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Address of the Session.

Doubtless the thought uppermost in the mind of all connected with the congregation at present is the vacancy in the pastorate.

When our late pastor, Rev. Dr. Kellogg, came among us, it was hoped that the settlement would be for many years. In the good and wise providence of God it is was otherwise determined.

Since the formation of the congregation —now forty years ago—the rich blessing of a faithful ministry has not been withheld. In sending his servants Dr. Taylor, Dr. Burns, Dr. King and Dr. Kellogg among us, the Head of the Church gave proof that His loving kindness has been great towards us as a people, and the happy influence of our earlier pastors as well as our later continues with us till this day. Their noble, self-sacrificing and sympathetic spirit did much to advance the growth of the congregation and deepen the Christian character of those who statedly waited on their ministry.

No unimportant events in the history of the congregation were Dr. Kellogg's accceptance of its charge, and, in a few years, his return to the field in which he had so faithfully laboured for upwards of eleven years.

He came to us, it is true, from another land, almost a stranger here, but the fellowship of Christian faith and Christian service at once made him one with us by close and tender ties. Very deeply engraved in our hearts is the record of his ministrations in our pulpit, at our weekly prayer meetings and in our homes; we shall never forget how he taught us to understand the Scriptures; opened up to us their meaning, he has helped us to see the significance and importance of the Old Testament in its relation to the New; and, has thus shown us in the clearest light the revelation of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, in the Sacred Word. And hereafter, when in reading the Scriptures we come upon one passage and another, which were illustrated by his expositions we shall constantly remember him.

The address setting forth more fully the mind of the congregation and which was presented to Dr. Kellogg at the farewell meeting held in the church last September, will be found in another part of this years' report.

Owing to the completed arrangements for Dr. Kellogg and his family to leave Toronto at a certain date, it was found impossible for him to be present and take part in the opening meeting of the Pan-Presbyterian Council, which was held in our church on the 21st September—the first of a series of meetings in our city, which will be long remembered, and will doubtless be fruitful of great blessing.

And now, dear brethren, while for a time we are without an under-shepherd it behoves us not to be discouraged, having faith in God and in His promises concerning His church—the church for which the Saviour died—we may be sure that he who has led us in the past will be our shepherd still. Our duty is to be loyal to Christ—abiding in Him by faith and abcunding in good works; loyal to one another also in advancing each other's good and in whatever makes for the peace and prosperity of Zion. Let not the love, then, of any wax cold, but by all the Lord has been to us be more united than ever—a people consecrated to the Lord, knit together in love.

The Session would like to assure the congregation that they have every confidence that the committee who have the matter in charge will spare no effort in obtaining the best possible supply for the pulpit during the with t

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The congregation is in the midst of an important crisis in its history, and it becomes everyone interested in its welfare to be much in prayer before the Lord until a new pastor is obtained.

While there has been a slight decrease in the number of members since Dr. Kellogg left, there has not been lacking evidences of the Holy Spirit's presence and work amongst us. The Sabbath School and Bible classes, the various missionary organizations, and the Society of Christian Endeavour are all actively engaged in their special spheres of usefulness, and with pleasing tokens of success. Many of our workers continue to take an active part in the Wilton Avenue Mission, and, as in 1891, so the past year also has been fruitful of good in connection with the work there carried on.

It is matter for devout thankfulness that connected with the congregation there are so many young men and young women who are devoted in the service of Christ, their desire being to work while it is called to day, seeing "the night soon cometh when no man can work." May the number of such still increase and their usefulness be more and more widely felt !

The congregation is also to be congratulated on the financial results for the year, alike for congregational and for missionary and benevolent purposes. The amounts received will compare favorably with previous years, and one happy feature in connection with all our efforts in this way is the fact that we have been able to devote as much money for outside purposes as we spent in support of ordinances amongst ourselves.

During the past year Death has taken from the earthly home nine members of the congregation. In all such changes we are reminded that "here we have no continuing city." How important that we should be earnest in the work given us to do, "strengthened with all might by His Spirit in the inner man," and so occupied in his service that when the Master shall call us we may receive the blessed welcome : "Enter ye into the joys of your Lord."

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ADDRESS TO DR. KELLOGG.

To the Reverend S. H. Kellogg, D.D., from the congregation of St. James Square Presbyterian Church.

Reverend and Dear Sir :

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The congregation of St. James' Square Presbyterian Church, on the termination of your pastorate among them and your proceeding to India in accordance with the appointment of the Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church of the U. S. A. and at the urgent request of the missionaries of different denominations in that country, to engage in Biblical revision and other work of great importance in the missionary field, cannot allow the tie which has so happily bound us as pastor and people to be severed without expressing our high appreciation of the able and faithful services which you have rendered to the congregation during the past six years.

Your pulpit administrations powerful, evangelical and searching; your ability in expounding, defending and applying Divine truth; and your marvellous skill in reconciling that truth with the ascertained truths of science, will always be remembered by us, and we trust that the word spoken by you will be treasured up in our hearts and bear fruit in our lives. The substantial increase in the congregation, notwithstanding the movement of so many from the more central parts of the city, and more especially the large number of young people from the families of the congregation who have been led, under your ministry, publicly to acknowledge Jesus as their Saviour, attest the zeal and earnestness with which you have laboured.

While gratefully acknowledging the hand of God in all that has been accomplished, the congregation recognize in you the chief instrument in their prosperity.

When we learned of the earnest and persistent efforts of the missionaries in India to secure your services for the work in which you are soon to engage, our first impulse was to endeavour to retain a pastor so beloved by us, so highly esteemed and so well and widely known by his writings; when however, you made it clear to us that you saw it to be your duty to undertake the important work so earnestly pressed upon you, and we considered your special fitness for that work, and the influence upon others of the great sacrifice you are making in going to India, we could not but acquiesce in your decision.

We desire to give united and hearty expression to our affection for you, and to express our gratitude for the blessings that have come to us through your faithful ministry which to our sorrow has come to a close.

And now in saying a loving farewell we commend you, your beloved partner in life and your family to the God of all grace. May his blessing abundantly rest upon you in the important work of your new office so that the cause of Christ shall be greatly promoted by your labours and millions in India may read in their own tongue the wonderful works of God.

And finally may you and we, each in his own sphere, by God's grace, be enabled faithfully to serve our Master, and at last obtain an abundant entrance into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

ABSTRACT OF

(Minutes of Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The thirty-ninth Annual Meeting of the congregation was held in the lecture-room on Wednesday evening the 18th of January, 1893.

Revd. Dr. Caven, Moderator of Session, occupied the chair and conducted the Devotional exercises.

On motion to that effect, Mr. John Paton was appointed Secretary.

The chairman read a statement, showing the present membership of the congregation to be 683, as compared with 704 at the close of 1891.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting having been printed and distributed among the members of the congregation, were taken as read.

The Secretary read the Report of the Managers for 1892, and its adoption was moved by Mr. A. Allan, seconded by Mr. William Gordon.

Mr. Wm. Kerr. moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Marcon, "that the Managers' Report be adopted, with the exception of the clause recommending that the contributions for ordinary congregational purposes, be published with the Church Reports."

On a vote being taken the amendment was declared carried.

The Treasurer read his statement for the past year, and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. McIntosh, which motion was declared carried.

The Mr. Kirkland moved seconded by Mr. Jos. Henderson, "that attention having been drawn to an item of \$45. in the Treasurer's Statement for the use of a piano, not previously sanctioned by the managers; be it resolved that in future, no account shall be paid by the Managers, unless the expenditure has been previously sanctioned by them." Carried.

The Chairman appointed Messrs. Buik, Watt, Nelson, and McIntosh, scrutineers, to take the vote for election of seven Managers.

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Votes of thanks were passed to the Managers, Treasurer, and members of the Choir for their services during the past year.

On motion of Mr. Macdonald, seconded by Mr. Gordon, Messrs. R. R. Cathron, and James Watt, were appointed auditors for the ensuing year. Mr. R. M. Gray moved, seconded by Mr. R. Carrie, "That Messrs. Kirkland, Wm. Kerr, Henderson, and Paton, be a Committee to attend to the printing of the annual reports of the congregation." Carried.

Mr. Jos. Henderson, Treasurer of The Missionary Association, announced that the total contributions from members of the congregation to Missionary and other benevolent schemes for the year, were about \$7,000.

The meeting was then brought to a close.





Revenue.

"Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God hath prospered him."—I COR. xvi. 2.

"God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work."-2 COR. ix. 8.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF ORDINANCES are made in three ways: - (1) Weekly Offerings in envelopes placed on the collection plate each Sabbath; (2) Quarterly Subscriptions; (3) Contributions placed on the collection plate. The first method has been adopted by the greater part of the congregation, and the Managers greatly prefer that it should be adopted by all. The sittings are all free, no pew rents being charged to any one.

ENVELOPES are given at the beginning of each quarter, and on the allocation of sittings; and any one not now receiving envelopes, and desiring to contribute in this way, is requested to give his or her name to any of the Managers, who will attend to the matter. All those who occupy sittings are expected to contribute according to their means to the current expenses of the congregation.



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Managers' Report.

The Managers beg to submit their Report for the year 1892, accompanied by the Treasurer's Statement, duly verified by the Auditors.

For the purpose of comparing the receipts and expenditure with those of 1891, the following statement is given :—

The above indicates a considerable decrease in the revenue as compared with the previous year, but, notwithstanding this fact, it is gratifying to note that the expenditure was \$177.41 less than the revenue after paying all accounts chargeable to the year.

It is to be hoped that none of the members will permit the fact of no provision for pastor's salary being required at present to affect their contributions, it being most desirable that the revenue for the current year shall be at least as great as that for the period now under review in order that at the end of the year the Treasurer's balance may be on the right side.

The completion of the system of electric lighting in the church, referred to in the Managers' report for 1891, was accomplished early last summer, at a cost of less than \$200, which was paid out of the ordinary revenue,

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The Treasurer reports having received the sum of \$372 during the year on account of the Repairs' Fund, leaving still due to him \$326.86, which amount will doubtless be paid during the current year.

The past year has marked the close of the very successful pastorate of the Rev. Dr. Kellogg. To the regret of the whole congregation, Dr. Kellogg, after long and prayerful consideration, decided it to be his duty to accept the repeated and urgent calls made to him to resume his labours in India. His removal was considered a loss not only to this congregation but to the whole Presbyterian Church in Canada. At the same time, this loss may be made a gain by enlarging the sympathies of the members of the congregation in missionary enterprise generally, and particularly in that part of the field to which he has gone.

Expression was given to the feelings of the members as to Dr. Kellogg's removal at the public farewell meeting held just prior to his departure, when an illuminated address, accompanied by a purse of money, was presented to him in the name of the congregation. At the same time his portrait in oil, painted by Mr. J. W. L. Forster, of this city, was unveiled, and now adorns the wall of one of the church rooms.

Earnest and prayerful effort should be unceasing in order that a worthy successor may be speedily added to the roll of distinguished pastors with which the congregation has been blessed in its past history, and while the vacancy lasts it is to be hoped that the congregation will remain united and all the members do what in them lies to promote its best interests.

Toronto was honoured during the past year in being the meeting place of the Fifth General Council of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches—an assembly attended by delegates representing the different branches of the Presbyterian Church in all lands. These delegates were hospitably entertained by the Presbyterians of the city, and it is a matter for congratulation that not only were Т

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the by the vere city, vere all expenses cheerfully met but a iarge surplus remained. In attaining this desirable end this congregation did its share.

The Managers have again had under consideration the publishing of the contributions for ordinary congregational purposes, and they reiterate their recommendation of last year that these be published in the same way as are the contributions to the schemes of the church.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The number of teachers on the roll is 29,—14 male and 15 female.

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The school met regularly every Sabbath at the usual hour, excepting the months of July and August, when in place of the afternoon session the hour was changed to 9.45 in the morning.

Miss Caven, who for so many years took charge of the Infant Class, having removed to a distant part of the city, felt it would be impossible for her to continue the work. It was with the deepest regret her resignation was accepted. She had endeared herself to the lambs of the flock, and her absence from our midst will be long felt.

Mr. Ferguson, who for the past few years had care of the Young Mens' Class, was obliged through the pressure of other Christian work, to give up, what to him was a most enjoyable service, and to the young men, a very profitable hour on the Sabbath. Professor Thomson kindly undertook the charge, and it is gratify-

ing to know the class is well attended, and it is believed with the happiest results.

At the request of Mr. McCarter and his class, the Hon. Sir. Oliver Mowat, last January, delivered an exceedingly interesting and instructive lecture in the School Room, on Christianity, and some of its fruits.

The lecture was highly appreciated by all who were privileged to listen to it, and the proceeds devoted to the Missions in China.

Besides the usual quarterly review of the lessons, there were two praise meetings, one in June and the other in September.

Missionary reports were read and addresses given from time to time during the year, regarding the work being done in the various Mission Fields in this and other lands.

The teachers have met on the second Wednesday of each month for conference and prayer, besides holding special meetings for business when found necessary.

The meeting for the study of the Sabbath School lesson, held every Sabbath morning, has been fairly well attended; an invitation is cordially extended to all who can find it convenient to be present.

The usual summer excursion was omitted this year. The anniversary of the Sabbath School and Bible Classes was held on Thursday, the 29th December, at which the teachers and scholars of the Wilton Avenue school were present. There was a large attendance, and after tea an exceedingly interesting address was given by Miss Good, illustrated by views from the magic lantern kindly furnished by Mr. Ferguson.

The illustrated papers and schemes of lessons are regularly supplied to the scholars.

The Library contains at present 670 volumes and 1s highly appreciated.

From time to time books that have been thoroughly read, and papers no longer required, are forwarded to different Mission fields in Canada.

In September last our much beloved pastor, Dr. Kellogg, left for India. A suitable address from the

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Dr. the teachers was prepared and presented to him at the farewell meeting held in the church.

Every teacher and scholar felt the departure of Dr. Kellogg from our midst to be an almost irreparable loss, owing very largely to his deep interest in the school, and with everything that tended to its well-being. His loving and missionary spirit will not be readily forgotten, and our prayers will be unceasing in his behalf that the Lord of the vineyard may be his helper always, and that the Word of God, by means of him, may have free course and be glorified.

The thanks of the school are due to Miss Inglis, who has for so many years presided at the organ, and still so faithfully attends to the duties required of her.

The Christian Endeavour Society has passed another milestone. The year just closed has been probably the most eventful in their history. The loss of their first Honorary President and much loved pastor Dr. Kellogg was keenly felt. His wise council, strengthening pres-

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ence, and consecrated life had much to do with the growth of the Society. A parting tribute to his worth, was paid on the eve of his departure for India, by the presentation of an illuminated address setting forth the farewell words and wishes of all. With the address was presented a sterling draft for twenty pounds, for the purchase of a lantern and slides to help in preaching the gospel in India. Dr. Beattie and the Rev. H. Grant, both members of the Society, have also gone forth to distant lands as "ambassadors for Christ." Nor does the Exodus stop here! In New York preparing for the foreign field are Messrs. Jaffray, Robb, Glover, Fee, and Gowans, Mr. Gowans will shortly leave (D.V.) for the Soudan where the need for workers is very great. The members are thus being scattered; four now in the foreign field and five preparing for it. In addition to the volunteer contingent, financial assistance has been rendered in the work. As per the statement annexed the sum of \$330.37 was raised for foreign missions during the year. From this fund native assistants are maintained for the Rev. Dr. Kellogg, Rev. D. MacGillivray and Miss A.H.Gowan for one year. The Lord has been teaching his children their obligations to His last Rich blessings have they also received command. during their tuition from the hand of the Divine Instructor. Noblest service ever offered ! Sinful man and sinless Saviour working in harmony for the redemption of a lost world. This were a theme for angel lips to dwell on ! Oh, the depth of the riches both of the knowledge and wisdom of God ! How unsearchable are His judgments and His ways past finding out.

In City Mission work—Wilton Avenue as formerly, has been the main seat of labour. In that little Mission Hall full many a shower of Heavenly blessing has fallen in the year that has gone. On faces once so sadly marred with sin may now be seen that Heavenly peace and dignity, that marks the heir of God, joint-heir with Jesus Christ. Through patient labour there, from many a humble heart there now ascends the grandest of all doxologies, "Unto Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood; and has made us Kings and Priests to God His Father; to Him be the glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen."

For visiting the sick and relieving the poor some systematic work has been done. There is a large field here for the benevolence of congregational friends. Anyone wishing to assist in relief work might kindly communicate with any of the officers of the Society. The visiting of the sick will also be gladly undertaken on the advice of any member of the congregation.

The weekly Prayer Meetings of the Society have been well attended and much blessing experienced there. With peculiar gratification do they acknowledge the letters of many student friends testifying to the blessing of the Prayer Meetings.

Social work was not overlooked, two receptions being ing held during the year with marked success.

The usual change of officers was made at the halfyearly meetings, the retiral of Mr. Higgins from the presidential chair being made the occasion of a presentation of an illuminated address.

The accounts annexed show the Society's finances to be in a thoroughly satisfactory condition.

In closing this report the Society tenders their many congregational friends heartfelt thanks for the support and encouragement received during the year. A word to the young members of the congregation! The Lord has blessed the Society in the past! Will you not join and share the blessing and the fellowship? "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory."

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The Schemes of the Church.

The Lord has taught us plainly in His Gospel that we may not in our work for Him stop with the care of our own church or of those more immediately about us; but, if we will be loyal to Him, must aim at carrying and sending the Gospel to the destitute in our own land and in all nations. For practical purposes our General Assembly has divided th's work, committed to our trust by Christ, into several departments under the charge of special Committees, which are commonly spoken of as "the Schemes of the Church." The obligation to contribute to the support of these, as the Lord may prosper us, rests upon the Lord's last command, and from the responsibility no member of Christ's Church can be absolved

These "Schemes" are divided by the General Assembly as follows :

I. FOREIGN MISSION WORK.

I. Our Church sustains Foreign Missionary Work in Central India, Trinidad, S. A., the New Hebrides, our own Indian tribes in the North-West, Formosa, and also a New Mission in Honan, N. China, and a Mission to the Jews.

The amount asked for the current year for these different Missions is \$102,645. This includes the amount expected from the W.F.M.S.

II. HOME MISSION WORK

has to do with the spiritually needy in our own land, and is conducted under the three following departments :

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1. The Home Mission Committee seeks to supply with the ordinances of religion those of our Protestant fellowcountrymen, who, living in thinly settled and destitute regions, are unable without our help to maintain them.

The amount asked for the current year is \$62,500.

2. It is the special object of the Fund for the Augmentation of Stipends to raise the salaries of the Ministers of our Church to a minimum of \$750 and a manse, on condition of a certain degree of liberality being shown by the members of the Congregations who need such help.

The amount asked for the current year is \$31,000

3. The work of *French Evangelization* seeks to bring the Word of God to the large French-Catholic population in our Eastern Province, and so, by giving them the open Bible, to deliver them from that bondage of superstition and subjection to the priesthood, in which Rome everywhere and always seeks to keep her votaries.

The amount asked for the current year is \$60,000.

4. The Church and Manse Building Fund, as the phrase indicates, is intended to aid weak congregations in the purchase or erection of houses of worship and manses.

III. EDUCATIONAL WORK.

Under this head is included the sustentation of our various Divinity Colleges. It can easily be seen that no work is more important and fundamental than the providing of an educated ministry for the Church, at home and abroad, especially in these days of so rapidlyadvancing knowledge and widely opening doors. It should need no argument to commend this work to the sympathies of all our members. IV. T A

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IV. THE FUNDS FOR AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS, AND FOR MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS

have been established to meet the undeniable claims of those of our ministers who, receiving often very scanty incomes, have given their lives to the work of our Church, by contributing to their support when by sickness or old age they are disabled from longer service, or by payment of annuities to their widows and orphans when they have been removed by death.

The amount asked for the current year is \$15,000.

For the support of these various departments of Christ's work, there have been formed in the congregation the following organizations:

1. The ladies' Murray-Mitchell Auxiliary, aiding the work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Western Branch of the Canada Presbyterian Church.

2. The Hopeful Gleaners' Mission Band, an organization of the young ladies of the Church, working and contributing for the same end as the last named.

3. The Wayside Gatherers is an association of the girls in the congregation for the same purpose.

4. The Boys' Missionary Society, as the words indicate, is an association of the boys of the congregation for the purpose of giving and receiving information as to the work of missions, home and foreign, and helping, as they may be able, with their contributions.

5. The Missionary Association of the congregation is an association whose work it is to secure and collect contributions to all the Schemes of the Church from all families and adherents of the congregation. Systematic contributions to their support are asked of all members and adherents of the Church. Collectors are appointed for each Elder's District to visit each month all families and individual communicants and adherents of the congregation, and receive their subscriptions. It is desired that each one will decide as in the presence of our Lord how much they ought to give each month to these pur-

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of our en that han the urch, at rapidlyors. It k to the poses, and act accordingly. Where no intimation of the contributor's wish is given the funds received by the collectors are annually allocated to the several Schemes in the proportion suggested by the General Assembly. But whenever a contributor may express a desire that his special gift should be assigned to a particular object, the wish will be regarded in the distribution of the funds. If any should be passed by in the collector's calls, they will kindly intimate the fact, with their wish to contribute, to the pastor, or to Mr. Jos. Henderson, 66 Wellesley Street.

In this our sixth annual Report we desire to acknowlepge Gcd's goodness to us in permitting us to assist in the work of sending the Gospel to those who have it not.

Meetings have been held on the third Tuesday of each month. The usual programme consists in the exercises of praise, reading the Scriptures, prayer, the reading of papers on the lives of devoted missionaries and on the different mission fields, as they are brought before us for special prayer.

Thirty ladies have taken part in the exercises, during the year. We desire to express our thanks to all those who have in various ways assisted in making our meetings enjoyable and profitable, and assure them it makes the duties of the officers very pleasant when each willingly does what she can.

In the month of June it was our privilege to be addressed by Mrs. Wilson, of Neemuch, India, who gave

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us a most interesting account of the work carried•on there by Mr. Wilson and herself. In October our annual Thanksgiving meeting was held. Rev. Mr. Nichol, of Mistawasis Reserve, N. W. Territory, delighted us with an address telling us of his work among the Indians.

The Thankoffering amounted to \$119.55.

The amount of money raised for the year was \$368.72.

This money is raised in various ways, principally by members' fees, contributions by mite-boxes, monthly envelopes and donations. Two names have been added to our life membership roll, Miss Edith Kellogg, by kindness of Mrs. Ewart, and Miss M. Inglis, by kindness of Mr. and Mrs. Henderson. The number of members on the roll is 80.

We regret the loss our Auxiliary has sustained, by the removal of Mrs. Kellogg, our president ; we trust in India, she may find the sphere of usefulness she so much desired.

We would refer with sorrow to the removal by death of Mrs. Blain, Mrs. Thompson, Mrs. Chase, and Mrs. Carson, all of whom were deeply interested in the work in which we are engaged.

At a meeting of the Presbyterial Society in February, Miss Janet Smith, and Miss Warnock, were appointed conveners of the North West Clothing Committee, for Toronto Presbytery. Our Auxiliary contributed \$18.00 in money, and clothing to the amount of \$20.00 for the Indians in the Birtle Industrial School. The circulation of the Letter Leaflet continues to increase, 164 copies being subscribed for during the year, (the largest number taken by any congregation).

We wish to thank Miss Inglis, who has so faithfully presided at the organ, and led the singing.

In reviewing the work of the past year, who among us but feels that very much more might have been accomplished had our sympathy been deeper, and our prayers more earnest.

Recognising this then, let each member with God's blessing be stimulated to greater and better effort in the future.

The meetings of this Society were continued throughout the year with undiminished interest, but with considerably reduced numbers, owing to removals of many of the families of the boys who had formerly been members of the Society.

Among the chief events of the year were the joint Open-Meeting with the Wayside Gatherers, on the 18th of March, which brought the works and aims of both societies more prominently before the congregation.

On the 21st of May the Rev. Dr. Kellogg addressed the boys in view of his intended departure for India, taking them with him in imagination on a voyage from Toronto to India, via England, across Europe and through the Suez Canal, thence to Bombay, and his future field and work in India was portrayed with a vividness and earnestness which deeply impressed his youthful auditors who will, I am sure, follow Dr. Kellogg's career in his noble work to the end of life's journey. The Society was also very much interested in an address by Mr. Jos. Henderson, in which he described very vividly the habits and lives of the Chinese on the Pacific coast as seen by him in the cities of San Francisco and Victoria. His address gave the Society a very clear idea of how desirable it was to make increased effort to send missionaries to proclaim the glad tidings of a risen Saviour to this wonderful nation with its teeming millions.

The object and aims of the Society continue, as in the past, to be the acquiring and giving information regarding all the mission fields of our own and other churches throughout the world, and to stimulate each other in all Christian work.

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REPORT OF THE

Missionary Association.

The Committee have pleasure in presenting the report of the Missionary Association, for the year ending 31st Dec. 1892.

The total amount contributed through the Association, is not quite equal to the year just preceding but in that year we received some exceptional donations for special objects. The ordinary contributions made through the collectors have been well maintained, and this evidences continuance of interest in our mission work on the part of the congregation and diligence on that of our collectors in their regular visits to the subscribers.

The amount contributed to the special fund for the support of a missionary in Honan, has this year fallen short by about \$100 of the \$750 required.

This, we believe, is owing to the fact, that some of the former contributors to this fund have left the congregation and others have not come forward to take their place. When the congregation pledged itself to the Foreign Mission Committee, to contribute annually the sum of \$750, it was on the understanding that this amount should be contributed over and above the amount usually given by the congregation through the collectors. And your committee would be very much gratified, if any who are not now giving to this special fund, would signify to the Treasurers their willingness to

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give regularly, any sum large or small which they can afford to give over and above their ordinary contributions. An early opportunity will be given to the congregation to contribute, and your committee is hopeful that this statement of the requirements of this fund will prove all that is necessary to provide in future for the amount pledged and to make up the present deficency.

The committee have to express their sense of the loss the Association has sustained through the removal of their President, the Rev. Dr. Kellogg. It is not too much to say that in no department of the congregation's work will he be more missed. His sympathy with mission work was so thorough, his knowledge of the different mission fields so extensive, and his readiness to impart to us the information he was continually acqiring was so unfailing, that he did invaluable service in fostering and deepening the missionary spirit already existing in the congregation. The devotion he has shown to this cause in returning to work in India, will we trust prove an inspiration to the congreation he has left.

The committee desire in the name of the congregation to express their thanks to the lady collectors, who have rendered such efficient service during the past year.

There has been contributed by the congregation for Missionary and extra-congregational purposes, an amount exceeding \$10,000. The sums have been contributed through the various missionary and other organizations connected with the Church, and detailed information respecting them, will be found in the printed reports.

There has been contributed by the Missionary Association the sum of \$4,113.42, and the following financial statement is herewith presented :—
