

This is approximately \$20 a head, for man, woman and child in London, considered a strikingly good showing, which will be increased before 1917 is ended.

### FOE'S FINANCES ARE IN SERIOUS STATE, SAYS VON ROEDERN

Hun Finance Minister Increases War Taxation.

### LAST CREDIT EXHAUSTED

Wants 15,000,000,000 More Marks to Carry on the Conflict.

London, Feb. 24.-War taxation in Germany has been increased 20 per cent in the budget presented to the Reichstag yesterday by Count von Roe-Amsterdam dispatch to Reuter's. In the course of his speech, in which he anounced the new war credit of 15,000, 000,000 marks, Count von Roedern explained that the increase in taxation was necessary because the budget provides no new money while the "safet law," enacted last year, called for a increase of fifty to sixty per cent in the legal reserve

New Coal Tax.

Dealing with the proposed new coal tax the finance minister said that the question of taking over the coal mines by the state had been rejected as impossible. He added that Germany was well able to rely on its own coal production and that the commodity could be taxed all the easier because, in spite of war conditions, the price was lower than in foreign countries, averaging 15 to 18 marks. He maintained that an average taxation of 2½ marks on coal and 80 ptennigs on lignite was not too high. In addition to coal tax, there will be a levy of 10 to 16 per cent on railroad tickets, and 7 per cent in the legal reserve.

Battle on Sunday Between Subs and Merchantmen---One U-Boat and Two Freighters Lost--British Rout the Enemy.

New York, Feb. 24 .- One German submarine was sunk and two merchantmen destroyed in a battle between seven submarines and nine merchantmen off the Spanish coast, near Tarragona, according to a Buenos Aires dispatch printed in today's New York Herald. The information was said to have been received in the Argentine city in a special dispatch from Barcelona.

Among the ships listed as sunk were the Swed ish Skoland (previously reported as having been sunk, but without details), and the Guiseppe (Italian). The British steamship Janeta and other merchantmen were all greatly damaged.

The Herald dispatch asserted that the submarines were about to score a victory when five or six British destroyers appeared and put them to flight

### PORT OF NEW YORK NOT DISTURBED BY TRADE CURTAILMENT

Bulk of Traffic Is Grain and Munitions.

SHIP TONNAGE IS SCARCE

Available Vessels for Carrying Freight to Europe Extremely Limited.

New York, Feb. 24.—Great Britain's curtailment of imports, announced yesterday by Premier Lloyd George, is not regarded as likely to have any important effect upon the shipping situation at the port of New York. On the basis of the prime minister's statement, shippers today estimated the total reduction of imports at 2,000,000 tons a year. 



## Is a Pacifist a Traitor Or a Patriot?

The undcubted sincerity of our leading peace advocates does not prevent some keen editorial observers from pointing out that many of their activities in the present crisis play directly into Germany's hands. This with Ambassador Gerard, who cables from Paris view gets strong support from a United Press that the "German-financed" peace propaganda in America is regarded with suspicion by American officials on the other side as "a play for time that will enable Germany to make such disposition of her submarines as

will enable her best to strike at America in case of war." The New York Tribune adds "it is no mere accident that pro-German propaganda everywhere outside the Fatherland has made common cause with doctrinaire pacifism." And its quotes "a high Federal official" as saying that "most of the peace propagandists are pro-German," and that large German funds in this country are at the service of the pacifists.

On the other hand, some of the best-known advocates of peace are highly patriotic in their attitude, Henry Ford, notably, offering to put his great plant and organization at the service of the United States in the event of war.
