Men will be enlisted for active service under the following conditions—

1.—After they have passed the medical examination and been finally accepted by the Recruiting Officer at St. John's they will be sworn in and undergo training until such time as it is decided to send the contingent abroad.

2.—Pay will be at the rate of one dollar per day and ten cents per day field allowances and will begin as soon as the men are sworn in. While in St. John's the men will find board and lodging for themselves and an allowance of fifty cents per day will be made to them on this account in addition to the pay as above.

3.—Free transportation will be provided from all outposts to St. John's on an order from the Magistrate to recruits who have passed local medical examination. Where recruits are rejected at St. John's transportation will be provided to enable them to return to their homes.

4.—At the present time single men only are required between the age of nineteen and thirty-six, not less than five feet three inches height, chest average 34 inches, weight 120 lbs.

CALL FOR RECRUITS

Your KING and COUNTRY Need You

WILL YOU ANSWER YOUR COUNTRY'S CALL?

At this very moment the Empire is engaged in the greatest War in the history of the world.

Suitable Recruits between the ages of 19 and 36 will be accepted and trained in drill and shooting so as to fit them for military service. They will then be formed into regular companies of the Regiment, and will be given the option of volunteering for service abroad, if required, on the same terms and conditions as the men of the First Contingent. Pay will commence when men are actually enrolled for service abroad.

Recruiting Offices will be opened in St. John's, and at the offices of the different Magistrates, and at other suitable places in the Colony, (as to Recruiting, in case of doubt, write to the Recruiting Officer, St. John's). Where not less than fifty men offer for enlistment at any recruiting centre, a drill instructor will, if possible, be sent to the District to train them.

War News

The United States has sent a note to Great Britain complaining of the interference with American commerce in the search of vessels for contraband goods. The note was a friendly one, and will no doubt be met by the British Government in the same spirit.

Russians reports that the German advance has been stopped at all points.

British airmen made a daring raid on Carhagen, near the mouth of the Kiel Canal, recently.

The Austrians are retreating before the Russians, and 40 of their officers, 1700 soldiers and 3 machine guns were captured on Tuesday, making a total capture of 50,000 Austrians for the past fortnight.

It is reported that Prince Henry will assume command of the German fleet.

Allan liner Mongolian with 103 of our Naval Reservists on board, reached Glasgow safely last Saturday.

The Allies have captured St. Georges in Belgium, but lost section of trenches south of Ypres.

Fierce fighting has taken place between Russians and Germans. Germans advanced under heavy fire from Russian guns and so-called Russian positions near Gombino, but the Russians slaughtered all Germans except a few who surrendered.

Alcohol and War
(By Sir James Crichton-Browne, in the 'Observer', London.)
When the history of the present great and terrible war comes to be written in full, I believe, he found that alcohol has had a not inconspicuous part, both actively and negatively, in its progress and final issue. It has been responsible, I believe, in some degree for the hideous cruelties and barbarities perpetrated in Belgium and France by the soldiers of Germany, and it has been responsible, I believe, in some degree for the moral support of the civilized world. On the other hand, the withdrawal of alcohol by Russia, by means of her decrees prohibiting the sale of vodka, a fertile source of demoralization and disease, will be found to have strengthened her arm and helped her to those victories she is achieving and to that sustained resistance necessary to conduct this atrocious war to a triumphant finish in Berlin.

We have innumerable substitutes that possess some of alcohol's attractive qualities without its drawbacks. Look at tea. I sometimes think that tea should be spelt with an A instead of two E's, for tea has been one of the saviors of mankind. I verily believe that but for the introduction of tea and coffee Europe might have drunk itself to death.

I recollect a great surgeon, Mr. Lawson Tait, telling me—I always operate at nine o'clock in the morning, and I find that if I take wine at dinner the previous evening, even only a pint of claret, my fingers are not just as exact and nimble as they are when I have had no wine at all, and so I never take wine or any stimulant when I have to operate.

Well, the handling of a magazine rifle is a very delicate operation, and those men will perform it best who have had no alcohol.

Prisoner and Juror Killed
Cashmere, Wash., Dec. 7.—C. D. Franklin, former superintendent of Sunday schools of Leavenworth, Wash., was shot and killed here today by Harry E. Carr, a rancher, of Leavenworth. Franklin was charged with having committed an offense against Carr's ten-year-old daughter and was awaiting trial. At the time of the killing Franklin was on trial on charges of a similar offense against another girl. One of Carr's bullets missed Franklin and killed a juror. Carr entered the courtroom and opened fire on Franklin with an automatic pistol. A bullet struck J. C. Parsons, one of the jury, killing him instantly. Two bullets pierced Franklin, who died in fifteen minutes. He leaves a widow and five children. Carr surrendered to the sheriff.

Burgomaster Treated Like Criminal
Amsterdam, December 9.—Burgomaster Make of Brussels, in a letter received in Brussels, complains that he had been transferred from a fortress to a convict prison, where he is being treated like a desperate criminal rather than a military prisoner.

M. Max, the Belgian burgomaster of Brussels, was taken into custody because, according to reports, he declined to pay part of the indemnity levied on his city by the Germans. The latest despatches said that he was being held in Leipzig.

Steamer Reported in Danger
Minister of Marine and Fisheries Piccott received the following message Monday from Lighthouse Keeper Vardy, at Port aux Basques:—
"Vessel, barque rigged, driving by Channel, half mile from land, think struck on Yankin Rocks; blowing a gale and drifting."
"Vessel proved to be barque rigged Norwegian steamer Njord, which left Fredrikstad on Nov. 10th bound to Seven Islands, now at Port aux Basques, all right; did not strike."

Harmful Censoring
If we are to do our work through the Voluntary Principle, we must give the principle a chance. And it cannot have its chance unless we open out to men at large the reasons why they are wanted. If they are to come of their own free will to the ranks, they must know the reason why. There must be a frank appeal to their intelligence, to their imagination, to their conscience. Yes, we may keep men in the dark under a system of compulsion; but if you attempt it with volunteers, you put your own throat. You have deprived yourself of the means of reaching them. That is why our present silence is so disastrous. It is simply fatal to the cause we have at heart. At all costs, tell us what is going on. If it is good, it will inspire men to take part. If it is bad, they will rally to the cause all the more. But everything depends on being told.—Canon Scott Holland, in the 'Commonwealth.'

Tea in the Trenches
(The 'Westminster Gazette.')
Water sterilization by heat in South Africa was impossible by reason of the lack of fuel on the high veld. In France, an Army surgeon at the Front tells the 'Hospital' there is abundance of fuel everywhere, and those commanding officers who take a lively interest in hygiene are prohibiting the consumption by their men of any water except that which has been boiled—e.g., by being made into tea. In the trenches this excellent rule may be a counsel of perfection difficult to carry out in its strictest letter. But the fact remains that hitherto the Army has been extraordinarily free from water-borne diseases.

'Don't Let Sybil's Daddy Kill My Daddy'
'I know an English lady who married an officer of high rank in the German Army,' says an English writer. 'Some years ago she divorced him, and later married an officer in the British Army. She has a daughter by her first husband, and the daughter remains in her custody. She has also a daughter by her second husband, and now the fathers of the two children are both at the front. The two little girls say their prayers together every night. But while Evelyn says, 'Please God, don't let Sybil's daddy kill my daddy,' Sybil says, 'Please God, don't let Evelyn's daddy kill my Daddy.'

Rebel Gen. Beyers Shot and Drowned
Protoria, Dec. 9.—Gen. Beyers and fifty of his followers had been pursued since Saturday. Yesterday they were overtaken along the Vaal near Greyling. Capt. Vijeans, commanding the pursuing troops demanded the surrender of the rebels, but the latter promptly refused and prepared to make a last stand.

The rebels formed along the river and sharp fighting followed, as the men Gen. Beyers was leading endeavored to cover the flight of their commander and other officers with him.

Beyers and others plunged their horses into the river in their effort to escape, but in midstream the General was shot from his mount. He managed to grasp the tail of another horse, but this animal, caught in the swift current, began to drift rapidly down stream. Gen. Beyers could be heard calling loudly for help, but disappeared during the fighting.

The field glasses and revolver carried by the dead rebel leader were found, but it was impossible to recover his body, owing to the recent floods and the swollen condition of the Vaal.

Gen. Beyers was formerly Commandant-General of the citizens forces of South Africa, but resigned at the opening of the war. He was opposed to the proposal that South African forces invade the German provinces in Africa, as well as to the loan made by the British Government.

He then took the field at the head of rebel forces with Gen. De Wet, who was captured recently.

Fish Market
There is very little dried codfish in the market at present, and the desire to buy continues keen. The price has again advanced a bit, and good large Merchants and Madras fish has been sold for as high as \$7.50 per quintal. Well cured dry Labrador has been sold for as high as \$7.00 per quintal, and ordinary Labrador for \$6.50. Other grades of codfish are selling at about the same figure as last week, and codoil is also quoted at the old figures. The seasons voyage has been practically passed out of the hands of the fishermen, so that the season may be said to be over.—Trade Review, Dec. 23.

Notice is hereby given that the following guides have been established in St. George's, viz:
St. Georges—Two red lantern lights placed on posts coloured red, 8 feet high, situate on the Southern Shore as a guide through the shallow channel leading to the landing place. In this channel 4 Stakes are placed.
Two on the West side painted Red and
Two on the East side painted Black to indicate shoal points.
Turf Point—A Red lantern light has been placed on a post 8 feet high painted red.
Messervey Pt., Sandy Point—A Cask painted white is moored in 5 fathoms water, off Messervey Point.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Cape, Cape Breton, connects with the Canadian Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic service in existence.
A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.
A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.20.
To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.
Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.
Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVENPORT, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

Whereas it is provided by Chapter 23, of 2 Edward VII, entitled "An Act to amend the Post Office Act, 1891," that upon the recommendation of the Board appointed under the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council shall, by Proclamation, give notice of any alteration of name, naming or renaming of places within this Colony, provided that Public Notice of such proposed alteration of name naming, or renaming of places shall have been given for three months previous;

And whereas by Public Notice of date the 16th day of June, 1914, certain alterations of name and renaming of places within this Colony were notified, as required by the above mentioned Act;

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that the alterations of name and renaming of places within this Colony, as contained in the said Public Notice of the 16th day of June, 1914, shall come into effect from the date of these Presents, that is to say—

- 1. Sibley's Cove, Placentia Bay, to be renamed "Proweston."
- 2. Chance Harbor, near Moreton's Harbor, Notre Dame Bay, to be renamed "Bridgeport."
- 3. Chance Harbor, Friday's Bay, Notre Dame Bay, to be renamed "Chaseport."
- 4. Farmer's Arm, Dildo Run, Notre Dame Bay, to be renamed "Summerford."
- 5. The Western section of Mertian Bay, extending from West's Point to Gladson, (including Butler's Cove), to be renamed "Creston."
- 6. Piper's Hole, Placentia Bay, to be renamed "Swift Current."

On and after the 26th inst., Telegraph Addresses registered prior to 1st July, 1914, may be used as the Address, but not as the signature in telegrams. (a) between any two places in British territory including Egypt, (b) between each and any of the following:—British territory including Egypt, territory of allied countries, United States of America, provided in all cases that either Sender or Addressee of both are resident outside Europe. In the case of telegrams emanating from British territory and destined for the territory of an allied power or for the United States of America, the full name and address of the addressee will be given by the sender, but not telegraphed. When the Censor is located at the office of destination he may at his discretion require the office to give the full name and address at which a telegram is to be delivered.
