The trick is to procure a ballot paper-it need not here be explained from whom-and give it, ready marked for the Conservative candidate, to a doubtful or kicking voter. The voter puts the ballot into his pocket, enters the polling place, gets a regular ballot, and goes behind the screen. Coming out, he puts the ballot supplied to him already marked by the unscrupulous outside agent, into the hands of the returning officer, and carries out the unmarked ballot, supplied by the deputy returning officer, which he hands over to the Conservative agent, and receives his pay. The unmarked ballot thus brought out is then marked for the Conservative candidate, and handed over to the next purchasable voter who comes along, to be used in like manner, and so it goes

This rascality can and will be prevented tomorrow if the Hyman scrutineers do their full duty. They must watch every ballot given out to each of the election, or successive voter. They must see that the number and signature of the de-

Why Have the Names of the Deputy Returning Officers Been Kept Secret.

Mr. Franklin Wright, returning offier for the city, having refused to let become public the names of those who will be empowered to take the rote tomorrow, the gravest suspicions prevail throughout the city that some rascality, such as that by which the majority have before now been swin-

dled out of their rights, may be at-

tempted at the polls.

In recent elections, the grossest irregularities were perpetrated by agents of the Administration now on its last legs, and the same may hapen tomorrow unless the scrutineers London and other constituencies are extremely vigilant. They must see to it that the ballots given out are properly printed and properly initialed by the deputy returning officer, and they must watch that the marked ballot returned by the voter is the same ballot, properly initialed, that he received from the deputy returning officer. The scrutineers for the Liberal candidate must never let the ballot box out of their sight till the close of the poll and until the ballots are counted. They must see to it that the number of ballots counted correspond with the number given out, and they must watch that the deputy does nothing to invalidate a ballot. Then when the count is made. let the scrutineer insist on writing velope containing the counted ballots, and let him without fall obtain a signed certificate of the state of the vote as agreed to by the returning officer and the scrutineers. Unless these and other precautions are taken, the victory may again be stolen from Mr. Hyman, and the will of the people defeated.

In Tonquin she was picked up, with her arm terribly mangled by three knife cuts. The surgeons wanted to ampu-

tate it, but she refused, and today she can guide a bicycle with it. After an accident at Toulon, where she lives, she had to go to Paris to undergo an operation. The evening she left the hospital she was received by President Faure, to whom she presented the barrel of the zouave regi-ment, for which he had asked.—New York Journal.
