and in this bill itself the final clause reserves to the Parliament of Canada the power to make such further and other Remedial laws as the provision of section 2, 1870, and the decision of the Governor in Council may require...

"I fall to see any necessity for further investigation or information. Nothing is to be gained by such a course, but on the contrary it is attended by very grave danger. I desire to see the question settled now and for ever, and I think, like you, we should now resume the responsibility of our action before our constituents. I reaffirm my statement of last session that I am opposed to the proposed settlement, based as it is on the Remedial Order. I admit that the minority had the right to appeal and to lay their case fully before the Governor in Council, who is in duty bound to hear it, but I emphatically deny that they had thereby established any right to determine the question of the bill, and I have their appeal granted, and the special Committee of the Privy Council determined merely the question of the law, viz., whether the error-General had the power under the circumstances to interfere, not whether he should interfere.
