TAFT OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR TARIFF AGREEMENT

Speaks at National Corn Exchange in Columbus

MANY HEAR HIM

President Speaks Chiefly in Reference to Effect of Tariff Changes Upon the Farmer—Niagara Delegation at Ottawa

(Canadian Press) Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 10.—Before an immense audience at the National Corn Exposition today, President Taft fired the first big administration gun for reciprocity with Canada. His speech was aimed particularly to quell the fears of the United States farmer. He declared that the greatest reason for adopting the agreement was the fact that it would unite two countries, with kindred people and lying together across a wide continent, in a commercial and social union, to the great advantage of both.

"Some two years ago," he said at the outset, "I submitted to congress an agreement which I had made with the authorities of Canada by which, subject to the approval and action of congress and the union parliament, the tariff of each country against the products and manufactures of the other is to be modified and reduced according to the schedule set forth as part of agreement.

"The changes in the tariff rates of the two countries are numerous and important and affect agricultural and manufactured products. The greatest reduction— and the change are all downward—however, are in grains, vegetables, dairy products and live cattle, which are free. "Such a result does not need to be justified by a nice balancing of pecuniary profit to each. Its undoubted general benefit will vindicate those who are responsible for it. I say this in order that, by answering the argument directed to the distant effect of the agreement upon different classes of persons, I may not be thought to abandon the broad ground upon which the agreement was entered into.

Answers Criticisms
"The agreement has been criticized in this country as an attack on the farmer by depriving him of his protection and it is sought to arouse his opposition to the measure. It is said to be a mere tariff agreement, that it is in the interest of the manufacturing class and adverse to the farmer.

"I am a Republican and the Republican party has always advocated and pursued a policy of protection to American products and manufactures. For a long time the policy had little or no limitation. It was thought that tariffs of protected products could not be too high, if all foreign products were excluded competition would stimulate production and reduce its cost and its price. The temptation to destroy competition by combinations became so great, however, that the party in its platform modified its policy and imposed the limitation that the tariff should be limited for purposes of protection to the difference between the cost of production in this country and the cost of production abroad with an allowance for a reasonable profit to the American producer.

"Canada is our neighbor on the north for 2,000 miles. Her population in English, Dutch and French, her soil is rich with a wage earning class as intelligent and as well paid as ours. It is difficult to see in what respect her farmers have any advantage over ours, except in virgin soil in the far northwest.

"How is the farmer to be hurt? Let us see.

GIANTS IN GREAT WRESTLING BOUT; RUSSIAN FAILS TO DOWN POLE

Zbyszko Ousts Hackenschmidt From Chance of Meeting Gotch in World Championship Match

(Canadian Press) New York, Feb. 10.—Stanislaus Zbyszko, the Polish giant, will wrestle Frank Gotch for the world's championship instead of George Hackenschmidt.

This is the status in the wrestling world today as a result of the great wrestling match last night in Madison Square Garden between Hackenschmidt, the Russian Lion, and the pole, when the former tried unsuccessfully for an hour and a half to put Zbyszko upon the mat. There was not a fall during the bout although Hackenschmidt narrowly escaped having his own shoulder put upon the floor.

The international match last night which was one of the greatest ever seen in the east, was to determine whether the Russian or the Pole would go against Champion Gotch.

Hackenschmidt was the favorite and within two minutes he had the Pole thrown into a posture with a leg held but that was the best he could do. Hackenschmidt at times lifted the powerful and heavy Zbyszko clean off his feet but could not get his shoulders to the mat. At times Hackenschmidt lay upon his stomach and the Pole sat upon his back. Arrangements of the championship bout will be underway within a few days, it was declared this morning.

We take our most important crop first, the corn crop. The total production of the United States in 1910 was 2,125,712,000 bushels, which we exported 44,078,200 and used the rest in domestic consumption, mostly in raising cattle and hogs, of which, in live catties and packing hogs, we exported in value \$128,982,000. The Canadian production of corn was 48,780,000 bushels, or six-tenths of one per cent of the total production of the United States. We exported six million bushels to Canada. Certainly in respect of corn, the American farmer is king and will remain so.

Delegation at Ottawa
Ottawa, Feb. 10.—(Special)—Three special trains this morning brought more than 2,000 fruit growers and vegetable growers to Ottawa from the Niagara peninsula and the number was increased by a few from Montreal. They filled the common chamber floor and galleries, just as the western grain growers did. They were met by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Mr. Piddington and Hon. Mr. Patterson. R. L. Borden and George E. Foster were present.

Mr. Seelye, M. P. for Westworth introduced the delegation. They wished to discuss the proposal for free trade with the United States in fruit. A resolution was read by Daniel Johnson, president of the Ontario Fruit Growers' Association. He stated that the deputation did not come so much to protest but to argue as to the effect. The policy of the government, he said, seemed to be to give protection to such interests as deserved it and free trade to such as deserved it as was indicated in the fact that protection was given the manufacturers who asked it and free trade to the farmers who had asked it. The fruit men had built up their business with toil, trouble and large investment.

"The Canadian industry in fruit and vegetables would be ruined by the introduction of a proposal in the tariff agreement to have free trade with the United States.

ST. JOHN AND CEDAR RAPIDS

The Rate of Taxation is Higher Here Than in The Iowa City—The Standard Wrong Again

The Standard this morning quoting an interview with ex-Mayor Bullock on the commission plan, says: "Referring to the Cedar Rapids plan Mr. Bullock said that their tax rate was 22.40 mills, while that of St. John was but 19.8 mills. There was no comparison between the prosperity of the two cities and he was not surprised that they had insisted on a change.

At the opera house meeting Mr. Bullock asked Mr. Sherman what his tax rate was in Cedar Rapids. Mr. Sherman replied that it was 22.40 mills on a one-quarter valuation. He added that there was never a fall valuation, and that in respect of the rate of taxation in Cedar Rapids it was 22.40 mills on one-fourth of the valuation. But, assuming that the rate is 22.40 mills on one quarter of the valuation, this would be much lower than the rate in St. John, figured in the same way. In other words, the rate of taxation in Cedar Rapids is much lower than in St. John, and it has been further reduced since the last time the commission plan was adopted.

In reply to an inquiry from the Times, ex-Mayor Bullock stated this morning that he had not understood Mr. Sherman's statement that the quoted rate was on one-fourth of the valuation. This point was explained by Mr. Sherman at the luncheon at White's, as well as at the opera house.

VIEWS OF A STATESMAN.

Mr. Peter Binks is much impressed by the contentions of Hon. George E. Foster that the new trade agreement should not have been made in secret, but that the great interests vitally concerned should have been given a chance to make their representations at Ottawa and Washington.

Each Hon. Mr. Binks contends, should have been considered separately, and a period of one month permitted to elapse before it was disposed of and the next one taken up. This would have enabled people from all parts of Canada to reach Ottawa, and people from all parts of the United States to reach Washington, to express their views. It might take ten years or a hundred to arrive at a decision concerning all the items, but time is not an element in these matters; and the deliberate method of procedure would be good for the railroads and the hotels, so many deputations would be moving back and forth. Mr. Binks says that Mr. Foster has earned the gratitude of the empire, and then some.

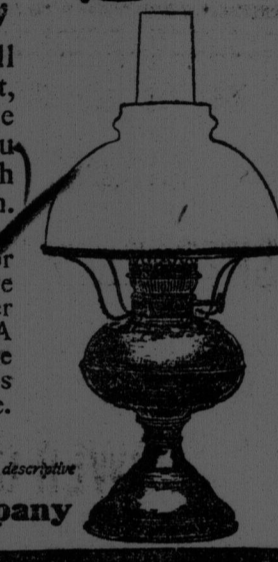

It is that wherever the plan has been adopted the very reverse has happened. Dr. White's statement is the cry of despair. What is the alternative? Are we to go on forever with the present extravagant and wholly unsatisfactory system because a few citizens are afraid of a change and a few more have personal reasons for opposing change?

SHEEP-AND DOGS

The provincial legislature should enact a law that would afford protection to sheep-farmers from the depredation of dogs. A Woodstock despatch says: "Some ten years ago in one season, 500 sheep were killed in the neighborhood of Woodstock by dogs. Many farmers have since gone out of the sheep business."

THE TRADE AGREEMENT

Yesterday was a field day for the discussion of the new trade agreement between Canada and the United States. It was discussed in Ottawa, London and Washington.

At Ottawa Mr. Borden fell humbly behind the Nationalists, led by Mr. Monk and supported a motion for delay. The incident is significant. The burden of Mr. Borden's cry is that Canada is doing well enough, and should not make any change in her fiscal system.

In London Premier Asquith pointed out that the agreement did not affect any article in which the United Kingdom was seriously concerned, and that the British preference was not at all affected.

The net result of yesterday's debate in three parliaments is a conviction that the agreement is in the interests of Canada and the United States, and to the advantage also of the empire at large.

CITY GOVERNMENT

The little group of persons who have set out to defeat the commission plan have framed up a policy which they think will work out well. They recognize that a concession of some sort must be made to the demand for reform, and they propose a council of mayor and nine aldermen.

The standard this morning quotes some objections by ex-Mayor Bullock to the commission plan. One of these is that the city cannot afford to pay the salaries of commissioners. The answer to this is that in every city where the commission plan of business-like administration has been adopted there has been saved to the city many times the amount paid in salaries.

HIS EXPERIENCE
