The peasants everywhere refuse English gold, and, as the Egyptian gold coins are much debased, a general dislocation of trade has ensued. The dishonesty of the Egyptian coins has given a new impetus to counterfeiting. A firm of bankers in this city are implicated in the sweating, but the police fear to act. London, Sept. 8.—Lady Scott has been London, Sepi. S.—Lady Sooth has been examined as to her solvency in a sitting in bankruptcy before Mr. Registrar Linklater. Lady Scoth is the mother of Mrs. Dick Russell and the Countess Russell, who have been conspicous in the divorce courts and on the amateur variety stage. Considering her age she has not lagged behind her daughters recently in causing comment in London society. Tricks of Bogus Claim Agents.

London, Sept. 8.—In spite of the repeated warnings of the press bogus claim agents are doing a thriving business with supposititious estates in England. The inquiries at the United States to supposititious estates in England. The integrates estates with lost heirs are more numerous new than at any other time within the last year, and there is every evidence that considerable sums are sent here constantly from the United States and Canada as fees for the swindlers. Cornelius Chadwick, of Germantown, near Philadelphia, is one of the latest victims. He was induced by claim agents to suppose that he was the long-songht heir to the estate of his ancestor, Sir Andrew Chadwick, who died in 1768. The value of the estate was estimated with unusual moderation to be only about \$187,000. While the estate was estimated with unusual moderation to be only about \$187,000. While the estate was still unsettled, and, therefore, in the Court of Chancery, the agents said, it was kept in the Bank of England, and the Duke of Bridgewater was drawing from it annually \$20,000. The facts of the case furnish only the names in this remarkable story. Otherwise it is pure falsehood. The Dukedom of Bridgewater has been extinct since 1803. There is no Chadwick estate available for distribution among heirs, as the personalty was disposed of a few years after Sir Andrew's death, or more than a century ago, and legal limitations bar all possible claims to the reality. The money in the hands of the bank is only a few hundred pounds, payable to two unknown heirs, whose names are not Chadwick.

The selection of this particular estate as a basis for their swindle was suggested to the claim agents probably by the attempt of two men in 1772 to obtain possession of the estate of Sir Andrew's death. The two forgers were hanged. It is believed that the gang behind the Chadwick swindle is to obtain advances of \$25 to \$50 from their victims for the estensible purpose of naying preliminary costs of proceedings.



THE GREAT SNAKE QUESTION.

Many Victims of Snake-Bite in British

Many Victims of Snake-Bite in British India.

The most recent publication of the return of deaths due to snake-bite in India would seem to have awakened considerable attention in England. Year after year the number of deaths due to this cause continues without diminishment. Indeed the returns show them to be rather increased than otherwise; though whether this may not be due to an improvement in the system of obtaining returns rather than to an absolute increases may be somewhat open to doubt. One would have hoped that the scale of reward given for the destruction of those reptilia would ere this have produced an improved result; but in spite of all that has been done, and of the heavy amount paid for such destruction annually, we still have to regret the death year after year of between 40,000 and 50,000 persons from this cause. One great obstacle to the extermination of venomous snakes in Ceylon as well as India is the so-called religious objection to the taking of life, even the life of the fiercest and most destructive animals and the most virulently poisonous reptiles; although those who entertain this objection in regard to the lower animals have no hesitation in taking human life to gratify their fend hate, their revenge, or their cupidity. If we accept the verdicts of inquiries into cases of sudden death as revealing the whole of the fatalities from snake-bite in 1891, the proportion of deaths from this cause in our population of 3,000,000 was within a fraction of 35 per 1,000,000, the total being 104, according to the return in the judicial statistics. The principal victims, it is believed, are the semi-nude natives who on hot night sleep in the open air. A venomous snake coils near such a person, who, turning over in his sleep, irritates the snake into biting, and the person is fatally affected before awakening out of sleep and being able to apply the proper remedies even if these are understood. But instead of tight bandaging and bold excision, confidence is placed in useless "mantrams" or charms.—[T

The crowd of men at the Police Court this morning indicated something nuusual on the docket. Harriet Chrysler was charged with keeping a disorderly house on Nelson street, and Martha 8t. Mrs. Chrysler is rather up in years while the other female occupant was a young girl about 17 years old. Mr. McKillop, for the Crown, dropped the case against her and Kyle. Serg. Jenkins, who raided the house with a posse of police, stated that when he first approached the place last Wednesday morning about 1 o'clock he could hear women calling as if in distress. Men could also be heard using profans and abusive language. The officer went immediately to telephone for assistance and left P. C. Day to guard the house. The latter stated that the disorderly conduct continued until the patrol wagon with a posse of police came along. When the house was entered only—two women could be seen. The men had crawled into a hole under the house and a constable had to rout them out with his baton. Evidence was given to show that Woodfork was now on suspended sentence on a charge of vagrancy, that Fountain had been arrested a number of times before, and that Watson had been a prisoner on charges of drunkenness and larceny. The magistrate considered the four defendants guilty. Mrs. Chrysler was remanded for a week for sentence and the men were each fined \$5 or twenty days in jail. Woodfork and Watson were warned that the next time they appeared they would spend a term in the Central Prison. Chief Williams charged Philip Richards, Frank Tilbury and Farmer Everett, three young lads, with disorderly conduct. Richards and Everett were fighting on Richards. But instead of hitting him it went through a window in Wm. Skellet's butcher shop. The boys furnished 50 cents each with which to repair the damage and they were let go. Tilbury tried to stop the fight, and he also was let go.

John H. Powe was charged with allow-ing his dog to run at large without a tag, and also with rescuing it from the dog cathers. Mr. Powe explained that it was a pup that his children had for a pet. They were playing with it on the street when they saw the man with the net coming along and at once they ran crying to their father who called the dog into the house. 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

RIVALS OF COLUMBUS.

Just as the United States is about to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America by Columbus, having the co-operation of the nations of the world in the effort, M. Napoleon Ney, president of the French Society of Commercial Geography, comes forward with the contention that the intrepid Spanish explorer was not the discoverer of this continent. He maintains that in prehistoric times Eastern Asia and North America were joined by a strip of land, since almost entirely submerged. The Orkneys, Shetlands, Iceland, Greenland, etc., were but stepping stones, as i were, between the old world and the new.
The London Standard's Paris correspondent

land, etc., were but stepping-stones, as it were, hetween the old world and the new. The London Standard's Paris correspondent sends the following extract from a paper by M. Ney, in which he says:

"Thave seen a tomb of masonry discovered in Boston Bay at the end of the last century. It contained a skeleton and an iron handle of a sword. The skeleton was that of a man of the white race, and the sword handle was of European make previous to the fifteenth century—that is to say, it dated back a century earlier than Christopher Columbus. At the Smithsonian Institution, I saw the fac-simile of the curious inscription of Dighton Writing Rock, known since 186). The inscription, which is written in Runic characters, accompanied with cryptographic signs and drawings, relates to the adventures of the Scandinavians in Vinland. It signifies: 'One hundred and thirty-one men of the north occupied this country with Thornfinn.' But a more important inscription is that of Arrow Head. I have examined it on the bank of the Potomac, three kilometers from the falls of that river. It marked the tomb of a Norman chief's wife, killed by an arrow, and like the other inscription, is graven in the rock in Runic characters. Translated into English, it runs: "Here lies Syasi, the fair one of Western Iceland, the widow of Koldr, sister of Thorgr, by her father; aged 25 years. God be merciful to her." In the tomb were found three teeth, a fragment of a large bone which fell to dust, various toilet articles in bronze, illiformed and full of holes, two fragments of a necklace, and two coins of the Lower Empire. The fact of those Roman coins being in possession of a Norman chief is not extraordinary, as the men of the north—sought after to recruit the guard of the Emperors of Constantinople."

Ney further asserts that several years before the voyage of Pinzon (who commanded the Nina on Columbus' first oyage and who later visited the coast of voyage and wno later visited the coast of Brazil) a bold captain from Dieppe landed on the shores of South America. The original documents concerning this voyage, M. Ney says, were destroyed in the fire which burned the archives of Dieppe in 1804.

If men will go hunting up new continents they must leave behind them something more tangible than alleged Runic inscriptions, which may be nothing more than scrawls of native Indians, or run the great risk of being turned aside as myths by posterity.




