FAVORS CITY TAKING OVER DISTRIBUTION OF HYDRO POWER

At the annual meeting of the Board of Trade last evening, R. S. Emerson, the retiring president, was in the chair and after the reading and approval of the minutes of the last annual meeting, the retiring president reviewed the year's work in which he told of the action of the board of trade regarding increased harbor facilities, C. N. R. trackage and C. N. R. terminals, and urged upon the new executive to follow up in this important work. The items of Naple & Wigmore, McLean, Kennedy & Co., and Barnhill, Sanford and Harrison, were elected members of the board. A vote of thanks to Mr. Emerson for his services moved by J. Hunter White, seconded by H. W. Frink, was unanimously carried. W. S. Allison gave notice of motion of an amendment to the constitution for a nominating committee to confer with members who are to be nominated for office, this amendment not to interfere with nominations from the floor. The annual report was submitted by the secretary, R. E. Armstrong.

Hydro-Electric Power. Frank B. Ellis took up the question of the handling of hydro-electric power by the city and asked that the matter be discussed.

H. T. Hayes thought that the subject was of great interest to the citizens. He considered the premier's announcement, a very important one. He said that the lack of cheap power had failed to attract industries as the price now was practically prohibitory. If power were cheap, the speaker said, it would make living more comfortable for everybody. As the matter now stands the city is at the mercy of the N. B. Power Company. If the city had control of the power it should be able to dictate to any company with whom it might be necessary to purchase power. He felt that the citizens would stand by the municipal council in anything it did to get the power.

H. W. Frink wanted to know about the distribution of the power and if the present system would have to be duplicated.

F. R. Ellis said the premier would meet the city authorities soon and would see a private corporation get control of it.

George Waring thought that the city should take control, otherwise the price would be higher. If the city did not take control, he said, it would be in the hands of the Power company and would cost nearly as much as it did today. The question must be handled quickly and he advocated public meetings of citizens to press the matter.

W. F. Burditt thought the power would cost more if the distribution system had to be duplicated, and he thought that rates should be in control of the city. The cheap power, he said, might tend to reduce car-fares. The city probably would have to bargain with the N. B. Power Company rather than duplicate the system.

Hunter White wanted to know why the government could not make an agreement direct with the company, protecting the rights of the citizens.

A. H. Wetmore said that when the city had the opportunity to control the power they should get it into their own hands. The speaker said that it was hard for the city, as compared with corporations, to get justice at the hands of the legislature. The premier's offer was a fine one and every effort should be made to see that the city got control.

G. M. Robertson spoke of the cost of duplicating the distribution system.

It is pointed out that if the city had the opportunity they should control the power and then deal with the Power company and come to some agreement and in time possibly the city could take over the N. B. Power Company.

A. Neil McLean and J. H. Kimball also spoke on the subject and advocated city control.

W. F. Burditt then moved the following motion which was seconded by F. B. Ellis and carried: "Resolved, That this board, having learned with satisfaction that the city of St. John in its corporate capacity is to be offered the opportunity to control the supply and distribution of power to be developed by the hydro-electric commission on the Musquash river, expresses the hope that the city will take such action as will effectively safeguard the interests of the community so that power will be available to all who need it at the lowest possible cost."

Mr. Connors thought it would be a good idea to communicate with other cities that used hydro-electric power and find out how they arranged the change from one source to the other.

New Officers. The scrutineers, at this stage, returned and results of the election were announced as follows: The president and vice-president were elected by acclamation: President, W. F. Burditt; vice-president, W. S. Allison; for representation on council, M. E. Agar, G. E. Barbour, R. B. Emerson, J. S. Gregory, D. W. Ledingham, H. W. Rising, H. G. Schofield, L. W. Simms, George L. Warwick and A. H. Wetmore.

A SLUMP IN POTATOES. (Fredericton Gleaner) There is practically no movement of potatoes for export from Fredericton at the present time, in fact, some local dealers have fairly large quantities on the rails at Boston and other centres upon which they are now paying demurrage charges.

Hon. B. Frank Smith, of East Florenceville, has just returned from a trip to Boston and New York. He is one of the leading potato dealers in New Brunswick and says the American potato market is in bad shape.

Large quantities of potatoes from Denmark are being received at New York, he says, the United States growers are refusing to sell at the price at which the Danish potatoes are being offered. The result of the situation is that large quantities of potatoes are being held by the American farmers and dealers and fears are expressed that later on these will be thrown upon the market and the situation will thus be further aggravated.

Some prominent men in the potato business in Aroostook county, Maine, are said to have been almost ruined by the slump. The affairs of one grower and dealer at Carleton, who was generally regarded as a millionaire, are said to be so serious that he may be driven into bankruptcy. There are some New Brunswick creditors.

An Ottawa despatch says: Hon. W. J. Bowser will retire from the Conservative leadership in British Columbia. His leadership in the British Columbia on the Railway Board. He is a very capable lawyer, a man of great vigor and decision, and would strengthen the present Railway Board. His successor will be chosen from among such members of the Legislature as Canon Hinchcliffe, Victoria, and Brig-General Money, Alberni, or it is possible that H. H. Stevens, M. P., Vancouver, might be induced to enter the provincial field.

Brussels, Nov. 18.—(A. P. by Mail.)—It has been announced here that an engineer named Bauschlecher has succeeded in manufacturing by a simple process artificial coal of great heating capacity. It is made with the vegetable refuse from peat beds, of which Germany possesses a great number.

SECRETARY OF VETERANS IN FINE ADDRESS

A discussion of the work accomplished by the Great War Veterans' Association and a stirring appeal to the members of the association to work together and make possible further means to help themselves together more firmly in promoting and sustaining the ideals fought for was given by Grant MacNeil, the secretary of the Dominion headquarters of the association, last evening before a crowded hall in the association's rooms in Wellington row.
The audience was composed mostly of returned men, who listened with great attention to all that Mr. MacNeil had to say. The president of the local branch, the G. W. V. A., Norman P. MacLeod, occupied the chair. Others on the platform were Mayor Schofield, Commissioners Frink and Bullock and the Hon. R. J. Ritchie.
In touching on the relations between the G. W. V. A. and the Grand Army of War Veterans as to amalgamation, the speaker said that nothing could be done without a convention of delegates from all over the Dominion. The Grand Army desired to form a political party but the G. W. V. A. did not desire to do so but wished to confine its political





OUR MEAT EXPORTS. A Big Drop in Value During the Last Year. Exports of meat from Canada for the year ending October show a decrease compared with last year of the large total of 127,829,500 pounds. The decrease represents a value of over \$48,000,000 on the year's trade. The export figures for two years, reported by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, are given below: Bacon and Ham, 1919... 208,006,088 lbs. Bacon and Ham, 1920... 148,674,000 lbs. Pork, 1919... 15,002,218 lbs. Pork, 1920... 4,832,000 lbs. Beef, 1919... 129,844,411 lbs. Beef, 1920... 89,918,000 lbs. Canned Meats, 1919... 11,386,838 lbs. Canned Meats, 1920... 69,468 lbs. There was an offset of rather less than a million dollars in the increase of "other meats" exported, a classification that includes game and poultry.

THE LOCAL FIGHT WITH WHITE PLAGUE

Annual Meeting of Anti-Tuberculosis Society

Work of Dispensing and Other Activities—Fare-reaching Results From Booth Conducted at the Exhibition.

The annual meeting of the St. John Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis is being held this afternoon. The Executive of the Saint John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis began to present its annual report of work done from November 1, 1919, to November 1, 1920.

During the year there were 438 attendances at the dispensary as against 418 last year; 292 adults and 101 children. Each of them was examined; some were sent to River Glade, and some to the St. John County Hospital, others were treated at the dispensary and visited by the nurse, and some were discharged as not tubercular or cured.

When a patient is discharged he comes to the dispensary for some time after for observation. The interest of the public in the list for River Glade—fifteen patients have been sent there and thirty-seven have been sent to the County Hospital—seven have been discharged and seven have died.

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


