Sydney, N. S. W., May 17—At the request of Mr. Harcourt, the colonial secretary, the commonwealth government has issued a warning to Australian women against the common practice of marrying Afghans and Pathans (natives of the North-Western frontier regions of India) who visit Australia for purposes of trade or camel-driving.

Such marriages, it is pointed out, are contracted by the husbands merely as "business transaction," and, as a rule, result in misery for the wives. The Afghans and Pathans deceive the women with lies about the "magnificence and comforts" of their homes, their tatus in their own country, and the furrer life of their wives there. In this yay women are induced to marry them and accompany them back to India and cross the north-western frontier, where hey are promptly sold to the highest idders.



The cry of discontent is heard in every land from known finese whose social condition is unhappy, and who are sufficiently intelligent to realize that they are not getting their fair share of those things which make for human happiness.





RESPONSIBILITY IN WOODS. (Bangor Commercial) Massachusetts, which has patterned

its forest patrol system on that of Maine, is realizing the value of the sys-Maine, is realizing the value of the system. Thus the Boston Herald notes that since April 1 no less than 1,200 woodland fires have been discovered from the twenty observation towers that are maintained by the state forest service and with but few exceptions these fires have been quickly suppressed due to their prompt discovery.

In our own state the fire patrol service is being continually improved but there must be more than this service if the state is to be virtually free from the great loss that comes from forest fires, a loss that is by no means confined to the value of the timber destroyed. The destruction of the forest too freequently means the drying up of the sheltering shade of the trees, and the consequent diminution of the streams and water powers.
