



SHAKING HANDS.

A Few General Rules That Govern This Phase of Etiquette.

Legislation in America Against Railways May Intimidate British Investors.

OFFICALS EXPRESS FEAR.

Address Delivered by Mr. Hays or Transportation Has Strong Significance.

In an address delivered Saturday night by Mr. C. M. Hays, second vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk, and president of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad, he spoke of the future of railroads in Canada and said that legislation should not be framed which would take from the railways the privilege of earning fair returns on the vast sums of money invested in them: He also remarked that: "We must look to England for our additional facilities. Investors in Great Britain must view railroad possibilities in Canada with favor if we are to get further aid for the construction of new roads and branches."

of new roads and branches."

It has since been learned that Mr. Hays implied more than even his words indicated in regard to the question of legislation affecting railways. Certain capitalists in Great Britain are becoming intimidated, it is understood, at the vigorous policy of the Interstate Commerce Commission in the United States, and by the legislation enacted in the Dominion for the lowering of rates and the raising of taxes on railroads. They are flesitating to invest money in proposed new roads in Canada, because they fear such legislation will prevent them from realizing profits on their money.

Mr. Hays states that "railroads, like all other commercial enterprises, must be allowed, in all countries, the privilege of earning a reasonable return on the money invested in

like all other commercial enterprises, must be allowed, in all countries, the privilege of earning a reasonable return on the money invested in them," and in this statement two thoughts were involved, according to what was learned yesterday at the head office of the company. An official, speaking of the matter, said:

"The Government of Ontario increased the taxation of the Grand Trunk in that province by \$80,000 last year. The Railway Commission is lowering the company's rates in some instances. We think the commission is discharging its functions in the most capable and fair manner. We have no criticism whatever to offer, although we may not agree with the commissioners in all their findings regarding rates, but the point of the whole matter is this; If legislation is passed increasing the taxation of railroads, and the rates are lowered so that the profits to be made are to be reduced to a small margin, the investors in Bngland will hesitate to put their money in any new railway projects in this country. The bond issue for the Grand Trunk Pacific was greatly over-subscribed, it is true, but branch lines will be built and new roads will be projected. If the railways are legislated against in too stringent a manner, the mind of the British public may be intimidated so that fair prices for future securities may not be easily obtain investors in England were looking with apprehension on the actions of the Interstate Commerce Commission, and have expressed a fear that the Railway Commission in Canada may also endeavor to practically control rates.

MOVEMENT ON FOOT IN HONOR OF SHAKESPEARE.

Indications Are That a Greater Fund For the Purpose Will, Be Raised Than Was Ever Collected in Honor of Any Literary Character in History-A Distinguished Committee-City of Great Poets.

A movement is on foot in London A movement is on foot in London which is beginning to attract attention from all parts of the world. It has for its object the erection of a monument to Shakespeare. From present indications, a greater fund will be raised for the purpose than has ever been collected in honor of any literary character in history.

A Monument to An Era

Monuments, in the mind of the average Englishman, seem post-mortem appurtenances of great military heroes. or of statemen. To many there may appear a suggestion of sacrilege in the notion that a poet or a playwriter should be thus commemorated. In the case of Shakespeare, however, an exception is made. It is a fact, and an odd fact, that he is not thought of as a poet, or an author of plays. It is not the playwright that the monument will honor, but a certain force which is comnoted by the name Shakespeare; out an historical character, but an his done his memory seems on a parity with a salute of the Union Jack, or the wan a salute of the Union Jack, or the applause won by the National Anthem. The Shakespeare monument, whatever form it assumes, will be a monument to a race.

A Distinguished Committee Some such ideas as these were eloquently set forth by a number of noted men at a recent gathering in the Mansion House at London, called for the purpose of considering the matter. Among those who were present and spoke were Lord Avebury, Lord Reay, president of the British Academy; the Lord Mayor, Dr. Furnivall, the famous Shakespearean scholar; Anthony Hope Hawkins, Bram Stoker, Sidney Lee, Beerbohm Tree, and Prof. Gollancy, the latter honorary secretary of the gathering. 'Some of those who have expressed willingness to serve on the committee which shall conduct the movement are the Princess Louise, the Duke of Norfolk, the Duchess of Marlborough. Lord Roberts, Admiral Fremantle, the Archbishop of Canterbury, most of the diplomatic body in London, the Lord Mayor, the presidents of the British Society, the Royal Society. were Lord Avebury, Lord Reay,

don, the Lord Mayor, the presidents of the British Society, the Royal Society, the Royal Academy and many other distinguished persons. Another gentleman who was present, and whose name may not be so familiar to our readers, was Mr. Richard Badger. This gentleman has already contributed £2,000 to the fund, in addition to £1,000 for a specific purpose and £500 for the working expenses of a public appeal. Another gentleman who could not be present sent his cheque for 500 guineas.

The City of Great Poets. It may well be asked what has pre cipitated the movement at the present cipitated the movement at the present time. For many years a monument has been urged, but those interested did not get a firm foothold until the London County Council came to their assistance, and recently announced its desire to set aside a site for the monument. The Council felt that it could hardly resolve itself into a committee for collecting funds, and so the Lord Mayor summoned a meeting of those interested. As Dr. Furnivall said, it is fitting that London, as a city, should interested. It was agreed, however, that more time should be granted for a full expression of public opinion on the subject. Reference was made to the desire of other countries—notably France and the United States—to contribute toward the memorial, and the feeling was that assistance of the sort should be courteously accepted. Refere very long we may expect to hear more of the Shake-speare memorial.

CAMPHOR BYPRODUCTS.

How They Are Obtained From Every

Every part of a camphor tree, even to the leaves, contains camphor, The forests are not confined to Formosa alone, but are also found in Japan proper. Camphor is found in the form of crystals in the wood tissues and is separated from the crude oil by double distillation. From the first distillation is secured an oxidized product, camphogenotol, the principle of the camphor oils of commerce. The crude camphor is a dark colored substance,


fusing at 170 degrees C.

Among the byproducts may be mentioned crude camphor oil, which comes out simultaneously with the camphor; white oil, obtained by sublimating the crude oil and used in the manufacture of soap. Red oil also is obtained from the crude camphor oil as well as black oil, which is extensively used in the preparation of varnishes. A turpentine is secured from the white oil that is in great demand for medical and industrial purposes. From red oil is obtained the product known as saffrol, employed to a considerable extent in the manufacture of perfumery and also soap, and a disinfectant is also distilled from red oil after the addition of other substances claimed to kill the cholera bacillus. Another product is an insecticide, which when mingled with 100 parts of water destroys insects injurious to farm crops.-Scien-

Quebec, May 11.—Three thousand four hundred new settlers were landed at this port yesterday morning; The Vancouver, with the Salvation Army inamigrants, steamed up the harbor at 10 c'cleck. The local contingent of the Army, under Staff-Captain Patterson and Emsign Hannah, were on the deck to greet Col. Jacobs and other officers of the Salvation Army in charge of the new arrivals. Eight hundred of the number who came out as steerage were landed at Quebec. There were 140 uniformed members of the Army with the aggregation, which is, without exception, the finest looking lot of settlers who ever arrived here. They come from all parts of England, Scotland and Ireland, especially from the vicinity of Cork.

Col. Jacobs, general secretary of the Salvation Army in Canada, with headquarters at Toronto, said that every man and girl on the ship was already provided with a position, to which he or she would go direct. He added that there were many men of means in the number, who had been in business in Britain, and the greater part of those would proceed to the Northwest Territories to invest their capital.

Teronto, May 10.—The Legislature spent yesterday afternoon in discussing the Niagara Falls power question. Hon. Adam Beck spoke for about an hour, and thoroughly reviewed the situation, criticizing in no uncertain language the folly of such an agreement as had been entered into by the moribund Ross Government and outlining the Government policy, which looks to the conservation of the water powers of the Province in the same way that crown timber and mineral lands are administered. A commission to thoroughly enquire into the subject was broadly hinted at. Mr. G. W. Ross, Hon. Mr. Foy and the Premier also spoke. The matter came up on a question on the order paper from Mr. Fraser that a copy of the agreement of January be laid upon the table.

nicipalities are given privileges in the purchase of power, Mr. Beck described as visionary municipal ownership concessions. "The provision is wholly miseding and illusory. Where Public is Buncoed.

"First of all, the company need not exercise its right for 10 years from the date of the first output of power under the first agreement." In the next place, and provided that the company does exercise its rights and does proceed with the development. In the hird place, the power so reserved is to be restricted for the municipal purposes is limited to one-half of the supplementary development. In the third place, the power so reserved is to be restricted for the municipal uses of "lighting, heating and other pulle utilities." Under the Municipal Power Works Act of 1908, municipalities are given the right to develop power for municipal purposes and laso for the purpose of resale to manufacturers and others who may require it as motive power. This clause, which purports to meet the public demand embodied in the Municipal Porwer Works Act, does not provide for the sale to municipalities of power for manufacturing purposes. That is to say, that ne micipality could take advantage of the price fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-m-Council and demand embodied in the purpose of resale to any manufacturer within the municipal boundaries.

Much attention has been given of late years to the terms upon which the Government disposes of its timber and mineral resources. Public attention is now being directed to the possibilities of its water-powers, and if, the granting of timber and mineral rights at unduly low prices cannet be justified, the granting of water-power rights at unduly low prices is still harder to justify. The timber and mineral resources are limited, each parcel and each block is bound to be worked out in time, but it is hoped that under a gracious Providence the waters of the Niagara River will forever flow over Niagara River will forever flow over Niagara Falls? There is in these water-powers a source of perpetual revenue.

Governmental Control.

"The question is so vast that no Government can deal with it until it has had an opportunity of considering it in all its bearings. Governmental control is called for by some, and for it a good deal may perhaps be sald, but I have already shewn that in the case of these Niagara Falls companies the capitalization is very heavy and the payment of dividends upon capital.

I have already shown that in the case of these Niagara Falis companies the capitalization is very heavy and the payment of dividends upon capital, which is a legitimate burden on every company, will in these cases impose a heavy tax upon the consumer.

"The policy of fixing prices at arbitrary figures, which will not permit of a dividend upon the capital of the company affected, is one that is difficult to justify. It may be that, after all, the best means of arriving at a satisfactory conclusion on all these points will be to utilize the services of a number of competent gentlemen who may be asked to enquire into the lecation, capacity and cost of development of the various power and electric railway companies and the power possibilities of the future—in a word, to enquire into the whole question in all its bearings, and to report fully thereon. This will, of course, include lecalities other than those subsidiary to Niagara Falls. Such a commission should have the most extensive powers, and upon their report the Government should be able to build up a policy which will commend itself to the people of the Province who are so vitally interested in the question, and I am in a position to state that such a course is now under the consideration of the Government."

Hon. G. W. Ross reviewed the course of development at Niagara. He cules fixed the park commissioners for converting the inseless water of Niagara into an asset of \$5,000,000. He said the beauty of the park had not been interfered with. He would not minimize the importance of the advantages as pointed out by Mr. Beck. The basis of the development was a matter of opinion. In insisting that the Americans should pay the same as Canadians for their power, they put a safeguard upon Canadian industries. They had guarded against combinations of the competing development companies. He was extremely sorry that the Gevernment would not ratify the Electrical Development Co's agreement, and explained how the agreement had been made, shewing how it was a purely business matter, involving the loss or retention of 125,000 herse-power. PRESENT LORD SALISBURY.

he New President of England's Board of Trade-Man of Considerable Attainments and Character.

Attainments and Character.

There are not a few people who think hat it is a source of strength to the Unionist party to include the name of Salisbury in its cabinet, says The London Daliy Mail. Others there are who still grumble, in the jargon of the professional politician, about the "Hotel Cecil," and in whose eyes it is almost a drawback to have had any blood connection with the late Prime Minister

a drawback to have had any blood con-nection with the late Prime Minister of the Unionist party.

I suppose the truth ties about haif haifway between these two proposi-tions; and that, if you have a post to fill which transcendent ability declines to occupy, you are right to offer it to a man of considerable attainments, whose name is a synoym for high char-acter throughout the Empire. In some acter throughout the Empire. In some such way I think that Lord Salisbury such way I think that Lord Sallsbury must have arrived at his present position. It is rather the fashion to say but not to think, that he has been pitch-forked into the inner circle for the sake of his name alone. "Magni nominis umbra" was on the lips of many men when his appointment was suggested the other day. But "the shadow of a great name" may have another and far from derogatory meaning; and certainly in Lord Sallsbury's case the Latin phrase might

meaning; and certainly in Lord Salisbury's case the Latin phrase might well be rendered, "A chip of the old block."

The Cecil family is a very curious phenomenon in these days, when popularity, advertisement, success are worshipped as assiduously as was ever the golden calf. It is "fugitive and cloistered," if we state its position according to the meridian of London society. It is callous to praise, indifferent to criticism; it is a sort of living embodiment of conscience; and conscience is a puzzle. It has a strong conviction that in public and in priconviction that in public and in pr vate life certain principles are vital and that, nowadays, is so eccentric that it is almost attractive. But it is very friendly, very fearless and very faithful; wherefore, the Cecil family has held its own in public estimation since the days of Queen Elizabeth.

It is, indeed, quite interesting to note how fully the character given by Queen Elizabeth to Lord Burleigh has

Queen Elizabeth to Lord Burieign has been maintained by his descendants. Said the great Queen: "This judgment have I of you, that you will not be cor-rupted by any manner of gifts, and that you will be faithful to the State"; a noble judgment, and as true of the Frime Minister of Queen Victoria as it was of the Secretary of State to Queen

Note also a few of the movement Note also a rew of the movements connected with the name of Sir William Cecil, and see how they are tended by the present generation of his name and race. He was, above all, a great churchman of broad and tolerant great churchman of broad and tolerant views, who abominated the persecution under Queen Mary and the confiscation of property for conscience sake. What more worthy scions could he have to carry on his principles than the Salisbury family of to-day? He was also instrumental in preventing the marriage of Queen Elizabeth to Philip of Spain, the husband of the late Queen Mary.

The prototype of Lord Hugh Cecil in his dislike to the Deceased Wife's Sister Bill can now be clearly traced; and the animosity which subsequently pursued the earlier of these church protagonists will no doubt be revived for the benefit of the younger man in the course of the present session. It was course of the present session. It was under the influence of the great Lord under the influence of the great Loral Burleigh that the prayer book was revised and the supremacy of the Crown over church and state was acknowledged; he protected the Protestants who fied to England from France and Holland, and in return for the gift of liberty they instructed England in the ways of art and commerce; finally, he

ilberty they instructed England in the ways of art and commerce; finally, he was the first great Colonial statesman that England had possessed. It will be seep how little, if at all, the Cecil family has deflected from the line of that great man; their public life would seem still to be guided by it.

Lord Salisbury is forty-four in October next, and has been in public life for the last twenty years. He sat for a Lancashire division from 1885-92, and for Rochester from 4893 until he succeeded to the peerage. From the first he was a true House of Commons man, which means that he was a constant attendant, a laborious member of many committees, and a good speaker. He was always an influential supporter of committees, and a good speaker. He was always an influential supporter of the Government, except (if my mem-ory serves me) upon their Irish land

was always an influential supporter of the Government, except (if my memory serves me) upon their Irish land policy during the last Parliament; and it was a constant matter for surprise during that period that he was not given office after so many years of admirable work. He identified himself mainly with church matters, and was appointed chairman of the church Parliamentary committee in 1838, a post which he occupied until he became Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs in 1900; he also showed great Parliamentary interest in all agricultural and volunteer questions. It is only candid to say that during his tenure of office he occasionally showed "the defects of his qualities," and that more than once his blunt asseverations on delicate diplomatic affairs almost amounted to indiscretions. But they did no harm, and the House of Commons recognized the method of the father in the manner of the son.

On leaving office in 1903 he went as colonel of the Hedfordshire Regiment (4th battalion) to South Africa, and was mentioned in despatches for his services, returning home very much stronger in health than he had been for many years. With so much stering work done to lay to his credit, his present promotion from the office of Lord Privy Seal is not surprising.

In private life he has a host of friends who are devoted to him for his mahy attractive qualities, and in his home he is a worthy successor of his father, and no higher praise can be given. A visitor to Hatfield not longage was overheard to say in the train, as he returned to London: "What a wonderful family these Cecils are! They can supply all the necessaries of public and private life from their own home circle. If i want a pattern clergyman, there is Lord William; a South African hero, there is Lord Hugh. And if I had to choose an English squire or an elder brother, I should choose Lord Salisbury."

He pleaded for the two judges who investigated Mr. Gamey's charges, and asked that they be spared such an indignity. To this Mr. Whitney very forcibly replied that Mr. Gamey should be considered. Reading a few extracts from the judges' report, he showed that they were absolutely untrue in their statements. Smith of the Soo left his seat and watched the division from the press gallery. He had no pair. It would have hurt his feelings to vote against his friend Gamey.

Mr. Gamey's Speech.

When Mr. Gamey rose, some enthusiastic ladies clapped their hands. Mr. Gamey asked that the clerk read the resolution passed by the Legislature on June 26, 1903. He then moved the

following resolution:

Gamey, member-elect for the District of Manitoulin, thanking the commissioners for their just and impartial conduct in the matters referred to them and regreting that it has become the duty of the House to place on record an expression of censure of the conduct of the member for Manitoulin in connection with the matters forming the subject of the investigation, be rescinded and expunged from the journals of the House."

For some time, he said, he had considered whether it was necessary to bring before the House a resolution of this kind, and he came to the conclusion that it was due to him and his family that something should be done. He had been placed in a position quite satisfactory to himself, so far as the country was concerned, but there was the record, which was not in accord with the verdict of the people. He believed he secured a vindication from the people of Ontarlo on Jan. 25 last. He went through the Province and addressed about 95 meetings. Both sides discussed the merits and demerits of the case, and considering the verdict of the people he could be excused from dealing with the report of the judges in full. In the Muskoka by-election, the case was discussed very fully, and though a supporter of the then Government had been returned at the general election, an opponent of that Government was returned by a large majority at the bye-election. Mr. Gamey then referred to the North Renfrew bye-election and to the reluctance of the Government to make a general appeal to the people. When the election was brought on, the Government sustained "the most remarkable defeat that has ever overtaken any political party in the province."

It was only proper, he said, to ask the Legislature to do what the great majority of the people of Ontario desired them to do.

Just One Instance.

Just One Instance.

He gave one particular instance of the unfairness and incorrectness of the unfairness and incorrectness of the report of the judges, which was the statement that he deposited \$900 in the Ontario Bank on a certain date. It was an absolute falsehood. The Government must have known that these statements were positively and absolutely false, and he asked if we had come to it that a Government should place on the records of the House statements they knew to be false.

The people of his own constituency knew the nature of the charges made and the nature of the judges' report, and, what was the result? On Jan. 25 he was re-elected by a much larger majority than he was in 1902. In Gore Bay, in the election of 1902, he received a majority of 14. On Jan. 25, in his own home, though he had not the op

portunity to look after his canvas, out of a total vote of 159 the Liberal candidate received only 35. The people of his constituency had endorsed him fully, and it was only right the motion should be allowed to pass.

Vindication Brought Joy.

"All I ask is to give me," said Mr. Gamey, "for the benefit of myself and family in the future, what the whole Province of Ontario seem to me to say I should have. On the 25th of Jannary, though the defeat of the Government may have been pleasing to thousands of independent Liberals, as well as Conservatives, no man felt the same feeling of satisfaction that I feit when the returns began to come in. When I heard of South Ontario, East Wellington, Centre Simcoe, North York, East York and other constituencies, I thought to myself I am cetting even with the men, who with two judges without human hearts, attempted to destroy me. There could be nothing more satisfactory to me. When I thought of the leader of the late more satisfactory to me. "If the Opposition desires any further evidence, I have it. If they desire ther evidence, I have it. If they desire to go into the case more particularly I can do it. If the motion prevailed the House refused to thank the judges for their report. Then the only inference was their conduct was unjust. The duty of defending the judiciary was upon the shoulders of the Legislature, and it was due that the members should by their votes uphold them. If the judges were guilty of impartiality they should be impeached; so that if any member voted for Mr. Gamey's motion they should pledge themselves to take this serious responsibility.

Mr. Harcourt said he had addressed many meetings since June 26, 1903, and on no occasion did he refer to this regrettable incident. He refrained from discussing it, because there were issues enough.

He then came to the question: Were the commissioners warranted in coming to the conclusion they did? Here he branched off to say that the last speaker had led them to the conclusion that the last campaign was not a Whitney-led campaign.

Not Parallel.

Mr. Harcourt proceeded to quote the nearest precedents, although he claimed there was no exact parallel. There was the Wilkes case in England, in which the reversal motion was carried eleven years after the member was expelled. There was also the Bradlaugh case in England and the William Lyon Mackenzle case in Canada, to which Mr. Harcourt alluded. Summing up he said the finding of the judges was just and impartial, the investigation thorough and the finding such as to warrant the vote of censure. The House "regretted" that it was compelled to pass the vote; there was no harshness in it. What useful purpose could be gained by the excising of the recerd? It was a fact of history and could not be obliterated from the memory. It looked childish to strike from the records a fact that could not be obliterated.

The Conservative party had pleaded with the Government not to besmirch the judiciary and when these pleadings were of no avail these men, who are now the champions of the judiciary, sat down in council and succeeded in degrading the judiciary.
