Cost of the British Coal Strike. LONDON, Dec. 6.—Statistics of the great strike of the English coal miners which ended a few days ago show that during the sixteen weeks of the strike the normal output of 63,000,000 tons dropped to 39,000,000. Ordinarily 11,000,000 tons are exported and 49,000,000 tons consumed in England in the period mentioned, but during the strike only 8,750,000 tons were exported and 27,250,000 tons consumed. The estimated loss to mine owners, iron masters, railways, etc., was £13,255,615. The consumers paid in increased prices £1,767,000; miners, iron workers and other artisans lost £18,208,000. VOTED ON BY LONDON TAXPAYERS.

A number of London taxpayers have formed themselves into a "Property Holders' Association," the avowed purpose of which is to work for the defeat of one or more of the bylaws that are to be submitted to the people at the ensuing municipal elections. The opposition thus set on foot will no doubt stimulate the friends of the respective bylaws to take prompt action to put all the facts before the people. It is a misfortune, as we have said, that the aldermen have chosen the present time to bring forward all their monetary propositions. A better method would have been to vote on the more pressing bylaws at an earlier date, or to postpone those that could wait till a future time. When so large an expenditure is asked for all at once there is danger that the voters will vote down even the most defensible of the schemes advanced for the civic welfare.

As the aldermen are bound to have the bylaws go through, however, all that can be done is to have their provisions and probable effects plainly explained to the electorate. That at present there exists misconceptions as to the proposed expenditures is evident from a statement made at he private meeting of property holders to which allusion has been made. There, we are told, one of the members figured out that the bylaws provided for expenditures that would require on addition to the tax rate of the city, or its present basis, for 30 years to come. Here is his statement:

THE MONEY BYLAWS TO BE industrious men and their families could not be permanently employed at this point without paying their taxes to the civic coffers and helping others to pay their taxes. Remembering these facts weare inclined to the belief that the G. T. R. bonus would, in the circumstances, be good business move, and by no means an expenditure that would be burdensome to the taxpayers.

> An item for \$135,000 is put in the list for "London and Port Stanley Railway." The taxpavers are not called upon to vote that sum at this time, and it may be a year or two before any heavy expenditure is necessary. Nevertheless, there is not citizen who does not know that unless the London and Port Stanley Railway is kept in a safe condition, it would be worse than useless to the citizens of London-it would be a positive menace to the safety of every one who travels over it. Everybody recog nizes the fact that the bridges must be kept in repair or replaced by more substantial structures as soon as the engineers decree, But even here the situation is not so gloomy for the taxpayer as some make out. Though the city may have to borrow the sum named to put the road in good condition, it must not be forgotten that the company which has secured the lease is bound to pay upon the expenditure 41 per cent. per annum during the twenty years that it con trols the line. As the city can borrow money for that sum, or perhaps 1 per cent less, it is scarcely fair to bring this item in as a "burden."

This disposes of the whole list, with the exception of an extraordinary item of \$50,-000 that is added for "proposed hospita" extension." If a new hospital is to be built it may be necessary to expend so large sum, but if a wing is all that is deemed necessary, then \$10,000 would fill the bill. This much may be said on the hospital question: There is really no use in denouncing the city doctors who send pay patients to other hospitals unless the city authorities are prepared to provide the necessary accommodation for patients able and willing to pay for board and attention at the civic institution. The City Hospital was built for a much smaller population than has now to be provided for. In those days, few outside patients, or patients ready to pay, were sent in from the country and the hospital was constructed accordingly. The man agers of the institution and the doctors have either to restrict its usefulness or be provided with funds to extend it. If it is extended, we would not be surprised if the added revenue paid interest on the invest

This brief summary of the various pro posals to be voted on, orunder consideration by the authorities, may help taxpayers to ecide for themselves what is best for the city in each case. Those who have fathered the schemes must not take it for granted that they have an easy task before them unless they boldly face the opposition and give substantial reasons for the faith


