WHEREAS on the 17th day of April A.D., 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring within the scope of Part 1 of the "WORK-MEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918," from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz.:

"Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood, railroad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming, or the transportation of logs, timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood or railroad ties or sleepers."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroll from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclusive, with the said board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part two of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

NOTE—Forms for furnishing such information will be supplied on application.





HIGHER PAY FOR THE STORE GIRLS

Minimum Wage Set by Board in Sak tchewan \$9.50, Rising to \$15.50 Before End of a Year

Regina, Sask., July 29—Minimum wages for female employes in retail stores in Saskatchewan have been fixed at \$9.50 for beginners during the first three months, \$10.50 the next three months, \$10.50 the next three months, \$11.50 the third three months, and \$18.50 for the balance of the first year. Thereafter the employes are to be deemed experienced, and to receive a minimum wag of \$15 a week. The hours of work are to be forty-eight. These were the decisions announced tonight by the Saskatchewan Minimum Wage Board, following sittings at which evidence was heard at Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Regina.

Out of 659 adult women and girls reported employed in this class of work in this province, 341 are being paid wages from \$6 to \$15 a week, and a large proportion will have their pay automatically increased when the board's order becomes effective, which will be about the middle of September. Provision is made for an extension of the hours of work under special circumstances, when permits may be issued by the secretary of the board not to exceed thirty-six days in any one year. The minimum of \$15 is higher far than that in effect in the other western provinces, the figure being \$12 in Manitoba, \$12.75 in British Columbia and \$9 in Alberta.

The board will meet again to fix hours and minimum wages in other classes of employment provided for in the act.
