SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UNIVERSITY LYING-IN HOSPITAL,

SUBMITTED TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS, HELD AT THE HOSPITAL, OCT. 5, 1860.

The Committee of Management of the University Lying in Hospital, in announcing, to its Friends and patrons, the continued success of this excellent Charity, acknowledge with thank-fall hearts their gratitude to that Supreme Being "from whose hands all blessings flow" for His constant car and watchfulness.

Your Committee have again to record the non-occurrence of any casualties or even sickness among the patients admitted during the year now claused. Among other causes contributing to this end, they cannot but regard as anost influential, the extreme cleanliness and ventilation that characterize the wards, for which the patients are indebted to the Matrons untiring surveillance. Your Committee have had reason, on previous occasions, to congentilate the friends of the flospite, on this fact:—

late the friends of the Hospits on this fact:— The proportion of 17 deaths out of 2,050 admissions, a ratio of 1 to 120 cases treated, places the mortality of this Hospital below that of any one now known to them.

The number of patients admitted during the year now closed has greatly exceeded that of several preceding ones. A reference to the Ward book will exhibit this, as well as the details connected with each case, thus:—

the comfort and health of the patients, should be carried out, has always been an object of high interest to the friends of every Hospital; and your Committee are anxiously looking forward to the day, when this grand object, so far as they are concerned, will be consummited. Your Committee have to observe, that in

Tour Committee have to observe, that in consequence of representations from various quarters, it has been deemed advisable to reduce the Yees, obtained from wetnurses securing situations from \$6 to \$4. The Hospital will not lose anything of material importance by this reduction, while they believe it will give general satisfaction.

Your Committee have again to record their thanks to the Matron, Mrs. Hope, for the very efficient manner in which she has discharged her responsible dyties during the last year; and in consideration of the advantages, which the Hospital has obtained from her superintendence of its economy, they would suggest an increase to her annual salary of £1.

To Dr Hall they would also record their thanks for his attendance upon, and attention to the patients during the year.

Your Committee, in conclusion, beg to return their grateful thanks to various parties for their generous donations, from time to time, received by the Hospital, and to Mr. McCornick, for his activity in collecting the subscriptions from the friends of the Hospital.
