

European Intelligence.

Mr. Wise, M. P., is to be leader of the Whig section of the Irish Members in the present session.

Mr. Pakenham, the newly appointed British Envoy to the United States, sailed in the Vestal, Captain Talbot, from Portsmouth, on the 19th ult.

Mr. Everett is now in correspondence with Lord Stanley, the Colonial Secretary, upon the Oregon treaty question.—The American Minister has had several interviews with his Lordship at the Colonial Office.

Mr. Everett, the American minister, had a long interview with Lord Stanley, at the Colonial Office, on the 22d ult.—Mr. Macaulay, from New Brunswick, also visited his Lordship the same day.

Colonel Sir Augustus D'Este will be allowed to assume the title of his deceased father, the Duke of Sussex; the Queen having expressed a wish to that effect.

Vice Admiral Sir John Chambers White has been appointed Commander-in-Chief at the North; Captain William F. Martin son of Admiral Sir Bayam Martin, being the flag Captain.

The appointment of Mr. Montgomery Martin to the post of Treasurer of Hongkong, was officially gazetted on Tuesday night. The appointment has given much satisfaction to the mercantile interest.

Mr. Davis, who formerly acted as successor for a short time to the late Lord Napier to China, has been appointed by the Government to relieve Sir Henry Pottinger as the Queen's representative and Governor of Hong Kong.

The latest accounts from Howick convey the gratifying intelligence that the venerable Earl Gray is going on as favourably as can be expected at his advanced period of life, and daily recovering from the effects of his recent severe illness.

The bullion now in the Bank of England is returned at the large sum of £14,639,000. This amount of gold appears large when contrasted with that which appears in the returns four years ago. It then fell much below three millions. The three per cent, too, were then quoted at 80. They are now at 90.

In proof of the decline of the whale fishery, it is mentioned that the whole number of vessels that sailed in 1843, was eleven, whereas there used to be about thirty per annum.

Acquittal of Mrs. Gilmour.—The trial of Mrs. Christina Cochran or Gilmour, for the murder of her husband—a case which has excited great interest, both from its circumstances, and the parent's apprehension in New York, under the Ashburton Treaty, occupied the High Court of Justice on Friday and Saturday week. Evidence was laid on Friday for the prosecution, at great length, and on Saturday the Jury were addressed by the Lord Justice Clerk, the Jury retired to consider their verdict, and in about an hour afterwards they returned into the Court, and by their chancellor returned the following verdict:—"The jury, after careful and mature deliberation of the evidence before them in this case, are unanimously of opinion that John Gilmour died from the effects of arsenic; but they find that the charge is not proven against the panel at the bar as libelled."

Dr. Wolf's Mission to Bokhara.—Letters have been received from Dr. Wolf by the committee of the Stoddart and Connolly fund, dated Erzeroum, in Armenia, Dec. 18 and 19. The Pasha of Erzeroum gives him letters, provides guards, and pays his expenses to the frontier. Intelligence has also been received from Constantinople, dated the 21st ult., which states that some people had arrived who left Bokhara within three months; Stoddart was alive, in high favour, and no public execution had been heard of.

The medical men have declared the fever of Hong Kong to be the jungle fever of India and the yellow fever of the West Indies combined. Chusan is considered much more healthy than Hong Kong for a settlement. The men of the 55th were dying off with fever, and the regiment is now reduced from 1000 strong to 150.

The Bengal Government has reported to the Indian Government at home, in answer to their long pending inquiry, that no pledge whatever was originally given for the annual payment of £6000 to the Temple of Juggernaut, and consequently that there is no pre-eminence, its own landed revenue will of course continue, but its own votaries and patrons must henceforth supply the needful, and not the British nation.

The cultivation of the tea plant has been attempted, with success, in the Mauritius.

The Greeks have passed a law expelling from the limits of the nation all white men who play at cards, whether they have Indian wives or not.

The extraordinary and astonishing feat of walking 1000 miles in 1000 hours, has been completed by a Mrs. Harrison, 40 years of age, upon the Leeds and Whitehall Road.

A terrible coal-pit accident, accompanied by a fearful loss of life, occurred in the vicinity of Whitehaven on the 18th ult.—A colliery, called the Duke's Pit, exploded in the lowermost gallery, where no fewer than sixteen miners were at work, all of whom were killed.

Incendiary Fires.—England continues to be infested by villians who destroy by burning at night. Since our last publication large amounts of property have been destroyed by fires in the following places: Eastry, Great Barford, Bedminster, Saint Ives, Daventry, Nottingham, Dunstable, Telmersham, Slesford, Macuden, Harlow, Crowland, Weldon, Ipswich, Poisted, Batisford.

The *Globe* of Friday states, on the authority of a city correspondent, that the Bank of England is to obtain a renewal of its charter from the present government. It is said that in return the Bank is to assist the government in any plan for reducing the interest of Consols, by advancing a large sum of money to pay off those creditors of the nation who may be unwilling to submit to the reduction. Bank Stock had risen in consequence. The Times of Saturday treats the statement slightly, and the Morning Herald of the same day contends that the *Globe* has been mystified. The last named journal seems disposed, however, to adhere to its statement; and in confirmation, refers to the fact that the Governor and Deputy Governor of the Bank have late "been in unusually frequent attendance at Downing-street."

The intended marriage of the Duke of Nassau to a Russian Princess is announced to take place on the 28th inst.—The Emperor Nicholas is thus by degrees engraving his family on the German principalities. He has already contracted family alliances with Prussia, Bavaria, the Grand Duchy of Hesse, and in a short time a Russian Princess will be united to the heir to the throne of Denmark.

The Duke of Wellington's 'Napping.'—At the conclusion of the banquet at Windsor Castle, on Tuesday evening last, Her Majesty and Prince Albert, with their distinguished guests, retired as usual, to the green drawing room, the Queen's private band being stationed in the adjoining apartment (the crimson drawing), the folding doors of which were thrown open. In the course of the evening Her Majesty left the private apartment arm-in-arm with the Duke of Wellington, and seated herself with the Duke on her right hand and surrounded by the Court near the hand. After listening to the performance of two or three compositions, the Queen rose from her seat to retire, a movement which was, of course, followed by the whole of the Royal party, with the exception of the Duke, who had fallen into a profound nap. Her Majesty, smiling, and evidently enjoying the involuntary forgetfulness of his Grace, playfully tapped the Duke on the shoulder with her bouquet, which speedily brought him from a state of momentary oblivion to perfect consciousness, when the Queen, with a gracious smile (amidst the suppliant utterings of the illustrious guests), made his Grace a low courtesy, and taking the noble warrior's arm in the most kind and affectionate manner; and laughing the while, proceeded from the crimson to the green drawing room, where coffee was served.—[*British*].

American Provisions.—On Wednesday fortnight a private show of foreign provision took place in the safe room of Messrs Keeley and Hunt, Monument yard, London, previous to the sale, on the succeeding day. As soon as an improvement in the care and feeding takes place on the other side, to accord with the taste of the English public, there can be no doubt that the imports from America will cause a great revolution in the prices of such articles.—After the inspection of the prepared samples the whole of the gentlemen adjourned to Nicholson's wharf, where the stock was shown in bulk, several packages were turned out for their inspection, and offered the fairest criterion of the importance of this new branch of trade that has as yet been shown. The American cheeses and were high in favour and are undoubtedly well suited to the English palate. The Labrador salmon is also in good condition for the English use. The proceedings of the day were highly interesting, and have given rise to expectations that a thorough simplification of the tariff may be speedily obtained. The great point in the meantime is, to let the public know that American hams and tongues, and Labrador salmon are now imported into this country.

BELFAST, JANUARY 1.

The last month with the exception of a few days, has been unusually mild and fine, and the whole country has the aspect it usually bears in the middle of March. Business generally progresses well; our manufactures and shipping, and our artisans, are all fully employed, and the consequent increase of consumption, tell in the steadily advancing prices of all the necessities of life.

TIMBER.—We have had no public sales during the past month, but the demand for consumption continues to increase, and prices gradually but steadily to advance, and high prices are expected for a cargo of deals. (St. John's) and timber advertised for auction on Wednesday next.

OBITUARY.—It is with deep regret we announce the death of Lady Douglas, at Bothwell Castle, Hamilton, aged 71.

Major Rutherford, 88th Regt. and Mr. Hobber, Magistrate's Clerk at the Mansion House, died recently at London.

Lieut. Gen. Sir Wm. Johnston, K. C. B. Commander of the 68th Infantry, died on the 23d ult. at Southampton, in the 72d year of his age.

Major General Churchill, Deputy Quartermaster-general of Her Majesty's forces in Bengal, died lately at that presidency.—Sir Robert Andrews Douglas, Bart. of Gluebur in command of the 2d batt. 12th Regt. at the Mauritius, died there on the 1st November.

Major Gen. Wautier died at Clermont on the 14th ult. in the 87th year of his age. He was Colonel of the 84th Regiment of the line.

Sir Robert Lewis Fitzgerald, Knt. K. C. H. Vice Admiral of the Red, died at Bath on the 17th ult. in the 69th of his age.

Lady Carr, (formerly widow of the late Spencer Percival,) died on the 27th ult. at Ealing.

Sir Francis Burdett died at his town residence on the 23d ult. The deceased commenced his political career as a reformer of the boldest and most uncompromising principles, and was for many years distinguished

as "Westminster's Glory and England's Pride," an appellation which Cobbeit diminished to plain "Old Glory." In 1812 Sir Francis was committed to the Tower for uttering unpalatable truths as to the constitution of Parliament; and in 1819, was prosecuted for his manly denunciation of the Manchester massacre, convicted, and sentenced to pay a fine of £1000, and be imprisoned. In consequence, it is supposed of being passed over when the Reform Ministers came into power, Sir Francis went over to the Tories; and since that period his sayings and doings have not excited the slightest possible interest, either amongst his old political or his new ones.

THE LATE CHANGES IN THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.—Some very important Despatches from Lord Stanley to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, relative to the late changes in the Executive Council, have been laid before the House of Assembly. In these Despatches, his Lordship lays down the following principles for the guidance of the Administrator of the Government, viz.—That no solvent or debtor shall hold a seat in the Executive Council—that any Member who neglects his Parliamentary duties for a certain time, (to be hereafter specified) shall be displaced—that the number of Councilors shall not exceed 21, not more than one-third to hold offices under the Crown—that the different religious denominations in the Province shall be represented in the Council, as nearly as possible in proportion to their respective numbers, and that every religious denomination shall have at least one representative therein. How the principle is to be carried out—we cannot imagine.

Capture of a Slave.—The British brig Wasp, just arrived at New York from Sierra Leone, having left that place fifty days since, reports that three weeks previous to her sailing, the British brig of war Rapid had captured a Brazilian slaver, having on board two hundred and fifty slaves. The slaves were freed, and the vessel condemned, the British Government allowing each of the crew a shilling a day to subsist on.
