



RAILWAYS AND POLITICIANS

The speech of R. K. Tracey, M.L.A., which takes up much of this isses of The Observer, is worth reading and preservation. His utterances are marked by moderation and show that the man is a careful thinker. He states that he wishes to discuss all the questions from a husness standpoint and not from the yiew of the politician. But Mr. Tracev is something of a politician, nevertheless, as as shown by the naive way in which he side-steps some important questions. The Observer, however, will let these pass and take up briefly some other matters in which he is more out-spoken, but before going any further it is well to correct some figures which are somewhat ambiguous to the hungingly and it.

This refers in particular to the clause of one sentence which says As the speech stands there will be very many people throughout the country who will declare on the authority of Mr. Tracey that the Valley road gets only six cents for hauling the car load from Woodstock to St. John. What Mr. Tracey really meant was six cents per hundred pounds or about 800 a car of 50 tons which is a very reasonable rate. Mr. Tracey heald show as figures of what the Valley railroad gets for cars originating on its line and transferred to the

C. P. R. at Woodstock or at Fredericton.

As regards the building of the Valley railroad from Centreville to Grand Falls. Mr. Tracey, as well as Mr. Caldwell, Mr. Burlock, Mr. Smith and all the other Misters that intend to effect politics, are going to tell the people that this is the very thing for them and that they

are going to do their very utmost to bring it about. Let us face the first fact. In order to have a paying district the railway must have a clear twenty-five miles of good supplying district the tory on either side of it. The proposed extension of the Valley Railway will run to the apex of a triangle with Centreville as its base, with Floreneeville, on the C. P. R., on one corner, and Bridgewater, on the B. & A., at the other corner, a distance of about eight miles as the crow flies. Therefore, the Valley Railway if run north to Grand Falls will at no point be further than three miles from the B. & A. on one side, or the C. P. R. on the other; and neither of the two existing roads are over-burdened with traffic, and yet have served and serving faithfully and well.

That the connection with the N. T. R. at Grand Falls will form a fink for through traffic from the West is a fallacy. The N. T. R. route via McGivney and Fredericton to St. John is shorter than the proposed Valley route and it is lying in practical disuse, representing million-upon millions of wasted money. Will Mr. Tracey or any other politician tell us that the completion of the Valley railway from Centreville to Grand Falls is going to create more freight from the West?

This is the fourth of a series of railway editorials in The Observer but it is not the last. We must tell the people who have hoped for the extension of the Valley railroad that as much as individuals should desire it, the road is not feasible from a business standpoint. It can never pay the enormous cost of building, and those higher up know with absolute surety that the extension will never be built.
