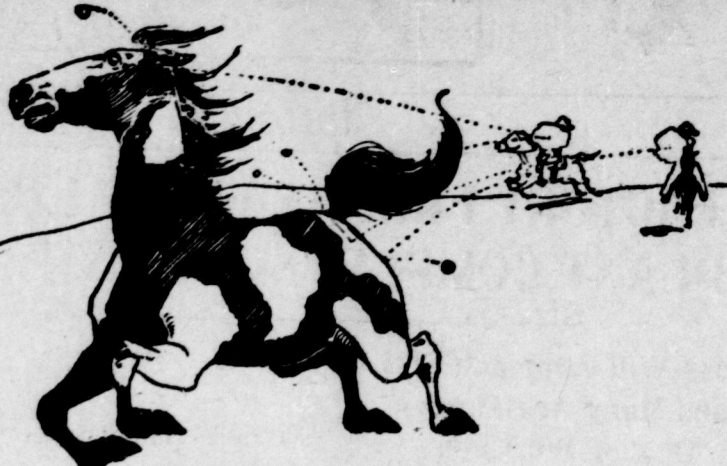

GIRL USED KNIFE ON HER MISTRESS FRESH BOUNDARY DISPUTE APPEARS

Mrs. Shearer Awoke to Find Servant Standing Over Her With a Weapon in Her Hand. Montreal, Aug. 25.—Mrs. Andrew Shearer, wife of Mr. Andrew Shearer, 567 Grosvenor avenue, was the victim of an assault yesterday morning, which might have resulted in very serious injuries.

Mrs. Shearer was asleep in bed, and about 5:30 o'clock awoke to find the servant girl, Margaret Mansion, standing over her, knife in hand. Mrs. Shearer immediately grappled with her would-be assailant, but in the struggle that ensued received two severe gashes in the breast.

Mr. Shearer immediately ran to her husband's room, and as soon as possible the police were notified and the girl was taken to the Westmount police station.

Mr. Shearer said, when approached today, that Mrs. Shearer, although suffering from shock, was practically unharmed, with the exception of the wounds. The fact that Mrs. Shearer awoke, he said, frightened the servant so much that she ran out of the room leaving the carving knife on the bed.

The only reason advanced by Mr. Shearer for the attack, was that the girl, who had been employed in the family about two months, had been reprimanded by his wife for not having received notice of dismissal.

Mrs. Shearer had notified the parents of the cause of the domestic, and this is supposed to have aroused the girl's temper. The girl is 16 years of age and extremely pretty.

During the absence of Mr. Shearer in New York last week, mysterious fires broke out in the premises.

WIND, LIGHTNING, PANIC, DEATH REDMOND COUNTS HIS CHICKENS

Tornado Sweeps Through the Chautauqua Country, Doing Great Destruction. Jamestown, N. Y., Aug. 25.—A tornado swept through Chautauqua county late this afternoon, leaving death and great destruction in its path.

The dead: Mrs. Austin E. Pierce, of Fredonia; Miss Ina Scott, of Shumla; Olin Dalrymple, 69 years old; unknown child.

The injured: Mrs. Olin Dalrymple, of Shumla, will probably die; Arthur Hills, of Portville, N. Y.

The storm came up suddenly. Trees in the grove were struck by lightning; many of them were blown down, and the rain fell in torrents. The people who took refuge under the trees at the first signs of the storm were caught by the falling branches and either killed or injured.

Buildings in the vicinity were blown down and others were unroofed. Hundreds of forest acres of trees were blown down and corn and other fields were laid waste, entailing a loss of thousands of dollars.

At the assembly grounds at Chautauqua many trees were uprooted and a portion of the only arena at the grounds was demolished. The men's clubhouse was badly damaged.

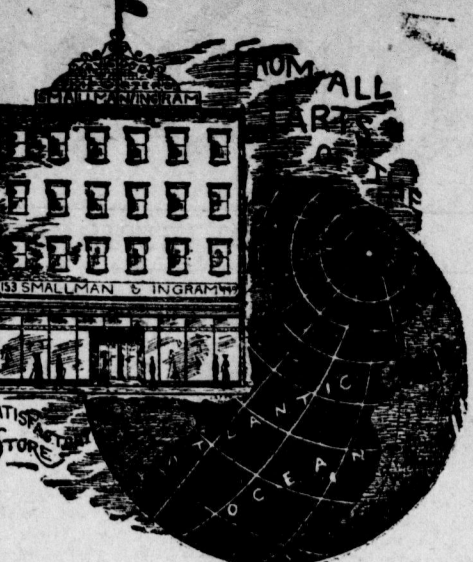

**Reciprocity.**  
Reciprocal trade between Canada and the United States has not been a live question in this country for some time. But among our neighbors it has received considerable attention. This seems to be the case more especially in the New England States. The Republicans of Massachusetts seem to have been considerably disturbed over it; and as the Republicans constitute the high protection party, their departure from orthodoxy is liable to create trouble. Resolutions were passed advocating reciprocity, and then their local leader, Senator Lodge, had to declare himself in its non-committal manner as possible—a course which pleased neither side. Now, it is stated in the press that President Roosevelt is very much concerned in the matter. The platform of the party, adopted at the national convention, makes no provision for reciprocity with Canada—is, in fact, quite silent on the subject, and the President, it is stated, is fearful that the result will be a weakening of the Republican vote in the New England States, is getting the party managers together to consider the dangerous question, and find some way of closing up the party ranks. In Canada, as we have said, no one gives any attention to the matter. And visitors from the States have reported at home that they found very little feeling over here in favor of it. It is quite true that there is no pronounced agitation here in favor of reciprocity. Nor, with our own experience, is it likely that there will be. Mr. Francis Wayland Glenn, of New York, who in days gone by was for a short time a member of the Canadian Parliament, but who seems to have got pretty well out of touch with this country since he left it, has been sending a letter through the country, urging Canadians to assert their right to make a reciprocity treaty with the States. But as no one questions our right to do it, the reasonable conclusion is that if we do not do it we must be indifferent to it, if not decidedly opposed. If Mr. Glenn only remembered the condition of affairs in this country when he left it, and if he had kept track of affairs since he left it, he would hardly have written the very inconsequential letter with which the Canadian public has been favored.

The settlement on the site refused to let the ground pass into the control of the Dominion for less than \$50,000 or \$60,000.
