THE DISCOVERY.

#### THE MARKET.

About 400,000 barrels of Portland Cement were consumed in the year 1910 in what is known as the Edmonton District, that is, the territory tributary to the City of Edmonton and extending west to Prince Rupert and north to the Peace River District. Two railroad trunk lines, the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern Railway have opened up here a vast domain nearly three times as large as the German Empire. ## LOCAL MARKET.

The market price of Portland Cement in the Edmonton District has averaged \$3.20 per barrel for the past two years, and is now \$3.40. This price is the Eastern mill price of about \$1.25 per barrel plus the freight rate to this district of about \$2.15 per barrel. The demand for cement in the Northwest will so far exceed the capacity of the two or three local mills that the price will always be fixed by the Eastern mills, and will include the freight rate on a 2,500 mile haul.


