

William Ewart Gladstone came on hour apparently in the history of England, though a right one for mankind. was still in the air, and through it loomed Napoleon. With commerce paralyzed at its centers, war impending, and agitation among the people, many men of property in England, merchants and others heretofore untinged with Toryism, suddenly got a strong Conservative bias. No wonder, then, that the son of a great merchant, himself somewhat of a politician-in fact, Sir John Gladstone sat in the House of Commons beside his son later-should have imbibed Toryism at the start, though his GLADSTONE VS. So when Gladstone returned to parliament, it was as a representative of his college-the University of Oxford. No summary of Gladstone's life would be complete without a reference to the Naples episode. The House of Commons did not adjourn until 3:15 this morning, Clarke Wallace and Sir Adolphe Caron refusing to stand by an agreement Mr. Foster made with the Government to let Mr. Muloch's postoffice bill pass committee with the exception of the clause on which a general debate would take place before the third reading. The bill was amended, making the zone twenty miles for weekly newspapers free postage instead of ten. Free postage will be confined entirely to weekly newspapers, all daily newspapers being on the same footing. The World's Wheat Grop

the Product of Previous Years.

Washington, May 18.—The monthly statement of finance and commerce, just issued, contains a series of interesting tables on the world's wheat production, supply and distribution. They show the wheat crop of the world last year at only 2,139,549,168 bushels, against 2,430,497,000 in 1896; 2,546,494,000 in 1895, and 2,676,651,000 in 1894, the world's wheat crop of 1897 being smaller than that of any year since 1890, while the 1897 crop in the United States is reported as larger than in any year since 1891.

A table showing farm prices of wheat in the United States during a term of years gives the average price of wheat in 1897 as the highest, with three exceptions, since 1883, the exceptional years being 1888, 1890 and 1891. A table of freight rates on wheat shows that the average rate by rail from Chicago to New York has fallen from 16.5 cents per bushel in 1886 to 12.32 cents in 1897, and that the rates by lake and canal fell, in the same period, and between the same points, from 8.71 cents per bushel to 4.35 cents per bushel, while in the same period the rate from St. Louis to New Or-

The import duties of various countries on wheat are shown to be: Austria-Hungary, 19.5 cents per bushel; United States, 25 cents; Germany, 22.7 cents Tables quoted from the reports of

the department of agriculture estimate the wheat in farmers' hands in the United States on March 1, 1898, at 121,-320,500 bushels, against 88,149,072 bushels at the corresponding date last year, and 74,999,790 on March 1, 1895.
