HEROES OF DARDANELLES

Nursing Sister Frances Munroe Buried With Military Honors.

Buried With Military Honors.

The following descriptive letter is from the pen of Mr. R. Winters (with No. 3 Stationary Hospital, "Somewhere in the Dardanelles," Sept. 10.) The death of Nursing Sister Frances Munroe was reported in The Transcript a few weeks ago. She was a daughter of the late Mac Munroe, of Wardsville, and leaves many relatives and friends and old school mates in that village and vicinity:

The real sting of death was shown to the personnel of No. 3 stationary hospital this week when the grim reaper paid its first visit to the hospital and claimed two victims, One of them was Nursing Sister Frances Munroe, of Toronto, the first Canadian young woman to lay down her life on active service: and the other, Seaman George Sable, of the Royal naval division. Both were sufferers with dysentery and gave up their lives only after a long and determined fight against death.

Both were admitted to the hospital the same day and their deaths occurred four hours apart. Sister Munroe was the first to pass away and Seaman Sable followed shortly after. Everything possible was done for both but they gradually became weaker and life ebbed out peacefully to both. The last two nights of the fight they were on the bink of death and their death was hourly expected, but each hour they battled valiantly. Several times they were given only a few hours to live and everyone stood around momentarily expecting to hear that the fight had ended. Hopes rose during the afternoon for both patients, but as night came on their condition became worse and when the end came, with it came sadness.

But the shardships that each suffer and the cause for which they are working mould together a friendship that is sincere, and nothing could have been adone for either unfortunate that was not done by the officers and others of the unit. The merest detail for the paying the last respects to those who had departed received the most careful attention and although the conditions were crude as compared with those at home, the funeral was all the more impressive and a picture is stamped on the memories of those who witnessed the double funeral that will not fade for many years.

No provision is made for caskets for the bodies of those who give up their lives for the empire in active service.


