SPEECH OF MR. DAVIS.

At the anniversary meeting of this year in London, of the Royal Literary Fund Society, a large assembly of distinguished Englishmen and foreigners

attended together, as is the custom of that Society. Mr. Talford was in the Chair, and in a series of addresses called out a number of distinguished speakers.
