LAST MEETING FOLD COUNCIL

Canada Foundry Co. Get Contract for New Electric Plant—Building Inspector Resigns

Mayor Murray presided over what is known as the "Greeting meeting" of the Council held on Monday evening. The meeting was called for the special purpose of purchasing an electric plant for the town. Councillors present—McDonald, Miller, Alexander, Mowat, White and McLennan.

The town clerk read the minutes of the previous meeting which were confirmed. Councillor Moores at this time entering the meeting.

SPECIAL BUSINESS

Councillor Mowat brought up the business of the evening by laying before the council the various tenders received for the installation of an electric light plant. Six tenders in all were received the names and amounts being as follows:

Kynoch Company \$29,450
Hornby Stockport Co. 29,667
Canada Foundry Co. 25,650
Can. Westinghouse Co. 32,980
Crockier Wheeler Co. (for generators only) \$39,000
Laurie and Lamb \$27,550

The prices and details of the proposals from the various firms were gone into by the councillors and after listening to the arguments of the representatives of the Canada Foundry Co. and the Westinghouse Company Councillor McLennan moved and Councillor Moores seconded that the tender of the Canada Foundry Co. for the installation of a complete electric plant for the sum of \$25,650 be accepted. This was carried unanimously.

The plant bought is of the Hard Coal Gas producing type, consisting of 2 generators developing a horse power of over 500 B. H. P. This is a type of engine which has given satisfaction all over, and the council have themselves safeguarded in that should the plant not work satisfactorily it will be returned.

Going further in this matter Councillor Mowat submitted proposals regarding a site for the new power station, but this matter was left in the committee's hands.

On reverting to the usual order of business, a communication was read from the Relief Committee stating that the sum of \$70,000 had been placed in the Bank this sum being received from the Dominion Government.

Communication read from the building inspector regarding the request for a permit for Geo. Sanson's proposed Laundry. The inspector had refused a permit until hearing the decision of the Council. The Town Solicitor was instructed to file an injunction stopping the building of the said laundry until plans and specifications had been filed according to the By-Laws.

Communication read from H. A. Chandler tendering his resignation as building inspector, which was accepted by the Council.

The town clerk was appointed to act as Inspector until such time as a permanent Inspector be appointed.

Petition was received from the residents of Hanover street in Ward II praying for Water and Sewer connections.

The petition was referred to the Water and Sewerage committee.

Communication from A. E. G. McKensie regarding the refund of money expended in water and Sewerage connections was read. The amount claimed was ordered to be paid.

THE ACADIAN MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE

An Appreciation of the Men Who Represent this Great Race—Mr. Labllois Fine Record

The Liberal Opposition in the House of Assembly is fortunate in numbering among its members four Acadian gentlemen, Hon. C. H. Labllois of Restigouche, Mr. C. M. Leger of Westmorland, Dr. A. Sormany and Mr. S. R. Leger of Gloucester. No members of the House are more highly respected than these representatives of a great race. They bear their share of the burden of the work of the house, and there are few men more valuable in the committee to which they are respectively attached. They enjoy the esteem of their fellow liberals and are highly respected as well by the other members of the Assembly. Not only the Acadian people, but the liberals of both nationalities have reason to be proud of these adherents of liberal policy.

Hon. Mr. Labllois is not only the senior Acadian representative in the Assembly, but he is also the Dean of the House. He was first elected in 1882, and since that time he has rendered splendid service to the province. He has sat in the House under seven premiers, Hon. Messrs. Hannington, Mitchell, Blair, Emmerson, Tweedie, Pugsley and Hazen. He was associated also with Premier Robinson, who never met the Legislature. The Restigouche Acadian was the first Commissioner of Agriculture in New Brunswick. Many policies which he initiated in that position have borne splendid fruit and the agricultural conditions of the province have been notably benefited in consequence. After some time spent as Commissioner of Agriculture Mr. Labllois became Chief Commissioner of Public Works, and New Brunswick has had no better. He held that position until the Robinson government went out of power, and the happenings of the last three years have shown conclusively that New Brunswick would be much better off if Mr. Labllois still occupied his old position.

However, as lieutenant of the Opposition leader, the Dean of the House has done effective service. He is a quiet-going, quiet speaking man, but one nevertheless keen of mind, and capable of presenting his views in a manner that compels attention and respect. The opposition is much the stronger because of Mr. Labllois' presence in the ranks.

Dr. Sormany comes to the Assembly from Shippegan. A native of that place he was educated at Carleton College and St. Joseph's College, Memramook. Subsequently, he went to Montreal and studied medicine at Laval University, from which institution he received his degree. He has since then been practicing his profession at Shippegan where he enjoys an excellent practice, coupled with general public esteem. He ran his first election in 1908.

when with his colleague Mr. Leger and his English speaking colleague Mr. Byrne, he was elected by a forcible majority. In the Assembly he has been an eminently useful member of the opposition party. He is not a man who inflicts long speeches on the House, but what he does say is strictly to the point and commands every attention. A session or two ago the medical Commissioner of Agriculture, Hon. Dr. Landry, of Kent, undertook to have a fling at Dr. Sormany. He was sorry he spoke for after Dr. Sormany finished replying to the Kent county man, there was a somewhat wiser and very much sadder Commissioner of Agriculture about the House.

A man with the most fireworks is not always the most capable representative of the people. Dr. Sormany is not given to fire works, but he is given to serving the people to the best of his ability, and his ability is by no means meagre. As the other Acadian Liberals have done, he had proven himself a very successful representative of the people, and his re-election when the contest takes place may be confidently predicted.

The Gloucester county Mr. Leger is one of the quiet men of the House. He dislikes making speeches, but whenever he does take the floor, and he rises whenever it is advisable for members of the house to express their opinion on important questions, he speaks in a way that shows that he is capable of judging well in matters which are brought to his attention. Mr. Leger belongs in Carleton where he was educated. He is engaged in business in which he has met with a goodly measure of success. For some time he has been a member of the Gloucester County Council in which he still sits and in that body he has given his fellow citizens good service. He ran his first legislative election in 1908, and it is safe to say that he will be re-elected when the government risks an appeal to the people. Incidentally, it may be said, that Mr. Leger is the possessor of a splendid voice. More than once he had delighted the members of the House with his French songs, and in the opposition caucuses there are frequent calls for "A song from Seraphin."

Mr. Clement M. Leger is one of "The solid four", from Westmorland. Since 1903 he has been sitting in the House and judging from the reports which come from Westmorland he will be re-elected just as often as he enters the lists. Mr. Leger is a Westmorland man, educated in Westmorland, and doing business there. At one time when he was before the people for election the Conservatives sought to injure him by belittling references to the extent of the business he carried on. They were no more successful then they are now. Mr. Leger is not "a merchant prince," but he is a respectable citizen of the county in which he lives. In the House he has taken a keen interest in all matters pertaining to the welfare of the province, but he has perhaps done best service in the agricultural committee, where again and again he has insisted upon fuller recognition of the claims of the farmers. It was Mr. Leger who last session vigorously urged on the government that potato warehouses should be established by the province in Kent and Westmorland counties, and perhaps elsewhere as well.

The new council are expected to DO SOMETHING FOR THE STREETS in the first place, organize the Fire Department, see that the Building By-laws are enforced, get all the routine work done in Committee, and have the Council meetings once a month. All these things will be for the benefit of the town and the citizens are expecting them.

DROWNED AT QUEBEC

Robert Degrace Fell Into Water

While Boarding the Steamer

Canada.

Quebec, April 16.—The first drowning accident of the season in this port occurred on last Saturday evening, when Robert Degrace, a native of Carleton, Bas Des Chaleurs, found a watery grave in the Louise Basin.

The unfortunate young man, who was only 23 years old, was an officer on board the government steamer Princeps, moored in the inner basin, and about 7 o'clock on Saturday evening left his steamer to visit a friend on the steamer Canada, anchored outside the crosswall. He was going down the ladder which served as a gangway between the wharf and the Canada, when he fell over on the ice and dropped into the river.

Several planks were thrown out to the drowning man, who made an effort to seize them, but he was apparently injured in his fall, and could not catch any of them. His body was recovered about 9 o'clock this morning, near the Canada, his face being cut in two places.



1000 REBELS DEFEAT 1600 DIAZ TROOPS

Most Important Battle Yet In Revolt for Mexican Freedom.—Rebels Capture Two Guns and Kill 200. Agua Prieta, Mexico, April 17.—The most important battle of the Mexican revolution thus far was fought here today, between 1,000 Federals under command of Lieut. Col. Diaz, and 1,000 rebels under Balasario Garcia, and resulted in the repulse of the former. The battle lasted from 6.30 a. m. until sundown. At nightfall, two Federal machine guns were in the possession of the rebels, and the Federals has sustained a loss estimated by the rebels as at least 200 killed and wounded. The rebels gave their own loss as 20. From the beginning of the battle regardless of the warning given by the United States government to the leaders of both forces, a rain of bullets poured into the American towns of Douglas, Ariz., and when the day was over it was found that seven non-combatant residents of that city had been wounded. It was a day almost of terror in Douglas.

MORE BROWN-TAIL MOTHS DISCOVERED

Dr. Saunders of the entomological department, Ottawa, is at present in Charlotte county inquiring into the late appearance of the brown tail moth in that locality. Since the discovery of the nests of the pest at Pomeroy Ridge, a systematic search has been made with the result that the caterpillars have been found in other parts of Charlotte county. Every effort will be made to keep the brown tail moth from becoming such a scourge as it has been in the New England states.



WHERE THE SHOE PINCHES

Sometimes mail order houses offer a leader, that is, they sell some article less than cost in order to induce buyers to make up an order which will include many things at a great deal more than cost. The big firm comes out ahead on the whole transaction all right—that is what they are there for.

We heard of an experience of a certain lady the other day who thought it would be a good scheme to simply order the leader, the article sold at less than cost. The particular bargain offered was a pair of shoes at \$1.69. When the shoes arrived there was a change of 25 cents for express, which she paid. After she got the shoes home, she packed them up again and returned them by express. The firm said she could return the goods if not satisfactory, at least that was in the advertisement. She paid another twenty-five cents to return them. After awaiting about a week the new shoes arrived, and she paid another quarter for express. Unfortunately, they were no better than the first ones, as far as fit was concerned. She had now paid \$2.44 for a pair of \$2.00 shoes, with more to follow. She tried to change them with a local dealer, but, of course, that would not work; but while in the local store she saw as good a pair, in every respect, which the dealer sold for \$1.65 regularly. She may find a lady friend to fit the shoes. If so she may not lose more than a dollar. If not she is out \$2.44.

When a woman thinks she has obtained a bargain, she tells her friends about it; but when the experience is not so favorable she is apt to say nothing when she has got the worst of a deal, although they say a great deal, when they think they have got the best of it. This is human nature, but that is why we do not hear more about the experiences of those who deal with mail order houses.

When you come to think of it, it is not rather foolish to buy things just from seeing a picture of them? A farmer would not buy a cow from a catalogue, because he knows something about cows. How much more important is it to see what you buy and know with whom you are dealing when you are getting something about the quality of which you are not able to judge. The local merchant wants your trade, and he knows that the best way to secure it is to be perfectly candid about the quality of the goods he sells. He knows more about quality than you will ever learn unless you go into business for yourself. If an article is not the best he will tell you so, and change you fairly for what you got. We cannot all afford to buy the highest quality of goods out we are at least entitled to get fair value for the money we spend and to know just what we are getting. The only way we know of to accomplish this is to buy at home from a merchant in whom you have confidence. In the long run you are money in pocket by doing so and in addition you are helping your town and county instead of injuring it.

THE BOOSTING OF PRICES

It seems as though we were to be faced with a calamity as dire as that already gone through last July, if the present conditions in building are to remain.

One is almost tempted to think that there is an organized combine among contractors to boost the price of all the tenders for building at this time. Owing to the high figures now being demanded by contractors many who had arranged to build will either leave it over to have the work done by day labor. It never pays to "kill the goose that lays the golden eggs," and if this policy is to be pursued it means it will hurt the town and the contractor only, and the man about to build will hang up the job or quit.

One case in point, a building 50x30x20 high not including basement was approximately priced last fall at \$3500. Today this same wooden structure is priced at cost \$7000, just double the amount.

The people here want stand for such extortion, and many will follow the lead of the Methodist Church and postpone their rebuilding indefinitely.

We have been very easy-going for a long time now but we have come to the limit and the feeling now prevalent in the town is that if the contractors persist in their inflated tenders then there will be no building done, but what is absolutely necessary. It is a serious problem for us but we have got through worse ones and will manage this all right although we may be inconvenienced to a greater or less degree. The towns-people have the matter in their own hands. If they consider the prices demanded are beyond all reason, let the building done by day work there will be lots of labor here early in the summer and the shortage of contracts will soon bring the builders to their right senses.

THE GEORGES AND THE MARYS

"Man doth not live by bread alone," sentiment is a big thing in this world. Having said which, we express an opinion that the men of women who are responsible for the memorial fund of the Marys and Georges should be classed among the well meaning and harmless people whose activities are a bother to those they think they are helping and to everybody else. They will get a little prominence by being prime movers in the affair and to the Georges and Marys they hold out the bait of having their names inscribed among a million, or so other Georges and Marys on a paper or parchment which will go to the furnace somewhat sooner than the present goes on the shelf. Such warehouses, he held, would be of material benefit to the smaller potato growers, and there will be few people who will not agree that the Westmorland man was right. 



GENERAL NEWS

The Ontario Department of Education will cope with the scarcity of teachers by establishing several additional model schools.

Miss Hulda D. Loud, editor and proprietor of the Rockland Independent, died last week in the house where she was born, 66 years ago. She was one of the first women in Massachusetts to espouse the cause of women suffrage.

Two million dollars worth of gold was shipped to Ottawa from the receiver general's office in Toronto last week. This gold came from the United States about 5 years ago and has been in the vault ever since.

After the first of October, it will be unlawful to have common drinking cups in any park, public building, factory, theatre, school or railway station in New York. An investigation by the city board of health has shown the great danger of the transmission of disease by their use.

The British government has not yet recognized the new government of Portugal. The elections in Portugal have been postponed for the fourth time, and there is a strong movement for the restoration of the monarchy.

This is the centennial year of Portland cement, so called from its resemblance, when set, to a certain building stone obtained at Portland, England. Though the discovery of the process of making the cement dates from 1811, the first important work to which it was applied was the building of the Thames tunnel, in 1828.

Neely life savers, or their families, connected with the thirteen stations on Cape Cod are to have the benefit of a fund of \$25,000 created by the will of Mrs. Charlotte Augusta Bradstreet of Boston.

An exhibition of the wonderful collection of viaras to be worn by the members of the Royal family and peeresses has been opened in London. The object of the exhibition is to benefit the Prince Francis of Teck Memorial Fund, for the endowment of "Middlesex Hospital."

Immigration to Canada from the United Kingdom is so far this year fifty per cent. larger than it was in 1910; and there are also more immigrants coming from the United States than there were last year. An enormous rush into the new country of the Peace River is expected.

A mob of 200 masked men stormed the jail at Laurenceville, Ga., and attacking the sheriff and taking his keys from him, secured a negro, Charles Hale, charged with assaulting Mrs. C. G. Williams. They hanged him from a tree in the business section of the town and riddled the body with bullets.

Rev. Dr. Shearer is issuing a warning to working girls that Toronto is being made a recruiting ground for women agents of white slaves, who visit ships, and after becoming friendly with girls attempt to lure them to go to the States.

The largest and oldest chair ridge in the world is said to be a kington, in China, where it forms a perfect road half a mile in length from the top of one mountain to the top of another.

Dorchester, April 13.—There was a meeting of telephone users in the County Court House on Monday evening last, to protest against the unfair and grasping methods of the N. B. Telephone Co.

The feeling of the meeting was most pronounced against the Company. A strong resolution was passed unanimously: that the people be urged to sign no contracts with the Company. A strong committee, representing wealth and influence, was appointed to look into at once the organizing of a local telephone company and report back to this meeting to be assembled at the call of the chair.

The richest tungsten mine in the world is located in Guysboro County, Nova Scotia. It has recently been sold to a syndicate of Canadian capitalists.

Owing to the scarcity of domestic servants in Montreal and other places fifty-eight dusky belles from the island of Guadeloupe have come to Montreal and forty-eight more will follow shortly.

**NEW REGULATIONS
IN GAME ACT**

Surveyor General Makes Formal Announcement of Changes.

Hon. W. C. H. Grimmer, Surveyor General announces the following regulations as having been put into force under Section 52 of the Game Act of 1909:

1. The use of sink boxes, so called, in shooting geese or brant, is restricted to the hours between daylight and twelve o'clock noon each during the hunting season, and the same can only be used by a person having a license therefor issued by the Surveyor General. The person obtaining such license shall use one sink box only and shall have his name and number of his license displayed in plain sight on his box. Immediately after twelve o'clock noon each day the owner of such sink box shall remove the same from the shooting ground or sink it out of sight. Any sink box not licensed shall be destroyed by any game warden or other persons finding the same and any box licensed and left on the shooting ground after the hours herein named may also be destroyed by any game warden or other person finding the same. The chasing of geese, brant or ducks by power, sail or other boats to cause them to fly or to drive them away from their feeding grounds is strictly prohibited. The fee for the license above herein mentioned shall be \$1.00 per year.

2. Notwithstanding anything contained in "The Game Act, 1909," and amending Act, it shall be lawful for the residents of the parish of Grand Manan in the county of Charlotte, to shoot black duck within the boundaries of said parish between the first day of October in any year and the first day of March in the next following year.

3. That the limit under the Game Act for duck shooting shall be twenty birds per gun per day.

4. That the limit under the Game Act for partridges and woodcock respectively shall be ten birds per gun per day, and that no other means of killing partridges and woodcock shall be allowed except by shooting.

5. The sale of woodcock is prohibited between the date of this regulation and the first day of September, A. D. 1912.

EXPORT OF PULP WOOD

The Act passed by the Provincial Legislature last week regarding the disposition of pulp wood, other than poplar, cut upon crown lands, is a good one. It provides that such pulp wood must be manufactured within the Dominion of Canada. As Quebec and Nova Scotia have all the pulp of their own they need, the act will, in practice, merely cut off the export to the United States of pulp wood produced on our public lands. It will encourage the erection of more pulp and paper mills in this province, thus enlarging the sphere of our industry and increasing the number of our working men and the farmer's opportunities to dispose of his farm products in the home market. As the Act refers only to wood cut upon crown lands it does not interfere with any real or imaginary private right, while it will benefit the whole world in eliminating the needless loss of time and labor hitherto sustained in the transportation of the raw material from our forests to the distant mills of the United States. The pulp can be more cheaply manufactured in the vicinity of its origin, thus making an absolute saving of a large percentage of the present cost. The gain to the province will be great. Whereas only about \$7.00 a ton is paid in wages in this province for the preparation of pulp wood for export, it provides about \$15.00 if manufactured into pulp here and from \$35.00 to \$37.00 a ton if fully made into paper here. The government's decision to follow the example set by Quebec and Ontario is to be commended.

As little as possible of our natural products should be sent out of the country to be manufactured. Paper should be made, lumber sawn into deals, boards, laths and shingles; iron smelted, and gypsum ground as near as possible to the place from which they are cut or dug. It is a great loss to the country to have our iron ore shipped to the United States to be smelted and worked by outsiders who expend the least possible sums in the country in which the iron is mined. The Act relating to Pulpwood, however, is a distinct gain, and the country will stand for a lot more of government regulation and ownership.

**THE FAILURE OF
PROTECTIVE TARIFFS**

The discussion started by the Canadian Government's reciprocity agreement with the President of the United States has been productive of great good in more ways than one. Not the least of the beneficial results is the greater awakening of the people to the inherent iniquity of the Protective system. Not only the justice of High Protection at all is being seriously called in question. So whether the Reciprocity Agreement becomes law or not it will not have been made in vain. In an able editorial on "Ruling Classes," the St. John Daily Telegraph of a recent date has the following timely remarks upon the political failure of the United States which failure, though by no means entirely due to fiscal mistakes, has been greatly hastened by that country's tariff system:

"The excessive protective tariff system among our neighbors is simply a means by which certain interests get control of legislation in order to tax their fellow-citizens for their own benefit. Some of the victims get strong enough to force admittance into the steel, so it comes to be the accepted idea in the pursuit of wealth that the way to success is to organize a steal of some kind and to get inside of it. Everyone must have his little sphere of plunder and special advantage. The administrators of American life insurance the children of poor people at a decided disadvantage educationally with the sons and daughters of the well-to-do. The parents who are too poor to do without putting their children under sixteen years of age to work should be assisted by the government so that their little ones may receive as good a start in life as any others. Poverty should never be allowed to deprive a child of a good elementary education. Let everybody have an equal opportunity!"
