NEW-BRUNSWICK. OPENING OF THE LEGISLATURE. The Legislature was opened at Fredericton, on Wednesday last, by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the following SPEECH.

"Mr. President, and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, "Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly: "It is with great satisfaction that I now for the first time meet the Legislature of this loyal Province. I know that we have in view a common object—the fulfilment of our duties to Her most Gracious Majesty, and the welfare of the people in this part of Her Dominions.

The force of Law and the supremacy of the Civil Power in the Mother Country have demonstrated most strikingly the excellence of those Institutions, in the maintenance of which we have a common interest. We owe unfeigned gratitude to that Divine Being who has upheld the integrity of the British Empire, and has spared us the bloodshed and tumult with which it has pleased Him to visit so many great and powerful Nations.

The Commissioners appointed by Her Majesty's Government, have made their Report on the proposed Line between Halifax and Quebec, a copy of which will be laid before you. I believe the destiny of these Provinces involved in this question more than any other which I can name.

A BILL.

For the purpose of the more effectually repairing the Roads and Bridges on the Island of Camp Bello, in the County of Charlotte, WHEREAS, the scattered state of the population on the Island of Camp Bello, renders the present High Way Act almost impracticable; for remedy thereof:

I.—Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That all persons liable to perform stat labour on the roads and bridges in the Parish of Camp Bello, in the County of Charlotte, shall in future pay the sum of one shilling and six pence, for each such every day's labour such persons are respectively liable to perform.

II.—And be it enacted, That the monies required to be paid by virtue of this Act, shall be assessed, levied and collected, in the same manner as any Parish or County rates are assessed levied and collected, by virtue of any law now in force, or hereafter to be in force for that purpose in this Province; and such monies when collected shall be paid over to the Commissioner of Highways to be appointed for that purpose in the same manner, and by the same authority, as Commissioners of Highways are now appointed, to be by them expended for public auction in their respective districts on the Highways and Bridges in said districts.

III.—And be it enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force until the first day of April which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.

A BILL to provide for the more effectually repairing the Roads and Bridges on the Island of Grand Manan, in the County of Charlotte.

WHEREAS, the scattered state of the population on the Island of Grand Manan, renders the present High Way Act almost impracticable; for remedy thereof:

I.—Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That all persons liable to perform stat labour on the roads and bridges in the Parish of Grand Manan, in the County of Charlotte, shall in future pay the sum of one shilling and six pence, for each such every day's labour such persons are respectively liable to perform.

II.—And be it enacted, That the monies required to be paid by virtue of this Act, shall be assessed, levied and collected, in the same manner as any Parish or County rates are assessed levied and collected, by virtue of any law now in force, or hereafter to be in force for that purpose in this Province; and such monies when collected shall be paid over to the Commissioner of Highways to be appointed for that purpose in the same manner, and by the same authority, as Commissioners of Highways are now appointed, to be by them expended for public auction in their respective districts on the Highways and Bridges in said districts.

III.—And be it enacted, That this Act shall continue and be in force until the first day of April which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.

A BILL To incorporate "Howard Division, No One Sons of Temperance, of the Province of New Brunswick."

SECTION I.—Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, that an association called "Howard Division, Number One, Sons of Temperance, of the Province of New Brunswick," be established and in active and useful operation in the town of St. Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, for the purpose of suppressing the use of intoxicating liquors, and for accumulating a fund from which mutual assistance and benefit can be afforded to the same in case of sickness or accident, to be incorporated, and that Freeman H. Todd, George S. Hill, Robert Watson, Thomas Yeazzy, Thomas Laughlin, William Thompson, William T. Rose, Matthew Hannah, William P. Lally, and such other persons as are now, or may hereafter become members of the said association, agreeably to the constitution, rules, bye laws, and regulations of the same, their associates and successors, shall and they are hereby erected, constituted, and declared to be a Body Politic and Corporate, by the name and style of "Howard Division, Number One, Sons of Temperance, of the Province of New Brunswick," and by that name shall have all the general powers, authorities and prerogatives made incident to a Corporation by act of assembly in this Province for the aforesaid purpose, and those only. Provided always, that the real estate which the said Corporation may hold, or may hereafter hold, shall not exceed six hundred pounds.

SECTION II.—And be it enacted, that no member of the said Division or association, shall have any power to assign, transfer, or set over unto any person or persons whatsoever, any interest which he may have in or claim to the funds or property of the said division or association; but the same shall at all times remain the property of the said division or association, and under the control of the said division or association.

SECTION III.—And be it enacted, that no funds or property of any kind whatsoever belonging to the said division or association, shall be subject to the payment of the debts of any of its members; nor shall the same be liable to be attached, or taken in execution, by any judgment, creditor, or creditors, against any of the members of the said division or association.

SECTION IV.—And be it enacted, that the property and funds of the said division or association, shall alone be responsible for the debts and engagements of the same.
