Both these stores were closed on July 28, and the agents of the two large corporations that control the trade of the Yukon announced that they had no more food to sell.

When the agents at the stores announced that no more food could be obtained there was consternation among the population. Into the town were crowded 20 people a day. Some of these brought their provisions, but many had none. It was evident the food supply outside the stores is not sufficient.
