





Roots and cabbages are benefitted in vitality and keeping qualities by romaining in their growing position until the approach of severe weather. Thousands of tons of roots and cabbage perish in pits and cellars in this country annually; not from the extremes of cold, but from the extremes of heat. Fermentation commences rapidly when the gaseous fluids from the newly-pitted roots can-not escape, and those that are not re-duced by decay are injured in vitality. This can be avoided by covering; the pits only lightly at the beginning-a few inches of earth or other covering;


