

> From extensive inquiries through the fruit belt from Stoney Creek_to Niagara-on-the-Lake the best information that can be gained is that the peach crop will this year be from onethird to one-half a normal crop. Perhaps 40 per cent would be a high average of the estimates given out. The early and late Crawfords-the

peach that made Niagara famous-are almost a complete failure. They will not average the tenth of a crop. The Elberta, which is a second-grade peach, lately introduced because of its superior shipping qualities which fit it for the Northwest trade, is a good crop almost all over the district, but the Elberta does not constitute more than 20 per cent of the total crop. Other varieties are half a crop or less, so that altogether, perhaps, 40 per cent will be a libera! estimate.

The earlier reports sent out of an average crop were too optimistic, based on the number of fruit buds. However, ewing to the late, cold spring and the absence of bees at the right time to fertilize the blossoms, the fruit did not "set," and consequently men who were counting on thousands of baskets will now be glad to get that many hundred.

Of all the varieties of fruit, grapes alone promise a full crop, but growers confidently expect that the prices for these will be high, because of the scarcity of other fruits. Growers state that no grapes will be sold this year lower than \$30 per ton.

The scarcity of all kinds of fruit this year has about finished the commission agent, so far as this district is concerned. JAPAN'S LATEST TREATY.

The conclusion of a treaty between Russia and Japan evidently justifies the assumption that at least until 1915, when the Anglo-Japanese ten-year treaty expires, peace in the Far East will be maintained.

By this latest treaty Russia and Jaban reciprocally guarantee each other's territories on the Pacific coast of Asia and also the territorial integrity and Independence of China,

The treaty, according to a report From the Japanese capital, is believed to contain a secret clause, specially defining each country's sphere of influence and placing a part of the Sungari River within Japan's sphere, thus modifying Russia's exclusive rights of

navigating that stream. Japan has now concluded treaties with every naval power of consequence except Germany and the United States, and only in the event of her becoming involved in hostilities with either of these can peace in the Orient possibly be disturbed. There is reason to believe that Japan is willing to enter into agreements with both of these nations, and it is not improbable that before very long Germany will be found in line with Britain, France and Russia. She had little or nothing to rain by remaining in her present isoated state. Were she to send the bulk of her warships to the Pacific she might be able to beat Japan on the sea, but, at so great a distance from her base, she could not hope to cope with the forces of the Mikado on land. Moreover, even if her fleet should be victorious, Germany would be prerented the guarantees exchanged with Japan by Britain, France and Russian from occupying Japanese teritory, while should the Japanese fleet be triumphant, Japan would be enabled to seize Kiao Chao, the Carolines and Germany territory in New Guinea and the Samoan Islands. It


