SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UNIVERSITY LYING-IN HOSPITAL,

SUBMITTED TO THE ANNUAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS, HELD AT THE HOSPITAL, OCT. 5, 1860.

The Committee of Management of the University Lying-in Hospital, in announcing to its friends and patrons, the continued success of this excellent Charity, acknowledge with thankful hearts their gratitude to that Supreme Being "from whose hands all blessings flow" for His constant care and watchfulness.

Your Committee have again to record the non-occurrence of any casualties or even sickness among the patients admitted during the year now elapsed. Among other causes contributing to this end, they cannot but regard as most influential, the extreme cleanliness and ventilation that characterize the wards, for which the patients are indebted to the Matron's untiring surveillance. Your Committee have had reason, on previous occasions, to congratulate the friends of the Hospital on this fact.—The proportion of 17 deaths out of 2,059 admissions, a ratio of 1 to 120 cases treated, places the mortality of this Hospital below that of any one now known to them.

The number of patients admitted during the year now closed has greatly exceeded that of several preceding ones. A reference to the Ward book will exhibit this, as well as the details connected with each case, thus:—

It ought to be observed that of the above number (167) 8 were outpatients, attended by the Matron, or some of the gentlemen in attendance at the Hospital, but still under the supervision of the Physician Accoucheur. It is desirable that this class of patients should increase in number, when such ample provision for proper attendance on them is secured; and this, there can be little doubt will be the case, when it is more generally known and understood that efficient assistance can be, and will be afforded to the destitute poor at their own houses, when domestic circumstances prevent them entering the Hospital.

Your committee point with satisfaction to the favorable condition of the finances of the Hospital. When it is remarked that the most strenuous endeavors are made to secure an appropriate building of their own, and that, with this object in view, the strictest economy is exercised in the Hospital, the fact, just stated, should not operate against the annual subscriptions of those, who have so generously contributed to its funds, or the more casual contributions of those benevolent persons, which have been so often, and so liberally experienced. The securing of a proper building, in which every requirement, dictated by experience as necessary to

the comfort and health of the patients, should be carried out, has always been an object of high interest to the friends of every Hospital; and your Committee are anxiously looking forward to the day, when this grand object, so far as they are concerned, will be consummated.

Your Committee have to observe, that in consequence of representations from various quarters, it has been deemed advisable to reduce the fees, obtained from wetnurses securing situations, from \$6 to \$4. The Hospital will not lose anything of material importance by this reduction, while they believe it will give general satisfaction.

Your Committee have again to record their thanks to the Matron, Mrs. Hope, for the very efficient manner in which she has discharged her responsible duties during the last year; and in consideration of the advantages, which the Hospital has obtained from her superintendence of its economy, they would suggest an increase to her annual salary of £10.

To Dr. Hall they would also record their thanks for his attendance upon, and attention to, the patients during the year.

Your Committee, in conclusion, beg to return their grateful thanks to various parties for their generous donations, from time to time, received by the Hospital, and to Mr. McCormick, for his activity in collecting the subscriptions from the friends of the Hospital.

The whole nevertheless is respectfully submitted.
