



PARIS, June 19.—Great Britain, France and Italy have again appealed to Greece to postpone her offensive and accept their mediation in an effort to forestall war in Asia Minor. This is an outcome of a two days' conference between Premier Briand and Lord Curzon, the British foreign secretary, which ended this evening with the dispatch of a note to King Constantine, tasking for an immediate reply as to whether Greece was willing to let the Allies settle the Turkish question. This declaration was loudly cheered by all sides of the House, and apparently met with its unstinted approval.







ARMAMENT REDUCTION

Premiers Will Find This Problem Much Involved.

LONDON, June 19.—(By Grattan O'Leary, Canadian Press staff correspondent.)—On the eve of the opening of the conference of premiers, the advisability of renewing the Anglo-Japanese alliance looms up as the dominant question to be considered. While the British press possibly tains its out British press, possibly taing its cut from official sources, is restrained and cautious in its comment, and while J. Austen Chamberlain's speech in the House of Commons on Friday evidenced scrupulous regard for the feelings of the Japanese, there is yet easily discernible increasing weight of opinion against the

Harding administration harbors no bad feeling towards Japan, and labors under no misunderstanding as to what is im-plied by the allance so far as the United States is concerned, stresses the view that the renewal of the treaty can-not have other than a hampering effect upon the maintenance of good relations etween the British and American between the British and American peoples, and, purpo ting to represent the cfficial view in Washington, hints at the possibility of the renewal of the alliance between the United States and China, thus destroying any chance of a reduction of armaments.






