Letters from the Front

From Reservist Azariah Mercer,
Beachy Cove.

R. N. Barracks,
Portsmouth, Nov. 27, 1915.

My Dear Mother and Father—Just a few lines in answer to your kind and welcome letters which came to hand a few days ago. I received all you wrote since September. I also received the socks you sent and was more than glad to get both; also to know that you were all well.

I suppose I must begin to tell you my travels since September, when we went to sea. First of all we were out for nine days and had to come back, owing to our steering gear giving out. So that being fixed we started on our patrol down at Iceland. We were there for about a month and captured about 18 or 20 ships. We then went in port, sailed our ship and then we were sent to Russia.

On our way back from Archangel in Russia we struck a mine, but thank God our good old ship did not go down. It blew 40 feet of her head away, but the explosion did not reach the magazine. If it had not likely myself or any one else would have been left to tell the tale. Her water-tight compartments did not give way. So that's all we can be thankful for. We left the ship then, but I never heard such a lamentation among men before. We had a Russian Admiral on board and 6 or 7 Russian officers taking them home to England. So at the time we struck the mine the Russian Admiral was in the same boat that I was in, and the after fall which they have for lowering the boats gave way and the Russian fell into the water but was picked up by another boat.

In the meantime, I was trying to look out for myself. I did not feel a bit scared. I went up the life line to the davits, and when I saw the boat swung by the fore fall I went down to her again, but the boat was stem up and stern down, half way down the ship's side. So we were the last boat clear of the ship.

There were several trawlers and a mine sweeper nearby which we went on board of. That was about 5 o'clock, and at 9 we went on board our own ship again, and two days later we got in safe anchorage by the assistance of the trawlers and another ship which came for the purpose.

That was the 22nd of Oct., and the 10th of Nov. the H. M. S. Orontava came for us and we got in Glasgow three or four days ago, all well. So I am back to Portsmouth barracks again.

You spoke about the young Neil fellow that was on the ship with me. He is still on her, he and three more Newfoundland fellows. In Russia there are about 44 persons staying behind altogether. They are staying to look after the ships, expecting to get back in the spring. It is Mr. Richard Neil's son, of Spaniard's Bay. He is well and wishes to be remembered to all his friends.

You can send me another pair of socks if you get them knit; also a couple pair of mitts, a pair for myself and a pair a little larger for a friend of mine. Well, mother, I heard that Hayward Mercer was in the Barracks Hospital and I went to see him the first thing, but he is shifted to Haslar Hospital. I am going to try and see him as soon as I can. I would almost as soon see him as I would home, that is in one respect. They tell me he's got a bad leg. He hurt it some way. Remember me to his mother, father and sister, also George Norman.

Well, mother, I don't think there is any risk in sending me any parcels, for it's almost sure to find me out. I got my socks this time and letters. So I will have quite a few to answer. Remember me to all friends, brothers, sister, uncles, aunts and cousins, and take my best love yourselves. Wishing you all a happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year, I still remain, your fond son.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canada, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radio of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P.M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 45 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$100 50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order to any of the above countries and at offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.

The Swallow's Survivors Return Home

Details of Their Hard Experience

The crew and passengers of the ill-fated schr. Swallow reached their various homes on Saturday (Christmas) night, Dec. 25th. At Clarke's Beach and Bay Roberts stations hundreds of people gathered to extend to them a glad welcome, and this was proof of the deep interest which was manifested in their rescue and their return to home and loved ones.

With the limited time at our disposal this week we have managed to glean the following particulars regarding the trip of the Swallow and the awful time experienced by those on board during the storm which commenced on Tuesday, Nov. 16th, up to the time of their rescue and of their arrival home.

The Swallow left Bay Roberts June 28th bound for Dominio, Labrador, which she reached on July 7th, having on board beside the crew a number of freighters for Bateau and Dominio, also fishery supplies.

After spending the summer at Dominio the Swallow was loaded with about 1400 qts. fish. Everything was now ready for the return home, and when the schr. Lorna Deane arrived from down the shore a quantity of fish and some of the Swallow's freighters were transferred to her.

The Swallow left Dominio on Oct. 25th bound for Bay Roberts, St. Anthony was reached on Oct. 27th, Englee on the 28th, and Seldom-Come-By on Nov. 1st. The wind was favorable, and had it held 24 hours longer the Swallow would have reached home a day or two afterwards.

Two weeks were spent at Seldom, and during that time three attempts were made to reach home, but with no success.

On Nov. 15th the wind blew a gale. Later in the day the wind dropped, and at about 7 p.m. the Swallow again set sail, it being a moonlight night with a fresh breeze in her favor. Just before daylight on Nov. 16th Cabot light was on the vessel's lee, and the skipper thought he would get around the island, but the wind had freshened and was now blowing a gale from the S. W., the seas rolling high.

The mainmast, foresail, jib and jumbo were reefed. The canvas could not stand the furious wind and the foresail and the jumbo were carried away. Not being able

to round Cabot Island on account of losing her head sails the vessel ran back for Seldom, but could not reach it owing to the wind veering further west.

With her sails gone, and the wind against her, there was nothing left but to lower the mainmast and run her under bare poles to sea before the hurricane of wind, the course being East, then South South East and South. The sea was running high and there were awash swells. They tried to get the vessel to lay to, but she failed, the seas almost swamping her. The foresail swung around and burst the rigging and the foremast became loose, the "step" breaking.

The seas were constantly boarding the vessel. Some casks broke loose and carried the wheel away. Some of the boats were smashed, and a puncheon of molasses and other things round the deck were washed overboard. Fortunately a cask of water was placed in the hold, and those on board had lots of food.

The mast was rocking to and fro and the deck was opening fast. After sometime a brace was placed against the spar. Three days passed and still the storm continued. The main rigging then burst and the mainmast became loose and the deck was torn open. The vessel began to leak and things leaked very gloomy for those on board.

One pump alone was kept going the second one being useless, while a good watch was kept for any passing ship. A quantity of fish was thrown overboard to lighten the vessel. The girls on board kept up a good heart and encouraged the men.

On Friday night, Nov. 19th just after dark, a light was seen coming toward the Swallow from the east. The crew made lights, blew a horn to attract attention but all to no avail, as the steamer took no notice of them, though the crew could see the steamer plainly.

Another day passed when, on Saturday night, Nov. 20th, at 10 o'clock the crew saw a light on the starboard bow. Oil clothes and twine saturated with cod oil was used as flares, and guns were fired. They succeeded by these means in attracting the attention of the Norwegian steamship Hercules, Capt. Christopherson, bound for Norway, which bore down on them. The captain of the steamer sent a crew in a lifeboat to the Swallow and took the 17 persons with some of their belongings safely on board his ship.

The weather was fine and warm when the rescue took place. The captain and officers were Norwegians, while the sailors were Chinamen. The crew and passengers of the Swallow were given hot stimulants and food and treated well by those on board the steamer and landed at Stornoway on Nov. 31st, as already reported by the Guardian.

The position of the Swallow when she was abandoned was 360 miles S. E. of Cape Race and 30 miles south of the Flemish Cap. Off the English coast they were held up by H. M. S. Potia and taken to Stornoway for examination. They were looked after at Stornoway by the authorities. After spending five days at Stornoway they went to Kyle, where they took a train for Liverpool. Seven days were spent at Liverpool, and on the 10th of December they embarked on the S. S. Pretoria for St. John, N. B., arriving at the latter place on Dec. 20th. They left St. John, N. B., Dec. 22nd, and arrived home on Dec. 25th.

The crew and passengers are very grateful to the captain and crew of the Hercules for rescuing them from what appeared to be a watery grave. In spite of the terrible experience through which they passed all the men and women escaped injuries and are feeling well.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE

Postal Telegraph Offices are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages or telegrams, not including charges on telegrams, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government office in Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system in all parts of the world. There is no charge for the telegraphic service in this office.

A ten word message in Canada exclusive of signature and address, costs from 50 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.00 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are sent by means of the Wireless system, which is in operation season and day, and is not subject to the ordinary stoppage of the wireless apparatus, which are subject to stoppage in the radiating stations at Cape Race and Cape St. John's.

Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and at the Commercial Office on Train and Steamship, and if the sender wishes the message may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders

The rates of Commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$10 — 5 cts
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20 — 10 cts
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$30 — 15 cts
Over \$30 but not exceeding \$40 — 20 cts
Over \$40 but not exceeding \$50 — 25 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$60 — 30 cts
Over \$60 but not exceeding \$70 — 35 cts
Over \$70 but not exceeding \$80 — 40 cts
Over \$80 but not exceeding \$90 — 45 cts
Over \$90 but not exceeding \$100 — 50 cts

Maximum amount of a single order is any of the above amounts and all offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.
