# ENGINEER CHIPMAN'S REPORT ONLY COVERS SOUTH LONDON AT A TOTAL COST OF \$50,000

After Spending This Amount, City Must Go Ahead and Provide Storm Water System for North and East London---Looks Like a Big Proposition for the City Fathers of 1910.

Consulting Engineer Willis Chipman's report on the sewerage system of London has come to hand, and, as pointed out some days ago, it calls for the expenditure of \$50,000 in improvements.

In brief, Mr. Chipman recommends, and has prepared plans for a complete storm water sewer system for South London, and, in addition, provides for an additional main or syphon tube from the syphon chamber to the bacteria beds. Only casually does he touch upon the northern or eastern sections of the city, but recommends that a separate storm system be installed to serve those sections. VOLUMINOUS REPORT.

Mr. Chipman's report is voluminous, and is accompanied by a well-prepared system of plans. He details his visits to the city, and deals with the reports furnished him from time to time by Assistant Engineer Wright, regarding the flow, etc. He found the sanitary system work most satisfactory, and reiterates that

It is adequate to serve the city for many years to come, if untrammeled by Mr. Chipman goes over his report to the council in 1892, when he recommended a complete storm water system for the city. He states that the present system was not intended to be anything else than a sanitary system,

and will be sufficient to last the city until the population becomes 75,000. He points out that at 80 gallons per person, 6,000,000 gallons' capacity would be used, or 666 feet per minute. The capacity of the present sewer is 1,140 gallons a minute, leaving 474

gallons a minute for maximum fluctuation. THE RECOMMENDATIONS. Mr. Chipman quotes from C. G. Holzky, provincial engineer, X. G. Goodnough, of Massachusetts, and C. H. Rust, of Toronto, in support of his con-

tention, that the present system is only large enough for sanitary purposes. He then recommends that a 30-inch syphon pipe be constructed from the syphon bed on Evergreen avenue to the bacteria beds. The cost would be as follows: Castiron pipe, \$34,000; reinforced pipe, \$30,000. His opinion was that it would be better to do some of the work at least in iron. Of course, the storm sewer system would be independent of the sanitary

system. This pipe would be necessary, no matter what becomes of his suggestion as to a storm system. This latter scheme would cost \$20,000. It is broken up as follows: Cove road, 600 feet, \$1,000; Wharncliffe road, 830 feet, \$1,700; Byron avenue, 1,700 feet, \$2,650; Askin street, 1,800 feet, \$2,750; Tecumseh avenue, 2,900 feet, \$4,250; Briscoe street, 2,900 feet, \$4,000; Ridgeway, 1,100 feet, \$1,500; Becher street, 600 feet, \$1,150; contingencies, \$1,000. Total, \$20,000.

FOR SOUTH LONDON ONLY. It can readily be seen that this will provide for a very satisfactory storm system for South London. It would cover all the main streets of that section, and would relieve the sanitary system of a large portion of its

Mr. Chipman provides in these estimates for the construction of 100 catchbasins in different parts of South London to take care of the over-

As mentioned above, there is no provision for a storm water system in either East London or the north section of the city. Mr. Chipman merely suggests that several large mains with laterals be built to take charge of the water in these sections. The north half could be emptied into Creek, while the East End could be taken care of by the river. The report will be considered in the council tonight, and will be

the work of carrying off the storm water would be a harder task, and would cost at least \$25,000. The water could be carried away through Carling's Creek. This would mean that this creek, an annual source of trouble and expense, would have to be permanently improved, and this would cost some money.

MUST DEAL WITH QUESTION. "The whole question will now have to be taken up," said City Engineer Graydon. "Mr. Chipman gives a good system for South London. It is more necessary to have such a system in East London than it is anywhere else. It is also very necessary in the north section. It will cost about \$80,000 to do this work properly, but I think it should be done We lose more money annually by repairs to roads, and other damages than would pay the interest and sinking fund on a large part of this money

We cannot make good streets until we get rid of some of this water.

"In the north, Carling's Creek would have to be tiled, and properly fixed This would be a benefit to that section, and it would serve a useful purpose in taking away the storm water."

John was their fifth child, and his early life was spent on a farm in Victoria County. He was educated the Oakwood high school, and at the Oshawa Collegiate Institute.

Entered the Ministry After leaving school he entered the ministry, and for more than six years was a faithful expounder of the Methodist doctrine on the Campbellford circuit, and was afterwards pastor in the following towns: Perrytown, Port Perry, Darlington and Osborne, Owing to impaired health he was compelled and was a son of Thomas and Mary London in 1883. In addition to his farming interests he gave a great deal of attention to shipping horses to the United States, and in this branch he became widely known. He did a great deal to improve the breed of horses in this country, and in 1887 and 1888 in





## CAUGHT IN CURRENT SWEPT OVER FALLS

Tragic Fate of Two Unknown Men in a Rowboat From Canadian Side.

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 7 .- Two men, thrown from a little rowboat that overturned in the current of the Niagara River, one and a half miles above the falls, Saturday afternoon, are reported by the United States reservation officials across the river to have been swept over the Horseshoe Falls. Employees of the reservation

the overturning of the boat, watched the men struggle against the current, and witnessed the efforts of one man to swim out. The wreck of the rowboat was seen a few minutes later below the

William Hill and James Cassidy were at the work on the reservation when they saw a boat not far from the Canadian shore at a point known as Port Bay. Hill was working on the high limbs of a tree and saw the boat distinctly. At that time both men in the boat were bending over the oars with all their power, in an effort to keep the boat headed against the current.

At every stroke they lost distance, the boat was too far out, and in a place too dangerous for any aid to be sent. As the boat slowly slipped down th tream into the more powerful rapids it rolled over on its side, and the men were tumbled into the water. One man was seen again for a moment. Hill saw the other come to the surface, and struggle against the fierce current with bis head above the water. Then he was whirled under. The overturned boat obbed like a cork as it was swept toward the Horseshoe Falls. The suppo-sition is that the two bodies were caught in an undercurrent and rushed on to the brink under water, with the same speed as the boat, and were carried over.

Officer Arthur Alexander, of the reservation, is another who saw the boat carried down the rapids, though he did not see it till after it was overturned. A party of tourists standing at Terrapin Point saw in the gorge splinters of the boat that had withtood the pounding of the rapids. Efforts to find out the names of the two men were unsuccessful.




