



WORK OF BARON HIRSCH

Flourishing Settlements Established in North and South America.

London, Aug. 26.—The Jewish Colonization Society has just issued a report on the administration of the trust left by the late Baron Maurice de Hirsch—48,000.—60.—for the relief of Russian and other suffering Jews. Of the agricultural work of the association, the colonies in the Argentine constitute the central piece, but settlements have also been established. in Canada and Brazil.

The Argentine colonies comprise about 730,000 acres, of which 100,000 were sown with grain last year, yielding a net profit of 1,000,000 francs. In addition, they own great quantities of cattle and poultry, and possess 22 schools.

From Roumania alone the society helped 7,000 Jews to cross the Atlantic to find new homes, and applications for emigra-


