BERLIN, March 20.—Prince Bismarck, in his note to the Emperor tendering his resignation, alleged that old age and failing health were his reasons for desiring to withdraw from public life.

Gen Von Caprivi, commander of the 10th Army Corps, has been appointed Chancellor of the empire to succeed Prince Bismarck.

The Gazette says Count Herbert Bis The Gazette says Count Herbert List marck persists in resigning his post of Im-perial Foreign Minister, and that he will be succeeded by either Herr Von Radouitz, the German ambassador at Constantinople, or Count Von Hatzfeldt, German ambassa-

The Recent Siberian Massacre.

LONDON, March 20.—A correspondent in Siberia sends the details of the Irkutsk Siberia sends the details of the Irkutsk affair. He says the prisoners involved were exiles suspected of having been concerned in the explosion at Zurich last March. They were allowed to live without restraint in Irkutsk and easily found employment among sympathizers who are opposed to the Russian system of exiling political prisoners to Siberia all went well until the police discovered that the exiles were printing proclamations and sending them to Moscow. As soon as the authorities learned what was going on the leaders among the exiles were sent to labor in mines and the others were told to prepare themselves for a journey into the interior. The unfortunate prisoners appealed in vain and at last resolved, to sell their lives dearly. Barricading themselves in a house they awaited an attack They had been well provided with arms andammunition by friendly Siberians, and they received the troops with a heavy fire. Several soldiers were killed by the first volley. A fierce fight ensued, the exiles holding out until a majority of their number was killed or wounded. After it was all overthe ringleader, who survived the battle, was hanged.

OVER 200,000 COAL MINERS STILL OUT.

LONDON, March 20.—The stagnation in many branches of industry caused by the strike of coal miners continues, and threatens to become more accentuated as the manufacturers' stocks of fuel become exhausted, unless the strike is speedily settled. The East Lancashire cotton trade will meet with a severe check. The manufacturers cannot afford to pay the enchanced prices for steam coal. Half the mills at Accrington are at a standstill, owing to scarcity of fuel, and many thousands of hands are idle.

The strike in Nottinghamshire is practically ended. The men have resumed work in all the pits except four. If the strike continues until the end of the week 10,000 brick and terra cotta workers will be thrown out of employment.

At a meeting of the Lancashire and Cheshire coal mine owners it was decided of resist the demands of the miners.

The mine owners of Leicestershire decided to give the men the advance they demanded.

Owing to the coal strike several more mills at Accington and Leeds have closed. The situation is becoming alarming. It is estimated that 208,000 miners are still out. Half of Yorkshire mine owners have conceded an advance to the strikers.

COAL MINE DISASTER.

Five Men Burned to Death and Sever or Eight Injured.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 20.—A special from Hurley says: A big fire is raging in the Germania mine, and five men have been burned to death. It was about midnight when the fire was discovered in No. 2 shaft at the third level. The alarm was quickly given to the men at work in the mine. In spite of their efforts to escape five of the men at work between the fifth and sixth levels in the same shaft were cut off.

The fire burned fiercely and soon found its way to the surface, destroying the shaft house and threatening the engine and boiler house. Waller came to surface once and returned to look for his companions, and there is no doubt he was suflocated and fell down the shaft.

In the Municipal Committee this morning the consideration of Mr. Bronson's bill to amend the Municipal Act in so far as it affects the Street Railway Act was again resumed. The following clause was added to the bill introduced by Mr. Bronson: "A municipal corporation which builds, constructs, owns or manages a street railway shall be entitled to exercise the same rights and powers and be subject to the same liabilities as street railway ocmpanies under the Street Railway Act, except when the same shall conflict or be inconsistent with the rights of municipal corporations as provided by law. Nothing herein contained shall relieve any municipality from the obligations and liabilities in respect to all roads and highways or bridges as provided by the Municipal Act." 


