## BREAK INFAMOUS CONTRACT BEFORE GRANTING SUBSIDY

## Member for East York Wants Bell Telephone Company's Hold on Stations Shaken.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—Altho the railway subsidies which were before the house to-day involved no vote, they were subjected to strong criticism. The Nicola Kamloops and Similklean Railway subsidy proved too strong even for such a staunch government supporter as William Gallihier, and in deference to his objections the resolution was dropped.

W. F. Maclean made a protest that not a cent of government subsidy should be granted to either the Grand Trunk or the C.P.R. until they can

The Nepigon Railway came in for its share of criticism. Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the only person he knew to be

acquainted with the road was James Conmee, M.L.A., Port Arthur. "That settles it," commented Major Fowler.

Col. Hughes told the house many things concerning Mr. Conmee. Mr. Conmee was interested in pulp timber and fishing concessions in the height of land at Lake Nepigon. His scheme was to sell the road to the Grand Trunk Pacific as a connector with Lake Nepigon.

To this Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that the charter was obtained before the Grand Trunk Pacific was projected. The Nipigon Railway would make an effort to get its road thru to the north and the south of Lake Nipigon as a line to take in supplies for the Grand Trunk Pacific.

that as yet not a mile of the railway was constructed, nor were there any settlers in that part of the country. There would not be any settlers, as Mr. Conmee and his associates had a monopoly on the resources of the country and settlers would be shut out.

Dr. Sproule gave the house an interesting history of James Conmee, pointing out that the member for Algoma had received extensive concessions in return for services rendered the Ross government when it was in a tight hole.

Mr. Gallhier of Yale and Cariboo also protested against the subsidy to the Nicola-Kamloops & Similkwan Coal and Railway Company, and it was dropped.
