Provided Its Product Comes Up to Specifications, Cayuga Lake Company Gets Contract.

SAVING OF \$2000 IS EXPECTED

Hamilton, Feb. 18 - The cost of cement is a question that is of considerable interest to the ratepayers. Last year the Board of Works, by purchasing American-made cement, saved the city nearly \$16,000. The loss of revenue to Canadian cement makers caused them to wake up, and their representatives asked the Council at a special meeting last Saturday to buy Canadian cement in place of the American article.

The Board of Works met to-night, and its most important business was the opening and considering of tenders, a good many being put in.

A. Conquest & Company, \$1.68, Vulcanite brand; Belhous, Dillon & Company, Northampton, Pa., \$1.85, Thorne Cement Company, \$1.69, Grey & Bruce Portland Cement Company, \$1.90, W. A. Freeman & Company, \$1.75, Nazareth brand.

CITY NEWS.

An Overdraft of \$10,000. The monthly board meeting of the House of Industry was held yesterday afternoon, Rev. John Gillespie presiding. The superintendent reported 168 inmates in the institution; 17 were admitted, 9 left, and 1 died during the month. The report of the Out-Door Poor Committee shows 184 families relieved, including 386 children. Supplies distributed were: Coal, 212,120 tons; 120 bushels coke; 241-2 cords wood; 1291 4-lb. loaves bread; 1228 lbs. rice; 1228 lbs. oatmeal; 664 lbs. sugar; and 166 lbs. tea. One hundred and seventy gallons of soup were given daily to needy ones. One hundred and four orders were issued for work test for fuel, and 39 performed the required work. The Casual Poor Committee reported 124 admitted for 1902 nights. The stone broken by casuals was 13 tons. The treasurer's statement shows an overdraft of \$107,184.

Hoefgen has \$50,000 on deposit to guarantee the completion of six miles of 3-cent railway by next fall.

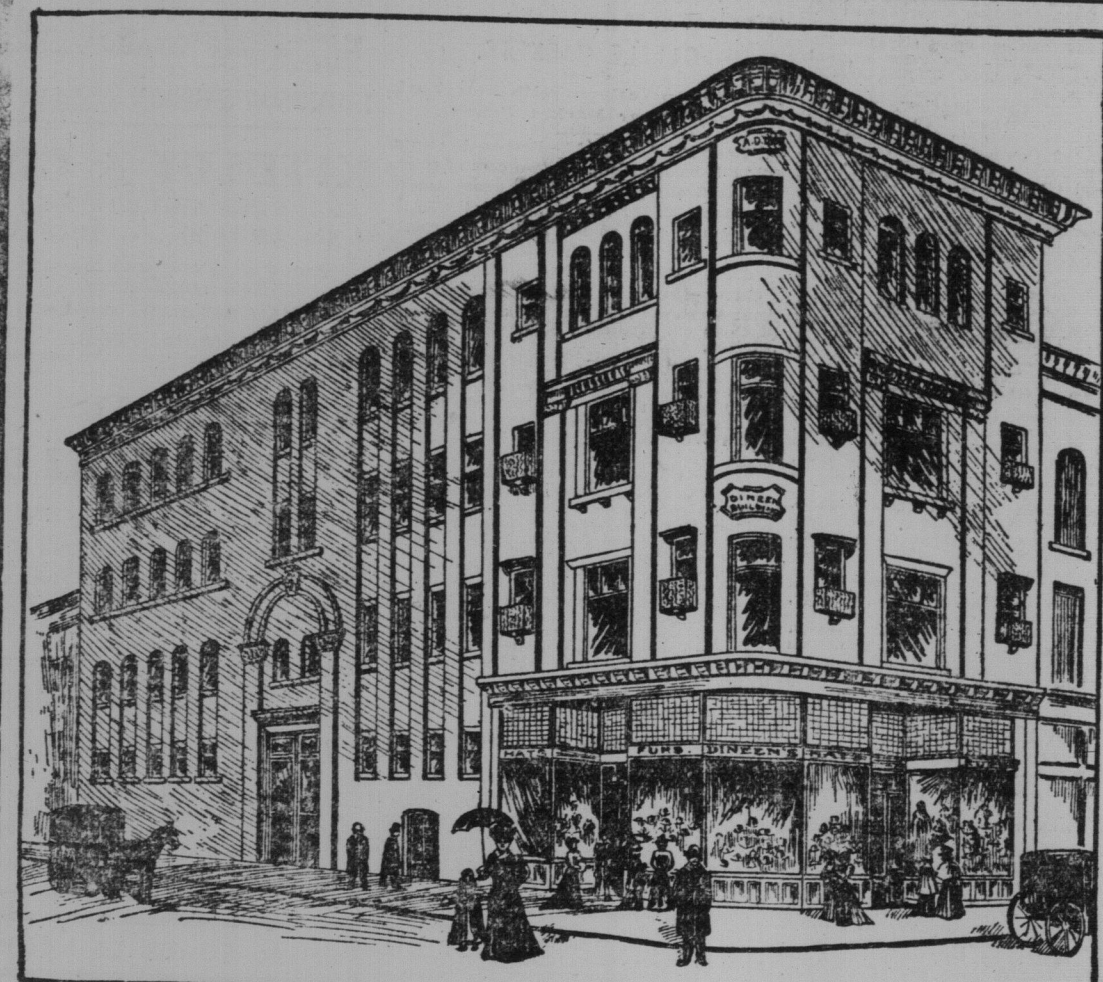
